

Migrant Education Program

The Washington State Migrant Education Program (MEP) is federally funded and managed by the Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI).

The goal of the Migrant Education Program is to ensure high-quality education programs and supplemental support services so that all migrant students reach challenging academic standards and graduate with a high school diploma (or complete an HSED) that prepares them for responsible citizenship, further learning, and productive employment.

Migratory families, who engage in agricultural or fishing work, often have trouble receiving continuous, high-quality educational services because of their high rate of mobility, cultural and language barriers, social isolation, health-related problems, disruption of their children's education, and the lack of resources in the areas in which they live and work.

Identifying and recruiting eligible migratory children quickly and efficiently is the foundation of a robust Migrant Education Program (MEP). Before migratory children can be served, however, they must be identified and enrolled in the MEP.
