A Note from Superintendent Wayne Kazmierczak



I've recently had the opportunity to experience the important work being done at our Senior Center.

In December, I enjoyed hanging out at Normandy for the Holiday Meal. After helping to distribute meals to the first round of guests I sat down for a quick meal of my own. With the chatter happening at my table, and at tables around me, it was clear that those who were there were enjoying the nourishment of food and fellowship. Some tables were filled with large groups of long-time comrades. Others were occupied with community members who sat down as strangers and left the table as friends - long after their meal was finished, and with promises to meet up to continue the conversation. The excitement of sharing a meal and the connections being made were heartwarming to witness.

At other times, the chatter around the table has been a bit more subdued - but the conversations are just as important. This was true of a Senior Center Fraud Prevention presentation, which took place last spring and came to fruition more recently for one of our event attendees. Noting that the situation her friend was describing seemed "not right," and was a lot like the questionable scenarios with false urgency described by the White Bear Lake Police Department at the presentation, one of our seniors was able to help her friend avoid a scam that would have had dire financial consequences.

These conversations and connections make me incredibly proud of our Senior Center offerings. Staff members put together programs that fill important needs and community members excitedly come together to engage and learn alongside one another.



CRIBBAGE TIDBITS

Cribbage was invented by Sir John Suckling, a Cavalier poet. In the 1630s Suckling, a famous courtier and gambler, altered the earlier game of noddy by inventing the crib.

Brought to America by English settlers, it became popular in the colonies, especially in New England. Requiring only two players, it was readily adopted by fishermen as a way to pass the time.

It alswo became popular with sailors and was a common pastime in the navy during World War II, especially among American submariners patrolling for Japanese ships.

- The cribbage board predates cribbage and was used for scoring other games, such as whist. (a similar board was even found in an Egyptian pyramid.)
- The pegs for scoring are also known as spilikins
- Cribbage is immortalized in Charles Dickens' The Old Curiosity Shop"
- Every March, the World's Largest Cribbage Tournament attracts 600-700 players



Why we collect old eye glasses and where they go

For 80 years, Lions Clubs have collected old, unwanted eyeglasses for redistribution to developing countries. The Minnesota Lions have collected more than 12 million pairs of eyeglasses for distribution.

After collection, the Wisconsin Lions Foundation, a regional facility, volunteers clean, repair, and classify the glasses by prescription. They are then ready for medical mission work.

Glasses are sent to emerging countries that lack the resources to manufacture quality lenses. The cost new glasses is far beyond the means of the average citizen and exams can cost a month's wages and be 50 miles away. The donationed glasses are given away for free and cost fewer than 8 cents a piece for the Lions to process.
