




Grateful Gatherings

Club Fair


At the beginning of the school year, the Middle School students visited classrooms in the Middle School to sign up for clubs at the annual Club Fair! Maclay Middle School offers

Maclay's top-tier Cross-Country teams will continue to progress and remain one of the leading teams in the state.

BOYS GOLF

The Boy's Golf team concluded the regular season at the regional tournament. The team defeated Chiles, Florida High, Lincoln, Leon, Community Christian, and Rickards to win the City Championship. The boys came into the post-season with a team scoring an average of 7.698 over par. On October 4, at Hilaman Golf Course, the boys availed themselves as District Champions, and later took 4th at Regionals, just one place short of the qualifying spot. Sophomore Jack Cook finished third with a 72 at Regionals and secured an individual spot for the State Tournament. With the wealth of young talent and leadership of next year's upperclassmen, the future of the boy's golf program is certainly bright.



Sarah Casteel Dean '11

Sarah (Casteel) Dean started at Maclay in the fall of 2007 in the ninth grade. Throughout her four years at Maclay she wore many hats. Sarah was a member of Company, photo editor of the school yearbook, ran cross country, played softball, swam, played JV tennis, a member of the Green Club, and was class historian her senior year. She was known for being kind to every person she encountered and was so beloved by her classmates, that they elected her the 2010 Homecoming Queen. Sarah graduated from Maclay in the spring of 2011, she went on to Samford University where she graduated with a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Graphic Design. Sarah now lives in Greenville, South Carolina with her husband Matthew. During the lockdown Sarah began her journey creating *The Midnight Post* and this fall *The Midnight Post* and *The Post Box Clock* (her debut novel) were published.

Enjoy the Q&A interview with Sarah Dean about her time at Maclay, the creation of The Midnight Post, & her journey of becoming a storyteller.





What was your time at Maclay like?

This might sound a little silly, but my time at Maclay was like a tulip planted in the winter. I was a transplant from another school, and it honestly took me a little while to find my roots, but through my time there I really bloomed. By the end of my senior year, I had kindled friendships with some of my closest friends who I still cherish to this day and learned that I loved creating art, which set me on the path that led me to where I am! I am so grateful for Maclay!

What is your favorite memory from Maclay?

That's so hard! Probably laughing with friends around the quad. It's the little things, you know?

What teacher or class had the biggest impact on you?

My favorite class at Maclay was Yearbook. My junior year I met Mrs. Mayer, and she was the first person to introduce me to visual storytelling. She gave me a camera assignment and I fell in love with photography! I really don't think I would be where I am without her creative encouragement.

What lessons did you learn at Maclay that you still carry with you today?

Make sure to respond when someone emails you.

How did Maclay prepare you for success in college and beyond?

Maclay was just academically incredible and really fostered my sense of loving to learn which has helped in every season of life.



When did you first realize your love for graphic design & illustration? Have you always been creative?

When I was at Maclay I took drama and yearbook, but, funny enough, I never took any of the art classes, so it wasn't until my college Journalism orientation that I realized I needed to switch majors. When I took my first design class, I loved it and knew immediately I was in the right place.

Tell us about The Midnight Post

So exciting! Well, The Midnight Post all started from a few letters, illustrating around midnight, and lots of Animal Crossing during the pandemic. It had been a dream of mine since I started graphic design to illustrate and write a picture book, and so during Covid, I started creating this fantasy world in which there would be six animal couriers who delivered letters of hope, wisdom, and heart. As our world started opening back up again, I decided to end my time working as an Art Director and fully launch a card company directly tied to the story as I worked on the series. Each month I started debuting an animal character over email, but what I didn't realize at the time was that the world and the story had really grown beyond the scope of a picture book. By the end of the year, I had a fully written manuscript that was ready to go into editing, and I suppose the rest is history! The first book, The Midnight Post and the *Postbox Clock* follows *Frederick the Fox* as he moves to the small town of Burrowood, and unravels the mystery of a magical post office, The Midnight Post.

Do you do all the illustrations yourself?

I do!

When did you realize you wanted to make *The Midnight Post* into a children's book series? Or was that always the plan?

It was always the plan! The cards were just a way that I could start paving a path for the story. I can't wait to share more about the world! There's a lot to unpack in this series!

When did you know you wanted to be an author?

This one is funny! I really didn't want to be an author in a traditional sense. In fact, I was terrified of being an author because of my low marks in grammar from school. My husband was the one who encouraged me to write the book. I think it's one of the things that makes this story so special...like Mrs. Mayer encouraging me in photography or my husband cheering me on to write, I think sometimes people can come into your life and notice something you don't really realize about yourself, but by them voicing what they see in you, it can have a profound impact on your life.

How did Maclay specifically impact your writing?

When I was at Maclay I was in the drama club, and I really realized how important being able to "get into character" was to writing character dialogue. It can feel very similar!

What has been the most rewarding part of being an author & illustrator of your own book?

Getting to encourage others to write and illustrate their own stories! It's simply the best!

What is your writing process like?

Well, first I spend a long time working through a master outline that has just about every idea I can think of inside of it. Then I put on some music that fits the feel of the chapter I'm working on and then I get to writing. Some days it's amazing, some days it's the worst, but like the feeling you get from a book – getting to the end is the best part!

What advice would you give to aspiring authors?

Being an author isn't about loving to write. It's about having a story you want to tell. You never know the potential your words can bring.

What is next? A sequel?

Oh yes! We're going to have a ball!

I do, it's C.S. Lewis. Who couldn't fall in love with a world inside a wardrobe?

Daniel Bowen,

Soccer ('02)

Bowen competed on the track and field teams two seasons, as well as weightlifting, diving, and basketball team for a season. As a track athlete, Bowen's 4x400m relay team won the state title his senior year helping the Marauders to a

team State Championship in 2002 and as a diver, he was the District Champion his junior season. A four-time starter on the varsity soccer squad, Bowen led the team in scoring in both his junior and senior years with a combined 78 goals. His career total includes 86 goals, including a record 52 in his final year at Maclay. He is also tied for the record for most goals scored in a game (7), alongside Molly Jones. In his senior year, he was named MVP of the North vs South All-Star Game, where he scored three goals, his accolades did not end there. He was also named an All-Big Bend player and to the All-State team. While Bowen was at Maclay, the soccer team made four successive Regional appearances, including State runner-up in 2002.



Katy Gimble,

Multi-sports ('01)

During her time at Maclay, Katy Gimbel made her mark in numerous sports with her outstanding athleticism. She earned eight varsity letters playing for the Marauder softball, golf, and basketball teams all while being

active in Anchor Club and the National Honor Society. In her senior year, she was named to the 2nd All State team and the 1st All Big Bend team for basketball. She recorded an incredible 3.7 assists per game and led the team in total points scored (481), scoring average (15.1), rebounds (7.4), and free-throw percentage (80%). At the time, she set the school and county record for three-pointers and the second top 3-point shooter in the state. Gimbel also reached the 1,000-point milestone to cap off an impressive basketball career. In addition to being a great basketball player, Gimbel also excelled on the golf course. She was named to the 1st All Big Bend team in her 9th, 11th, and 12th grade years. She also won the Individual City Championship in her junior year and the Individual District Championship in her senior year.



Precious Hall

Basketball ('12)

Very few people have dominated the sport of basketball the way Precious Hall has. When Hall was at Maclay, she quickly became an offensive dynamo, scoring 1,000 points in under two years. From 2010-2012 alone, she

scored over 1,400 points and recorded 225 total steals, 493 total rebounds, and 36 total blocks. She also served as team captain and was named Most Valuable Player and Maclay School Team Outstanding Athlete. In 2011, she was named Big Bend Player of the Year, and to the 1st All Big Bend team in 2012. According to her coach, Rapheal Harris, "Precious Hall was a phenomenal basketball player. A great competitor and student-athlete. One of the top student-athletes in this area."



Ross McMillan

Cross Country and Track ('03)
When Ross McMillan was at Maclay, he
exemplified what it means to not only be
a great athlete, but a great leader as well.
McMillan attended Maclay for six years, playing
basketball and running on the track & field

and cross-country teams. As a senior, McMillan served as captain and helped lead the Marauder track & field team to the State title in 2003. His coach, Gary Droze said, "(Winning State) could never have happened without Ross setting a tone of relentless determination."

In 2002, McMillan won the State Champion in the 4x400m and was runner-up in the 800m and his senior year, he was the 1600m State Champion, 4x400m State Champion and 800m runner-up. McMillan still owns three school records that have not been broken in 20 years. Besides the amazing impact Ross made on the track, he was equally as successful in his student life. He was elected President of the Student Government his senior year and was named the Most Outstanding Freshman in 2000, the Most Outstanding Sophomore in 2001, and the Most Outstanding Senior in 2003.

Under the leadership of first-year head coach Kim Googe, the 1986 softball team exemplified what it means to be a Maclay Marauder through their hard work, perseverance, and determination. After losing the season opener 0-5 to Rickards, the team rebounded and steamrolled the competition, finishing the regular season with only one other loss. In the State semifinal matchup against powerhouse Fort Lauderdale Westminster, Maclay dominated the entire game in a 17-1 rout. The Marauders then set their sights on the final obstacle: Lake Butler County Union. The team was hungry to win the State Championship, having lost in the Final Four the year prior. The game was deadlocked until the sixth inning when the Marauders erupted with five runs and then held on late to win the game and the Championship with a 9-7 victory. This band of 19 girls were a tight-knit group who displayed resilience, determination, and a ton of athleticism, and were prime examples of what it means to be Marauders.

Byron Knight

Byron Knight was known as a well-traveled citizen of the world when he came to Maclay having lived in England and toured Europe. During his four years as a Marauder, he was active in a service club where he served as Vice-

President. He was also a member of the band and had a reputation of being a 'super mechanic' since he was fascinated by automobiles and airplanes.

Dr. Knight is a native of Tallahassee. Both of his parents were graduates of FSU and sacrificed to give Byron a 'top-notch


education.' After graduating Maclay in 1977, Knight headed to the University of Michigan where he earned his Bachelor of Science degree in Mechanical Engineering. He later continued his education with a Masters in Mechanical Engineering from North Carolina State University in 1990, and a Doctorate of Philosophy in Mechanical Engineering from the University of Florida in 2000.

Knight began his career in 1982 with the Harris Corporation developing ground-based and space borne antenna systems, and then with Lockheed Corporation as a National Aeronautics Space Agency (NASA) space shuttle thermal protection systems engineer for the Shuttle Atlantis. From 1986 to 1988, he worked for the Unisys Corporation as the division mechanical engineer developing signals intelligence hardware systems for the Department of Defense.

Dr. Byron F. Knight is currently a United States Department of Defense Intelligence Senior Leader and serves as the Chief Scientist in the Advanced Systems and Technology Directorate at the National Reconnaissance in Chantilly, Virginia. In this capacity, he is responsible for developing research technologies for space and ground reconnaissance systems. His leadership, vision, and technical expertise helps guarantee that the U.S, will continue, its space dominance, providing an unblinking eye of vigilance over the United States and its armed forces around the world.

Additionally, Dr. Knight is also an active member of the community, offering his time and expertise as a volunteer teacher, tutor, and even science fair judge at various educational events. He has spoken to ROTC and Military Academy cadets promoting the 6-week NRO internship program and volunteers with the American Heritage Girls Organization and Wreaths Across American program.

Knight is the first Distinguished Alum to be nominated by a group of his classmates – the Class of 1977 – demonstrating the immense respect and admiration they feel towards their fellow Marauder and all his accomplishments since leaving Maclay.

Weight Room Enhancements

The Weight Room is a resource to all students in Middle and Upper School and is used consistently year-round by classes, individual athletes, and for team training. Funds contributed this year provided support to add new equipment to the weight room, which increased both the safety standards and usability of this essential facility on campus.

Baseball Facility Improvements

Contributions made significant upgrades possible to the baseball facilities on campus. The addition of new crimson stone and other field upgrades including two new batting machines were immediately utilized during fall baseball training for all athletes in the program.

CAE Collaborative Learning and Study Spaces

The Center for Academic Excellence has added collaborative spaces for studying and group work that are being utilized by students in all Divisions. These spaces provide an opportunity for students to work independently, or to gather and collaborate in a small to mid-sized group environment.

Enrichment Opportunities

Enrichment Opportunities were expanded through the Center for Academic Excellence for students in all Divisions. *Math@Maclay* enrichment has continued to expand with a new format and a position was added within the Center to lead and grow these initiatives. Support for academic competition teams in grades 5th – 8th was also enhanced through this generous funding. The iTHINKERS program was launched to serve Lower School students in 2nd – 4th grades with extension activities and new curriculum.

Professional Development

The collective generosity of the Maclay Fund continued to support essential Professional Development opportunities for faculty. Faculty members in all three Divisions were able to attend Professional Development specific to the work they do in the classrooms, bringing back many new ideas and cutting edge practices for the over 1,100 students on campus.

Curriculum Extension

The Biomedical Concentration benefitted from further expansion with the addition of another year of the Project Lead the Way curriculum. In addition to *Principles of Biomedical Science*, students are now able to take a yearlong course in *Human Body Systems*. For the next two years, additional courses will be added for students to pursue their interests and passions in the Biomedical Sciences.

Middle School Service-Learning

The Middle School has adapted a Service-Learning component at all grade levels. This faculty-developed initiative brought the whole middle school together to engage in a service-learning day supporting the Tallahassee community through various projects.

Middle School Experiential Learning

The Middle School's focus on experiential learning has been longstanding with the tradition of the 7th grade Washington, D.C. trip and now has expanded with the Civil Rights Trip that was added in the Spring of 2023. This experience provides a journey through history that left a positive mark on everyone involved.

Flexibility & Innovation

Each year, the Maclay Fund provides the school with essential fiscal flexibility, allowing for a nimble response to challenges and opportunities that arise. It also provides funding for continual improvement of campus resources including new active learning furnishings in classrooms and the addition of new spaces for learning and collaboration such as the new classrooms that were created on campus for this school year.

College Counseling

The College Counseling journey is a signature component of the Maclay experience and the addition of staff and resources in the College Counseling Office is ensuring up-to-date and personalized guidance for Upper School students and families through the college process.

Robotics Expansion

Building on the robotics program expansion that was initiated through Maclay Fund support in years past, the 2022-2023 school year was the first year that a robotics competition team was developed specifically for the Middle School.

Pre-K Playground

Through the generosity of Giving Day, the Pre-K added several pieces of upgraded equipment to the playground including a new climbing structure and a variety of pieces of multipurpose imaginative equipment.

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CAPITAL PROJECT UPDATE



2024 promises to be an exciting year for Maclay's ever growing campus. The largest classroom expansion that the institution has seen in recent years will be put into motion with construction planned to break ground in June of 2024 on a new Math & Aquatics facility which will expand the school's academic and athletics footprint with the following additions:

- Swim Locker Rooms & Coaches Offices
- Dryland & Multipurpose Facility
- 6 Classroom Spaces
- A.I. & Technology Lab
- Additional administrative offices for the expanded College Counseling and Upper School administrative department

At the same time, earthwork and initial stormwater steps will begin for the Athletics Master Plan Improvements on the North Side of Campus. These will lay the groundwork for the new performance field and track, stands, gathering spaces, and expanded training and performance facilities for all athletes.





The Math and Aquatic Expansion will be added as an addition to the Beck Family Innovation Center and will provide spaces that will match the ambitions of our students and faculty, both in the classroom, lab, in the pool, and on the track and field.
