### Talk Sup Week 22 Review and Preview

February 12, 2024

Good morning Sayreville! I hope you had a relaxing and enjoyable weekend. Welcome to another edition of Talk Sup, my weekly newsletter. Please remember that **next Monday**, **February 19**<sup>th</sup>, **our schools will be closed** in observance of Presidents' Day.

If you did not have a chance to attend the Board of Education (BOE) Business Meeting held on Tuesday,



January 23<sup>rd</sup>, here is what you missed. Sean Burns from Sayreville War Memorial High School (SWMHS) began the meeting by providing his respective Student Council Representative to the Board of Education

Report. Next, Mrs. Bloom expressed her opening remarks, as did Mrs. Napolitano. During the presentation portion of the meeting, the Board

resumed publicly reviewing and discussing the 2024-25 School District Budget with the following budget presentations: **Special Education** and **Athletics**. The Board then moved the action items from the Superintendent's Report onto the Board Agenda and approved them all. To see the Agenda, click <a href="here">here</a>. Among other motions, on the Vision 2030 Finance and Infrastructure portion of the agenda, the BOE accepted a generous donation of a keyboard, stand, and case from the Brandon Tyler Narleski Charitable Foundation to the Bombers Beyond Program, valued at \$719.77. It also approved an amendment to the American Rescue Plan Homeless Children and Youth (ARP-HCY II) Grant application in the amount of \$28,208, which includes supplemental funding in the amount of \$1,395. In addition, the Board rejected all bids received in response to a bid opening held on January 25, 2024, for the Window Replacements at Multiple Schools, due to an error in the bid specifications. Lastly the Board of Education awarded the bid for HVAC Upgrades at the Samsel Upper Elementary School and Sayreville Middle School to Preferred Mechanical, Inc. as the lowest responsible bidder for bids opened on February 1, 2024, in the total amount of \$26,319,000, to be paid for using funds from the Bond Referendum.

On the Student Achievement portion of the agenda, among other motions, the BOE approved new courses, as well as course title changes at SWMHS for the 2024-2025 school year. Likewise, it approved a new Grades 9-12 American sign Language 1 Curriculum Guide. Click <a href="https://likewise.com/here">here</a> to review it. In addition, the BOE approved the Camp XL Extended School Year Integrated Summer Program and the Learning Acceleration Extended School Year Summer Program at the Samsel Upper Elementary School and Selover School from July 1, 2024, through August 1, 2024. The program will run Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday during the first week, and Monday through Thursday during the remaining weeks.



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On the Governance portion of the agenda, the Board of Education approved revisions to BOE Policy P 8454 Management of Pediculosis for a second reading and adoption. Click <a href="here">here</a> to read it. The BOE also approved the submission of the Uniform State Memorandum of Agreement Between Education and Law Enforcement Officials for school year 2023-2024 and the creation of a Law Enforcement Unit as an addendum to the Uniform State Memorandum of Agreement Between Education and Law Enforcement Officials, as provided under FERPA (Family Education Rights Privacy Act), pursuant to 20 U.S.C. 1232g(a)(4)(ii) and 34 C.F.R. 99.8.

On the Personnel portion of the agenda, as well as other motions, the Board of Education appointed new certificated and non-certificated staff for the 2023-24 school year. Likewise, the Board approved the transfer of non-certificated staff for the 2023-24 school year. In addition, it approved a sidebar agreement with the Teamsters Local 469 regarding salary adjustments, due to contract anomalies for the 2023-24 school year.

During the Open Public Comment portion of the meeting, a resident asked a question about the increase in legal fees and inquired whether they were related to the lawsuit involving the construction of the transportation complex filed by the district against the Borough. The same resident asked if the district has received any savings from the solar power purchase projects and inquired about the status of the bond referendum debt service aid. Finally, he asked if the district was considering and/or pursuing alternate locations for the transportation complex.

During the Board Discussion portion of the meeting, Mr. Callahan reviewed what was discussed during the last Student Achievement Committee Meeting, as did Mrs. Napolitano for the last Governance Committee Meeting. Mrs. Bloom also shared news from the Middlesex County School Boards Association.

The next meeting will take place on **Tuesday**, **February 20<sup>th</sup> at 6:30 pm in the SUES Board Room**. During this meeting, the Board will resume publicly reviewing and discussing the 2023-24 School District Budget with the following budget presentations: Buildings & Grounds, Capital Projects, and Transportation. The agenda for this meeting will be posted on the district website on **February 16<sup>th</sup>**.
