BIG IDEAS:

- 1. Student talk is the primer for the writing
- 2. Peer mentorship/support are the conduits for enhancing language skills, points of view, and integrating new ideas
- 3. Novel tools/gamelike strategies can increase the fun/engagement in language production with less risk

ONE SOLUTION:

-Peer collaboration in storytelling gives students opportunities for "play, imagination, wonder, and freedom" (Muhammad, 2023, p. 160)

Students working together to create a story appealed to me because:

- 1) Students NEED to be talking
- 2) Student voice/choice values student identity
- 3) Collaborative literacy is culturally sustaining pedagogy and a historically relevant literacy framework

SETTING THE STAGE FOR STUDENT WRITING:

It is Magic!

Invisible thoughts in your mind

Travel from your brain down, down

Story Starters...





- Spin the <u>physical character/setting wheel</u>
 (younger students) What other ways could you use spinners
 for writing in your classroom? **Try making your own**
- Spin the digital character/setting wheels (older students)
- Generate a story starter <u>list</u> with the class

These are scaffolds to use as needed to support creative thinking. They are not necessary to use in all cases.
