### **IPM** statement

It is the goal of San Pasqual Union School District to implement IPM by focusing on long-term prevention or suppression of pests through accurate pest identification, by frequent monitoring for pest presence, by applying appropriate action levels, and by making the habitat less conducive to pests using sanitation and mechanical and physical controls. Pesticides that are effective will be used in a manner that minimizes risks to people, property, and the environment, and only after other options have been shown ineffective.

Our pest management objectives are to: (Example: Focus on long-term pest prevention)

Comply with the directives of the California Dept. of Pesticide Regulation as well as work within our SPUSD school policies to focus on long-term
Pest prevention. Using an outside service to eliminate gophers, rats, mice, ants as well as Grounds and Maintenance staff to control all other pests. We will provide a safe and pest-free environment for our students and staff.

## Pest management contracting
