# DLS Scheduling Steps 2024

  - Parent sign off on projected schedule and student meets with counselor to review requested schedule

# DLS Scheduling 2024 Timeline



- FEB 19:** Online Course Requests Opens. Students review choices with teachers, counselors, and parents.
- FEB 23:** Online Course Requests Closes at midnight. Those not completed are placed on a waiting list.  
  
Completed AP Course Request Contract due to counselors.
- FEB 26:** Counselors begin to resolve any discrepancies.

# Graduation Requirements



## Senior Status:

No student can be considered a senior unless he can meet all of the graduation requirements within the regular school day and current school year. There are three criteria to determine graduation eligibility: 1) Number of credit hours earned, 2) Credit in requisite coursework and service as delineated, and 3) Passing semester grades in all courses. Students may not graduate early. Students will not be considered a graduate until all exams are completed and passed for credit (D- and higher).

# DLS Scheduling Finer Points 2024

- Juniors are required to take Speech & Communications and Creative Writing. Both of these courses are a semester each and are required unless a junior is enrolled in Advanced Placement English Language and Composition.
- Class of 2027 and beyond: students must have at least 0.5 credits of Technology as well as a Personal Finance course (also 0.5 credits).
- Class of 2025 and beyond: all students must have one year of Fine Arts courses.
- Freshman or sophomore students who request an elective will **not** be able to take PE due to scheduling limitations. However, freshmen will still be required to complete their PE/Health requirement before graduating.

1. Before completing this form, read the entire form and consult your counselor, parents, and the teacher(s) of the AP course(s). Be sure to read the course description(s) in the curriculum guide at <https://www.delasallehs.com/academics/curriculum>. Current teachers in related subjects are also great resources for assisting in identifying courses that are a good fit for your interests and abilities.

### IMPORTANT SCHOOL POLICY - PLEASE READ

AP courses are elective courses and each student's academic performance and potential are examined closely. AP students are required to take the end of course exam. The AP exam fee is \$98 per exam for the last test. A student may be permitted to take an AP exam if he originally requested the course during the requesting period (usually February), but was unable to be scheduled for the course due to a scheduling conflict. A student may be permitted to take an AP exam if the course is not offered at DLS and he has demonstrated a propensity as determined by the assistant principal to pass the exam based upon his academic performance at DLS. In either case (scheduling conflict or course not offered), a written request for an exception to policy to take an AP exam must be made by the student and parent to the department chairperson no later than October 30<sup>th</sup> of that particular school year. The department chairperson and assistant principal will then make the final determination and advise the student. If approved, the student shall submit a non-refundable check payable to De La Salle Collegiate High School for the fee(s) associated with taking the exam(s). In order to promote academic learning and diligence, schedule changes will not be considered if the student is passing with a "C-" or higher. If a schedule change is approved, the student's current grade in the class will be transferred to the gaining class to ensure accountability, accuracy, and equity. Credit is earned at the completion of a course, no partial credit is awarded for a course. A student who withdraws from a course will not receive any credit for that course and the withdrawal will show on the student's transcripts.

2. Meet, individually, with each advanced placement teacher to review the course expectations, workload, and possible summer requirements. For each AP course you are interested in scheduling, write the name of the course in the request box and be sure to have the teacher complete the rest of the request box.

# Steps to Request Courses



**NOTE:** The 'units' will designate a full year (4) or half year (2) course

**NOTE:** Theology Courses have been pre-selected for each student

**NOTE:** Alternative class requests are encouraged but not required

1. Logon to either a Student or Parent Infinite Campus account
2. Click on More on left panel
3. Click on Course Registration
4. Click on Course Registration Enrollment for 24-25 De La Salle Collegiate
5. To Add a course, click on Add Course at bottom of screen
6. Search courses by name or number (noted on summary matrix document)
7. Click on + to add course as Request or Alternate
8. When ALL courses have been requested, click on Print at bottom of screen.

## Steps to Request Courses (continued)



Each student must ***print off*** the course requests summary page.

A parent is required to **sign and date** the form to be turned into the Counseling Office by Monday, February 26 so that counselors can start facilitating the schedule for next year.

## Course Change Requests are Limited

After the course request and verification processes are completed, all course request selections are considered **final and cannot be changed.**

The final decision for course offerings, student placement, and course changes rest with the school administration. Student schedules are considered final for the entire year once the master schedule is complete and the schedules published.

# Course Change Requests are Limited



The course selection process gives many opportunities for the student and parents to seek professional advice. Schedule changes are significant for the student, the class to which he moves, and for the teacher who gains a student who is not academically in the same place as the rest of the class.

*DLS builds the schedule for what was originally requested.*

**Hence, there are no schedule changes except during the second week of each semester.**
