Why a Committee?

You will study the potential needs of the district and **work collectively** to review the long range plan and develop a potential bond package that can be recommended to the Board of Trustees for their consideration.



Overview of Committee

- Over 40 citizens were invited to join this committee.
- Committee Members were nominated to ensure a diverse cross-section of the EISD community.
 - Parents & Non-Parents
 - Campus & District Staff
 - Community & Business
 - Mix of Backgrounds & Geographic Representation
- Including varying perspectives from the entire community is very important to the process.



Committee Charge

To help the district plan for the anticipated growth, the Citizens' Bond Committee is charged to:

- Represent the entire community in the bond planning process
- Assist the district in **prioritizing** the District's current and long-term facility needs, in face of available financial capacity, with focus on:
 - District growth and capacity
 - · Building age, safety and condition
 - Facility and program comparability
 - Evolving educational delivery and programs



Committee Charge

- Review summary of educational needs of students at all grade levels and the district recommendations in line with the district's mission, vision and goals
- Consider the district's current financial position and funding methods to develop a recommendation that is fiscally sound
- Report your findings to the Elgin ISD Board of Trustees that will include recommendations on how to proceed with the call of a bond election.

District issues bond sales in increments over time to match the schedule of project design and construction

Shared Responsibility

LEVY

Board Levies I&S Tax Rate

The Interest & Sinking tax rate (set annually) is levied to make annual debt payments

DESIGN

Project Design

Project design is a multifaceted process that begins conceptual and concludes with construction documents

BID

Projects Bid

Projects are bid in the competitive market to select a contractor and get the best value for the District

CONSTRUCT

Project Construction

Construction takes approx. 12-14 mos. for an elementary and 24-28 mos. for a high school

Largest driver of future growth

Incoming KG class sizes

Average ~1.8% annual growth year over year during the last decade (pre-pandemic)

Aging of the existing student population

Accounts for bulges in the population

Regeneration in existing neighborhoods

Where are younger families moving in to replace empty-nesters?

New Charter Schools

Two new charter campuses expected in the next 1-3 years, seven schools adding grade levels

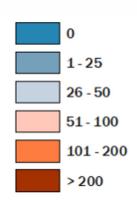
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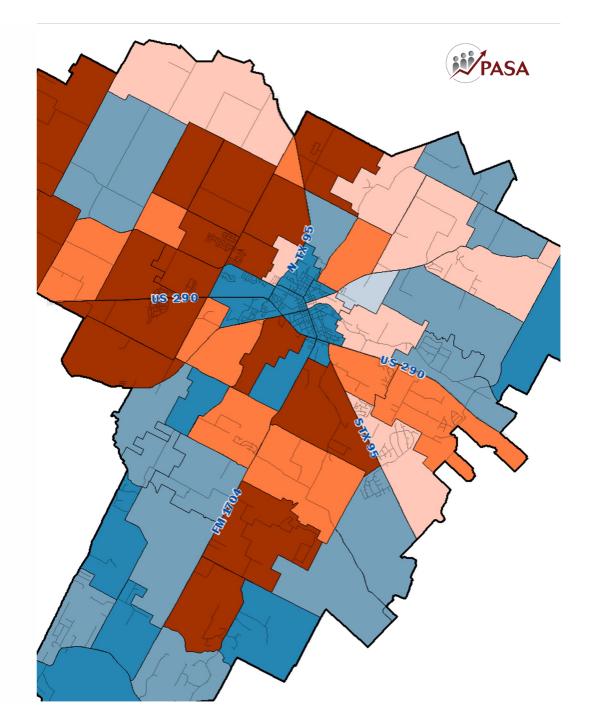


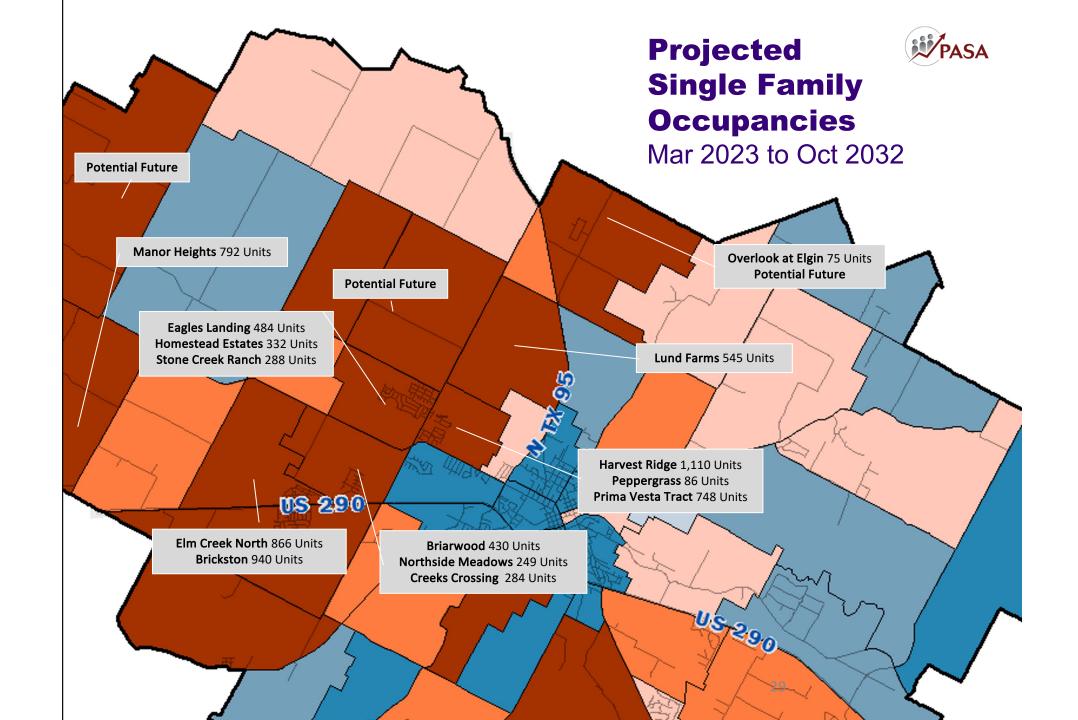


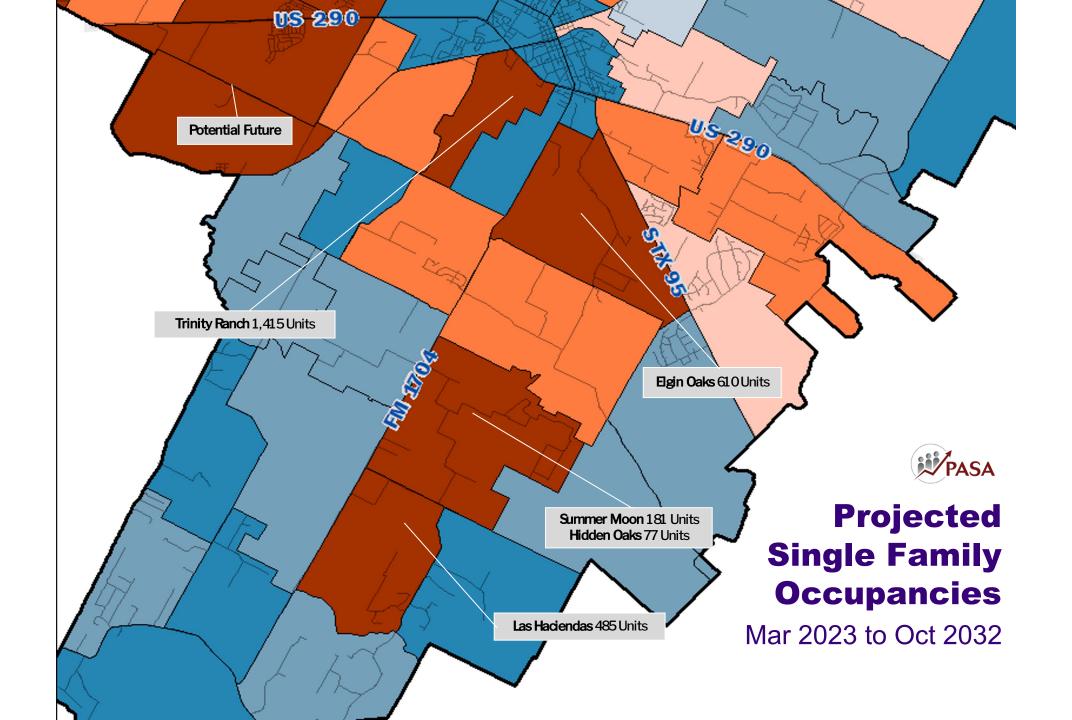
Projected Single Family Occupancies

Mar 2023 to Oct 2032

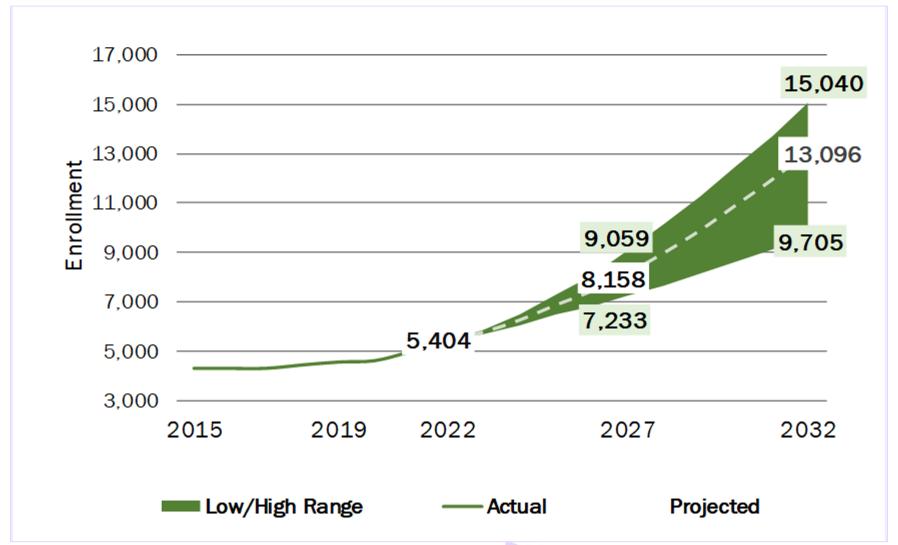








Three Scenarios of Growth
