

Built on the Foundation of Self Reliance

Our founder Thomas E. Cahill was born on May 27, 1828 to immigrant parents. Although he possessed promising academic potential, Cahill was not able to continue his formal education past the 6th grade level. Times were tough, and Cahill's family needed him to work to help make ends meet.

Demonstrating a remarkable entrepreneurial spirit, Cahill would go on to found several small businesses, eventually establishing the Knickerbocker Coal & Ice Company. With self-reliance, determination, and personal commitment, Cahill's hard work eventually paid off. He and his wife, Sophia, became exceedingly prosperous.

After his death at the age of 50, Thomas Cahill bequeathed his entire fortune for the establishment and endowment of The Roman Catholic High School of Philadelphia. It was Cahill's belief that a strong, values-based, secondary education was essential to forming young men capable of protecting and expanding the freedoms enjoyed in this land. As Thomas and Sophia were not blessed with children, students of Roman Catholic have always been known as "Cahillites" – that is, Sons of Cahill.
