**Regular Board Meeting**

**1. Opening procedures**

- 1.1 Call to Order – Chairman Runge called the regular meeting to order at 7:04 p.m.
- 1.2 Loseke led the Pledge of Allegiance.
- 1.3 Open Meeting Act – Chairman Runge noted the meeting would follow the open meeting act.
- 1.4 Verification of Publication and Notification – The agenda was posted in all school buildings and the meeting noticed was published in The Columbus Telegram.
- 1.5 Roll Call – All members were present.
- 1.6 Excuse Board Member Absence – There were no board members absent.

**2. Approval of Agenda** – It was moved by Jaixen and seconded by Sprunk to approve the agenda as presented. On roll call vote, 6-0. Motion carried.

**3. Staff/Student Presentations** –FBLA report given by Jacob Sprunk. Student Council report was given by Kelli Schoch. FFA report given by Ethan Vinson. Joe Haschke, science teacher, and Aaron Chin, did a presentation on the new 3-D Printer in the science room. They talked about the software program used and the process to create the 3-D items. The printer was in progress of creating an item. Several completed items were presented to review. This is an exciting STEM addition to the science curriculum.

**6. Action Items**

- 6.1 Consent Agenda – Jaixen requested a further explanation on the Kohl Construction bill in the amount of \$2,936.70. This was for the work of getting the boring samples and sending them in for analysis. It was moved by Schreiber and seconded by Jaixen to approve the consent agenda as presented. On roll call vote, 6-0. Motion carried.
- 6.2 Approval of Resignations – It was moved by Pabian and seconded by Sprunk to approve the resignation of Zach Dush as Part-Time custodian @ Shell Creek. On roll call vote, 6-0. Motion carried.
- 6.3 Approval of New Hires – None.

6.4 Approval of Nebraska State Science Standards – The State Board of Education has adopted new state science standards. Mr. Witt provided a brief report and a handout titled; NE-CCRS-Science: An Overview for Principals. (College and Career Ready Standards) This was a general overview of the key instructional and conceptual shifts required to achieve these standards. The major difference between NE-CCRS-S and previous science standards is 3-D learning. 3-D learning refers to the thoughtful and deliberate integration of three distinct dimensions: Scientific and Engineering Practices (SEPs), Disciplinary Core Ideas (DCIs), and Crosscutting Concepts (CCCs). This is a big change and shift to increase problem solving and the ability to take factors learned and put them to work. There is a 3-year plan to implement the new standards. Discussion was held. The Board has tabled the approval and requested further information at the next board meeting.

#### 6.5 District Project Updates/Purchases

6.51 Well Update: The state has given final approval to blend the new well with the recently repaired well. A new control system is ordered and Sargent will install it. The current well runs for 10 seconds, then the new well joins in and blends water until the supply is met. The new well water will continue to be tested and once it passes the test for four consecutive quarters, the controls can be reconfigured. This project is completed.

6.52 Septic System Update: Due to the change order, the cost has moved to \$302,616 (original cost of \$117,500, therefore an increase of \$185,161). The lagoon project had an original cost of \$175,000 and with change order of rip-wrap, increased to \$235,000. The board had questions and requested further information. Dr. Plas presented the answers and information – see attached. After lengthy discussion the board decided:

- 1) Lakeview will stay with Zwingman as the engineer and have him do the redesign on the lagoon: take the rip-wrap out and change the slopes.
- 2) Put the lagoon project out for bids
- 3) Have school attorney review the Kohl Construction contract.

6.53 Potential Summer Project: Potential Projects for each of the three buildings will be reviewed at the January meeting. The board will do building tours before the regular meeting on January 8, 2018.

Attachment for 6.52 Septic System/Lagoon Project:

1. Is there another location for the septic system?
  - a. With set-back requirements from the wells and houses, probably not. The only potential area would be north of the softball field but that area is too small for the current design.
2. Are we out of compliance?
  - a. We are out of compliance but we are not under administrative order. Since we already submitted plans if we do not continue there is a very good chance we will get evaluated soon. He guesses if we did nothing it could buy us a year prior to going under administrative order. We would then have a year or two to complete the project. Basically, we don't do it now we will most likely be forced to do it within 2-3 years.
3. Can we check into the rip wrap appeal if we are not moving forward currently?
  - a. Yes, John began checking into it immediately. The following was received in an email from Zwingman on 12/4 –
    1. I got an email back from NDEQ, there is a decent possibility that we could get the rip wrap waived. We will have to prove how maintenance and protection of the slopes will be handled. This may include going to a flatter slope on the inside to help prevent sluffing off of the soils, the flatter slopes will increase the earthwork cost, but will still be cheaper than rip wrap.
    - b. In order to get the rip wrap removed ACES would need to do a re-design AND it would have to be approved by the state of Nebraska. This will take 1-2 months for those two items to happen. The outlook seems pretty good it would be approved, but there are no guarantees.
4. Do we need to haul in clay for the liner of the lagoon? Or is there a chance this could happen once construction begins?
  - a. The current bid calls for 1 foot of clay liner. That is built into the \$235,000 cost. The reason the dirt hauling for the septic system got so expensive beyond the sheer volume was the requirement by the state on the classification of the dirt for the leach field. He felt that if there was a change order on clay (he didn't anticipate it) it would not have nearly as large of a financial impact because clay is a lot easier to obtain.
5. Can we use recycled concrete instead of rip wrap?
  - a. Yes and no! Yes, we can use recycled concrete as long as it is without metal. Finding crushed concrete that is free of metal to meet the requirements is hard to do. Sometimes you get lucky and a concrete supply becomes available in which this becomes a good option, but if you don't it can get expensive to find.
6. Are we eligible for EQUIP money? If so, will it add to the cost or regulatory requirements?
  - a. Zwingman reported on 12/7 that it does not sound like we are eligible for EQUIP as a public entity.

Some options for us to consider or discuss:

- Continue with the Septic System project for the proposed \$302,616
- Go back to the Lagoon project for the bid price of \$235,000
- Go back to the Lagoon project and attempt to remove rip wrap knowing it is not a guarantee
- Re-bid one or both projects
- Negotiate with Kohl's Construction on the lagoon project
- Hire a new engineer and start the process over

Lakeview Jr-Sr High School

1. Lakeview Student Problem Solvers program- Through our connection with the Business Industry and Education Committee with the Chamber, Lakeview piloted a program called the "Student Problem Solvers Program" this year. We partnered with ADM, Pinnacle Bank, Cornhusker Public Power and Behlen's. The businesses presented a problem in which they are currently facing to our 12<sup>th</sup> grade students. The students researched the businesses, did some on site tours to better understand the problem and then began brainstorming possible solutions to the problem. Mrs. Blaser and Mr. Roth's Government classes set aside time throughout 1<sup>st</sup> semester to work on the "Student Problem Solvers Program." Last Tuesday Nov 28<sup>th</sup>, 9 student groups presented their solutions to the businesses here in the Lakeview media center. The students had some good ideas and there was good dialogue between the students and the business leaders. 2. 3D Printer Technology- Tonight, Mr. Haschke and some of our Principles of Tech students and Science Research students will be demonstrating how they are using the 3D printer technology.
3. JH HAL program will run through the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter. Students who qualify may sign up to be a part of one of the following programs: 1. National History Day 2. Junior Science Academy 3. Math Counts
4. January 29<sup>th</sup> Academic Career Fair- We are beginning to make arrangements for the annual Lakeview Academic Career fair which is hosted on the same night as Parent Teacher Conferences on January 29<sup>th</sup>.

- **Student Council Food Drive**
  - Students at Shell Creek brought in over 1,130 canned food items over the week of November 13th. Student Council members delivered the food items to the Simon House and Rescue Mission.
  - Platte Center Student Council will have their annual Food Drive from Dec 11-Dec 15. Items collected will be donated to the Platte County Food Bank.
- **Christmas Programs**
  - 5-8th grade band students will have their Christmas Concert on December 18th, 2017 at 7:00 PM. Students have been attending rehearsals at Lakeview throughout December.
  - K-3rd grade students will have their Christmas Concert on December 19th, 2017 at 7:00 PM. Doors will open at 5:45 PM. Because of the increase in attendance at the concert, saving seats will NOT be allowed. Students will be seated outside of the gym to alleviate overcrowding issues.
- **DIBELS Testing**
  - K-6 students were tested the week of December 4th. Staff will review data and make decisions on how to best serve students in workshop/intervention groups. Progress Monitoring occurs every two weeks for students in need.
- **MAP Data**
  - Between Nov. 6th and Nov. 21st, students in grades 3-8 completed their Fall MAP test.
  - All 3-8 students were tested in Reading, Math, and Language Arts. Additionally, students in 4th, 5th, 7th, and 8th took the Science test.
  - Principals are posting the top 5 scores in each subject and grade level.
  - Results were sent home to parents on Dec. 8th.
- **PC Gingerbread Houses**
  - On December 15, the PC Kindergarten and 1st grade will host their grandparents for lunch, gingerbread house building, and Holiday Bingo.
- **SC Blood Drive on January 2nd**

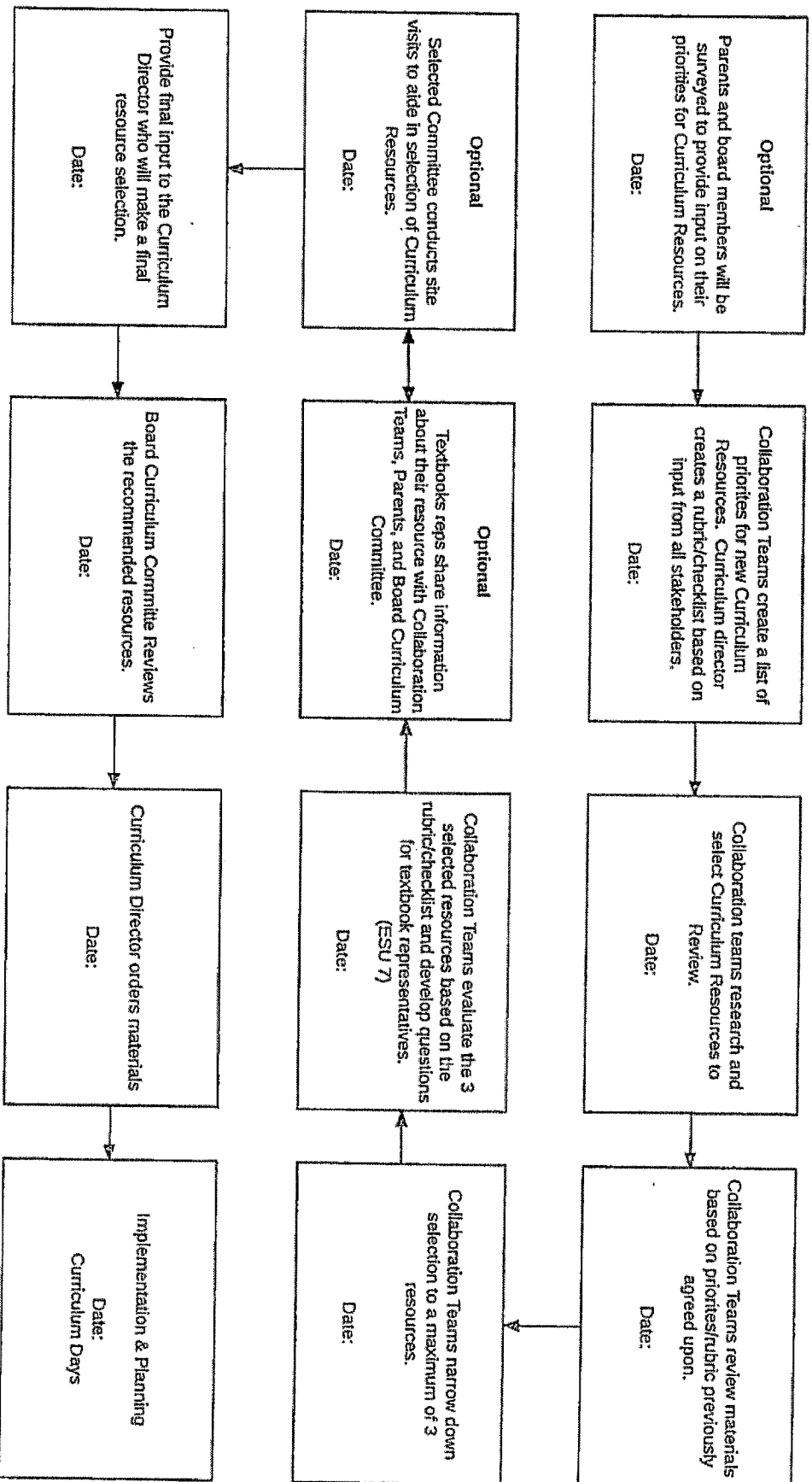
