

- District is grateful for overall progress made and will continue to use assessment data and programming results to improve academic programming










2023 Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony



Investment in New Classroom Technology Supports Student Learning




The new Promethean Boards provide students a new and interactive way to learn in the classroom.

As part of the district's commitment to providing our students excellent educational programming and in support of the targeted instruction delivered by our dedicated teachers and staff, the Brooklyn City Schools recently invested in an innovative classroom technology that has generated excitement from students and educators alike. Multiple classrooms across the district campus are now utilizing new Promethean Interactive TVs and Smart Notebook software to provide instruction that is interactive and generates increased student engagement.

"The Promethean Interactive TVs and Smart Notebook software bring a high definition, **engaging experience to the classroom,"** shares Dave Wallis, Director of Systems and Instructional Technology. "I'm glad we were able to outfit ten classrooms this school year to support our amazing staff and students."

Brooklyn's second grade teachers and students have experienced first-hand the many benefits provided by the new classroom technology. For instructional purposes, the teachers utilize the whiteboard app and split screen feature which allows more than one student to be working at a time. The ability to move the board around the room and adjust to different heights provides students the capability to annotate reading passages and pages from the Envision Math program. "The new Promethean board is fantastic for my math lessons," shares second grade teacher Nora Trimmer. "I am able to engage students by lowering the board to their eye level."

These and other investments in classroom learning technology are one of many ways the Brooklyn City Schools are providing our students resources to help them achieve success in the classroom and beyond.

Community Update on Master Facility Plan and Potential Renovation Projects

Through our district strategic plan, Vision 2030, the Board of Education adopted an updated Master Facility Plan in August 2023. This plan outlines a roadmap for updating the infrastructure of our District campus, including specific renovations targeted at the Brooklyn High School Campus, Board of Education Office, and the Hurricane Alley Stadium Athletic Complex.

At the October 17th Board of Education meeting, members of the Brooklyn Board of Education, by a majority vote of 5-0, approved the placement of a Bond Issue, in the amount of \$20,000,000, on the March 19, 2024, ballot for the public's consideration. If approved, funds generated by the Bond Issue would be used to address necessary renovations for the Brooklyn High School Campus, Board of Education Office, and Stadium Complex located at Hurricane Alley. More specifically, funds generated would be used to support proposed renovations:

- 1. Improved Security and Visual Enhancements at **Exterior Entrances**
- 2. Brooklyn Athletic Complex Enhanced Recreational and Competition Areas at Hurricane Alley
- 3. Community Walking Path at Hurricane Alley
- 4. Band and Choir Wing Renovation at Brooklyn HS Campus
- 5. Energy Efficient Initiatives Window Replacement at **Brooklyn HS Campus & Board Office**
- 6. Renovation of Brooklyn HS Campus Science Labs
- 7. Renovation of Auditorium
- 8. Renovation of Restrooms at Brooklyn High **School Campus**
- 9. Various Common Area Interior Improvements at Brooklyn High **School Campus**
- 10. Main Gymnasium Renovations at Brooklyn High School Campus
- 11. Renovations Associated with Converting the Existing Brooklyn Library to a District Facility

The Brooklyn City School District values your input, and consequently, will be hosting a series of community forums where school community members can provide feedback, share ideas, and actively understand the facts related to the master facility plan and proposed renovation process. Your perspective and insight regarding the District's facilities planning are essential as the District moves forward with the potential renovations being considered by the Board of Education.



Proposed upgrades include a visual renovation of the exterior entrance of the Board Office and Auditorium.



Infrastructure and safety upgrades are part of planned enhancements of the High School main entrance.



Renovated science labs will help Brooklyn students remain on the cutting edge of STEM skills needed in today's workforce.



Upgrades to bathrooms will include accessibility for individuals with disabilities.



Planned improvements to the Auditorium include installation of new seating and aisle lighting.

Brooklyn Arts and Innovation Academy Encourages Learning Outside the Classroom



National Junior Art Honor Society students recently explored *The Cleveland Museum of Art.*

"Mrs. Mack, do you think that this pitcher plant would work well in my story setting?" A recent field trip to the Cleveland Botanical Garden inspired many students in Mrs. Kathleen Mack's Gifted Language Arts class to develop their ideas of what a setting could be. In its second year, the Brooklyn Arts and Innovation Academy has expanded its programming to include field trips to various local destinations. In conjunction with learning occurring in the classroom, students can increase their knowledge of a novel, in the above example, *The Secret Garden*, while applying what they learned in their writing.

The introduction of new programming in the Brooklyn Arts and Innovation Academy is part of the five-year strategic vision of the Brooklyn City Schools under the leadership of Superintendent Dr. Caleris. Additional academic opportunities through the Academy include the grades 4-7 Math Olympiad competition, Power of the Pen writing team, and Honors Math and Language Arts classes starting in sixth grade.

The growth of Brooklyn's arts programming is also part of the strategic vision for the Arts and Innovation Academy. Under the leadership of Art instructor Joanne Becker, the National Junior Art Honor Society was formed. NJAHS provides 7th & 8th-grade visual artists with opportunities to explore personal artistic and creative passions while utilizing their talents in leadership and service within the community. New members are inducted in May of their 6th or 7th grade year. Members enjoy a fellowship with creative peers, view works of art and media demonstrations, and have time to work on independent projects.

Student selection is based on teacher recommendation and focuses on four criteria—artistic passion, art scholarship, artistic ability, and character. Although the society's activities are designed to be flexible and supportive of individual adolescent schedules, a student can maintain good standing as a member through effort, regular attendance, and active participation.

This year, the NJAHS has taken two field trips alongside the High School chapter, beginning with the Cleveland Museum of Art and followed by the Cleveland Institute of Art. Our Brooklyn students left the experience energized and excited about a greater awareness of future opportunities after graduation.
