Marshall Curriculum AP Capstone comes to Marshall

The 2017 -2018 School Year introduces a new series of Advanced Placement (AP) classes to the Marshall Fundamental campus. This year begins AP Seminar (2017/18) coupled with AP Research starting next fall (2018/19). Each course meets a portion of the requirements students need to attain an AP Capstone Diploma™ or the AP Seminar and Research Certificate™. Ms. Sandra Rizzo, Assistant Principal of Curriculum states, "This program allows us the opportunity to expand our Advanced Placement (AP) courses for students who are nicely progressing on the AP track." The AP Capstone and AP Research are open to all students who meet enrollment requirements as Marshall recognizes the importance of equity and access in education for students as a necessary element in reducing the achievement gap. According the College Board the AP Capstone Program is one more stepping stone to immerse students in the practice of critical skills needed to distinguish themselves in college and in life.

The College Board conveys it best, as in-

dicated below.

How AP Capstone Works. The College Board's AP Capstone is an innovative college-level program based on two new courses — AP Seminar and AP Research - that complement and enhance discipline-specific AP® courses. The program provides students with an opportunity to engage in challenging scholarly practice of the core academic skills necessary for successful college completion. The ability to think independently, write effectively, research, collaborate, and learn across disciplines is essential for success in college, career, and beyond. Students who earn scores of 3 or higher in AP Seminar and AP Research and on four additional AP Exams of their choosing will receive the AP Capstone Diploma™. This signifies their outstanding academic achievement and attainment of college-level academic and research skills. Students who earn scores of 3 or higher in both AP Seminar and AP Research but not on four additional AP Exams will receive the AP Seminar and Research Certificate™. AP Capstone was developed in response to feedback from higher education and is easily implemented, affordable, and flexible. It has the potential to differentiate and transform high schools and their students by elevating the learning environment through a challenging, college-level program with high standards of assessment.

According to Joshua Tornek, Marshall Fundamental Social Studies Chairperson and AP Capstone instructor, "The Capstone Seminar class is designed for students who are up to the challenge of AP coursework, and seek to tie together many of the learning experiences from individual classes. The historical topics of the Cold War and the African - American Civil Rights Movement are being used to explore themes of power and democracy in the modern world.

Students in AP Seminar will be researching and presenting in groups and individually, based on guidelines set forth by the College Board. Many of the scored requirements for this course are graded by the College Board, not at Marshall.

The opportunities to achieve significant improvement in math during the 2017 -18 school year are exciting.

As we head into the 2017-18 school year, we do so with four new math teachers and new middle school and high school curriculum. These additions to the Marshall Math program will assist continued positive trends in our math success.

Vickie Mach (Math 3 and Calculus), Jason Fukao (Math 1 and statistics), James Schurman (Math 8 and Math 8 Honors), and Avo Ovakimyan (Math

7) are new to Marshall. They bring a new energy and ideas that are contagious. Make sure you stop by and welcome them to Marshall.

The new middle school curriculum Curriculum is Associates' Ready Math. This highly rated program is aligned to common core state standards (CCSS) and includes both teacher and student support features. One of these features is the iReady component. iReady is an online tool that includes a diagnostic component

identify math needs for each student. Also, iReady enables teacher lead instruction and meaningful student instruction and practice.

In high school, we are implementing the Carnegie Learning curriculum for Math 1, Math 2, and Math 3 (including honors courses). We are looking forward to the education resources provided by this curriculum. The student resources provide the assistance needed by our students: definitions, explanations, and examples. Also included is

the supporting online program called Mathia. This program allows teachers and students to move forward with both support and accountability. We will also continue to use ALEKS to support our students as they reach their math potential.

As always, we can not reach our goals without the support of our Marshall families. Your feedback and observations are an important part of our continual improvement. We look forward to your opinions on the implementation of the new curriculum.

Engage with the curriculum, talk with your teacher, and support our students. It is the collaboration between families, students, teachers, and administration that will ensure our collective success.



Last spring, I was selected from a panel of Marshall parents to represent. Marshall Fundamental in Sacramento, California at Boys State's annual summer meeting. It was all the toughest baseball and football players, Stanford and Harvard commits, model United Nation students. volunteers who worked with Barack Obama, National speech debaters, heads of their own non-profits, scientific researchers. writers, leaders, and coders all into one place; the State Capitol for seven days. For these seven days, we were not only citizens; we be-



came lawyers, governors, city councilmen, county chairs, voters, non-voters, and represented every bit of California's government that implemented into every big and small action. Legion set up a mock government of California and students were encouraged to actively participate. Forums were held on topics like taxation on corporations/business, free speech at Berkeley, if hate speech was free speech, US foreign policy, and immigration. These were my favorite moments during the stay. I was assigned citizenship in the City of Bidwell (or Litwell, to us citizens) and aimed high. I attempted to go for the position of Governor, but lost in an impromptu election proposed by our county. I ran for Superintendent of Public Instruction of California and gave a speech focused on nationalizing



private schools and getting rid of the Common Core.

* I lost. But luckily, I found a job as Staff Attorney for one of the Supreme Court Justices, introducing me to law and cases presented by student lawyers. The experience was, to be honest, life altering. Thank you for this wonderful opportunity.

On a side note, I want this program to be more recognized among Marshall students in order to create healthy competition to strive in school and outside of school. If anything, I would love to interview next year's students.

2017 Graduation Acceptances

Marshall Fundamental Graduating Class of 2017.

There were 247 candidates for graduation. 138 completed with a GPA greater than 3.0; 76 finished with a GPA greater than 3.5; and 31 had a GPA greater than 4.0. 95% enrolled in 43 different college/universities. 91 earned Athletic Varsity Letters while maintaining a 3.3 GPA and 35% actively participated in Visual and Performing Arts. There were 1106 AP Exams administered. They collectively completed 19,000 Community Service Hours. Four students have beat the odds graduating while in the foster care system. Four overcame significant physical and learning disabilities receiving their Certificates of Completion. We had four National Merit Commended Scholars, one National Merit Finalist, one National Merit Scholar, and three students joined the Armed Services.

2017 Awards include: US News & World Report, the Washington Post, the California Business for Education Excellence, and the National Association of Secondary School Principals have named Marshall one of the top schools in the nation.

The Class of 2017 gives our future hope; they are going to make our world a better place.
