Palmyra-Macedon Middle School teacher Teresa Gross received a huge surprise in September when she was presented with a Golden Apple Award recognizing excellence in the classroom from WROC-TV (Channel 8) anchor Lia Lando.

During the school year, the well-known TV anchor shows up at school districts throughout the Rochester-area to provide deserving educators with the award. This time, it was a Pal-Mac teacher receiving the honor.

As Lando entered the room with a photographer following closely behind, Gross was greeted by the smiling anchor presenting a plaque followed by a flurry of interview questions.

Gross, a literacy teacher for grades six through eight, has been teaching for 19 years with the last 16 years at Pal-Mac.

"I get to live and breathe my passion for literacy every day," stated Gross. "I am so fortunate to have a career that I love. Every day, I have the ability to support and encourage

my students' reading and writing lives."

Award winners are selected from submitted nominations. The nomination for Gross was submitted by her student, eighth grader Alyssa Miles. Miles has had Gross as a teacher since she was in seventh grade and has thoroughly enjoyed her time in class which includes a personal connection with Gross.

"Ms. Gross reminds me of my best friend and I am drawn to her great personality and her teaching style," said Miles.

"As a student, I never felt connected to the school community," added Gross. "I showed up, did what I had to do and went through the motions. My hope is that I can provide a different experience for my students. One where they feel connected to the school community in some way."

The impact of Gross is evident on her students including Alyssa Miles.

Pal-Mac Middle School is becoming a regular when it comes to recipients of the prestigious award. Last year, teacher Christy Alexander was presented with the Golden Apple Award.

SCHMANDT NAMED TOP ATHLETIC ADMINISTRATOR

Palmyra-Macedon Central School District Athletic Director Tom Schmandt has been awarded the New York State Athletic Administrators Association (NYSAAA) Chapter 5 Athletic Administrator of the Year.

Based on criteria outlined by NYSAAA, the award is presented annually to a chapter Athletic Administrator who is a member in good standing of the NYSAAA who has made an outstanding contribution to athletics over the years, and has shown evidence of dedication to athletics through the activities of the NYSAAA. The recipient should also have practiced and supported the positive values of "education based athletics" throughout his/her career.

Schmandt was selected by his peers from the nine leagues that make up approximately 125 schools in Chapter 5.

In his career spanning over two decades, Schmandt has been a fixture at Pal-Mac serving in a variety of roles including varsity football coach. For the past 11 years, Schmandt has led the Pal-Mac Athletic Department as Director of Physical Education, Athletics and Community Services. Other roles which he has worked in include physical education teacher and assistant principal at the middle school. Schmandt has also coached the baseball team.



In his role as Athletic Director, Schmandt excels in his ability to connect with students and the community at-large. The quality comes from his passion for athletics and appreciation of the role sports and extracurricular activities play in the development of students.

"Being connected with school and a team allows us to experience life and learn a multitude of lessons like winning, losing, resiliency, failure, disappointment, joy, discipline, work ethic, cooperation and collaboration along with many more.

FUTURE OF ATHLETIC FACILITIES DISCUSSED AT DECEMBER BOARD OF EDUCATION MEETING

The December Palmyra-Macedon Board of Education meeting featured an update on improvements to district athletic facilities from Deputy Superintendent Ralph Brongo.

At the meeting, the district finalized plans to proceed with construction of the new softball field approved by voters in 2017. The location of the field will be west of the high school parking lot, and artificial turf will be used for the infield only. The softball field is among work planned to be put out to bid this winter with construction anticipated to begin in 2020.

At a community forum in May, district leaders along with architects and fiscal advisors, shared eight conceptual designs for multi-purpose artificial turf fields of varying scope.

Based on input from the community and consultation with advisors, the Board of Education accepted the recommendation to consider artificial turf for the varsity baseball infield and a soccer/lacrosse field as part of the next facility improvement proposal.

The installation of artificial playing surfaces would allow district athletes as well as the community to better utilize facilities during adverse weather conditions, particularly the early spring months Brongo said.

As presented, the estimated cost

of the artificial turf project would be \$4.5 million and would be eligible for New York State Building Aid.

To help offset the local share of the multi-purpose soccer/lacrosse field, the district is working with the David Giordano Memorial Fund which is currently soliciting donations for the project. To donate, please visit www.racf.org/Giordano.

With the exception of the softball field, no final decisions have been made regarding the specific plan for athletic facilities. Any decision made would require Board of Education approval and voter approval (likely in December 2020).

Discussion also took place on ways to improve the use of underutilized land on the Hyde Parkway Campus. Approximately 28 of 82 acres (34%) at the Hyde Parkway Campus are not utilized or are underutilized at this time. Ideas discussed, which prioritize maintaining the beauty and integrity of the property, included adding hiking/mountain biking/cross country trails, outdoor instructional space, spectator seating, roadway and parking area(s) closer to athletic fields and improved site drainage. This topic will continue to be discussed moving forward with a goal of developing a plan that is utilitarian and cost effective.

DAVID GIORDANO MEMORIAL FUND ESTABLISHED

Family and friends have partnered with the Rochester Area Community Foundation to raise funds to support athletic facilities improvements

David Giordano was a beloved coach and educator in the Palmyra-Macedon Central School District who lost a courageous battle with brain cancer in the fall of 2018.

To honor his legacy, family and friends have partnered with the Rochester Area Community Foundation to create the David Giordano Memorial Fund.

A goal of the fund is to raise money to assist with upgrades to Pal-Mac's athletic facilities, and the creation of a multi-purpose turf surface. Funds raised will be donated to the district to help cover a portion of the local cost of a soccer/lacrosse artificial turf field.

On May 21, a community meeting was held at Pal-Mac Intermediate School where several designs of varying scope were presented. Following the meeting, the district consulted with architects and fiscal advisors to determine the best approach for athletic facilities improvements.

Based on input from the community and consultation with advisors, the district worked closely with the David Giordano Memorial Fund to determine the best next steps. It was agreed that a multi-purpose artificial turf field to support soccer and lacrosse would be pursued.

At this time, no final decisions have been made. The final plan will need approval by the Pal-Mac Board of Education before it is put to residents for a vote potentially in late 2020.

NEW BUS BEHAVIOR PROGRAM ROLLING OUT AT PAL-MAC

The Palmyra-Macedon Central School District is in the beginning stages of implementing a new model for school bus behavior to improve the overall transportation experience for students and drivers.

Led by Pal-Mac Intermediate School Principal Chris Barnard, the planning process began in early 2019 as a district-wide conversation about the need to better inform and teach students of behavior on school buses.

The process involved administrators across the district as well as direct input from bus drivers through a survey and meetings.

"Creating a set of guidelines for behavior on the school bus was extremely important to us as a district," Barnard said. "Instilling the importance of accepting responsibility and understanding one's actions will be beneficial to students not only while they are on the school bus, but

throughout the rest of their lives."

Using information collected during the feedback and planning process, a model was formulated which creates understandable guidelines of appropriate behavior when riding the bus. Behavioral expectations are outlined using familiar language, already utilized in district programs including the Primary Years Programme and International

Process For Weather-Related School Closures

With winter well underway, it is a great time to remind the Palmyra-Macedon community about the process for school closures due to inclement weather.

The safety of students and staff is always a top priority when making a decision regarding the closure of school. The decision to close school will be made based on factors outlined below:

- Road condition reports from transportation staff, town/highway personnel, meteorological experts and law enforcement agencies
- Amount of snow and ice accumulation
- Whether or not precipitation is continuing
- Building and parking lot conditions
- Temperature and wind chill
- Forecast predictions

Early dismissal may be necessary if weather conditions warrant, with a goal of ensuring students are home safely prior to conditions worsening.

The ultimate decision to close

school is that of the superintendent. The district will make every attempt to make weather-related decisions in a timely manner.

Once an announcement has been made to close school, the decision will be final.

Announcements regarding school closures will be sent out via the district messaging system, SchoolMessenger.

In addition to SchoolMessenger, a closure notice will be posted to district social media (Facebook, Instagram, Twitter) and to the district website, palmaccsd.org.

Local news outlets will be notified of the decision as well. Please see above for news outlets to monitor for closure-related information.

Parents/guardians are advised not to call the district regarding weather-related closures unless it is an emergency.

During the cold days of winter, it is important that children bundle up when outside for walks to the bus stop or to school. Warm clothing

- * ROAD CONDITION REPORTS
from transportation staff, town/highway personnel, meteorological experts and law enforcement agencies
- * AMOUNT OF SNOW AND ICE ACCUMULATION
- * WHETHER OR NOT PRECIPITATION IS CONTINUING
- * BUILDING AND PARKING LOT CONDITIONS
- * TEMPERATURE AND WIND CHILL
- * FORECAST PREDICTIONS

includes jackets, gloves, scarves and boots. If your family needs assistance in providing warm, suitable clothing, please contact the health office at your child's school.

The district does not take the decision to close school lightly and carefully examines each decision. Should parents/guardians feel conditions are unsafe, it is advised to exercise best judgement to decide if your student should attend school.

Driver Ed Program, DMV Permit Testing Offered At Pal-Mac

The Palmyra-Macedon Central School District offers a variety of programs to benefit students outside of the classroom, including two driving safety related courses at the high school.

The Driver and Traffic Safety Education Program (Driver Ed) and on-site New York State Department of Motor Vehicles permit testing at Pal-Mac High School allow students to learn skills to stay safe on the road and begin the process of acquiring a driver's license.

Driver Ed is offered in three different sessions throughout the year, fall, winter/spring and summer. Fall and winter/spring sessions occur after school and will require attendance beyond regular school day hours. The long running program has been implemented via a joint partnership between the New York State Department of Education and the NYS DMV. Driver Ed is intended to educate students (age 16 or older) on appropriate driving skills and habits as well as playing a responsible role on the highway transportation/safety system. Course highlights include 24 hours of classroom instruction and 24 hours of in-vehicle education (six required hours of driving per student).

The annual event serves as a fundraiser for the Select Choir and is always a highlight of the holiday season.



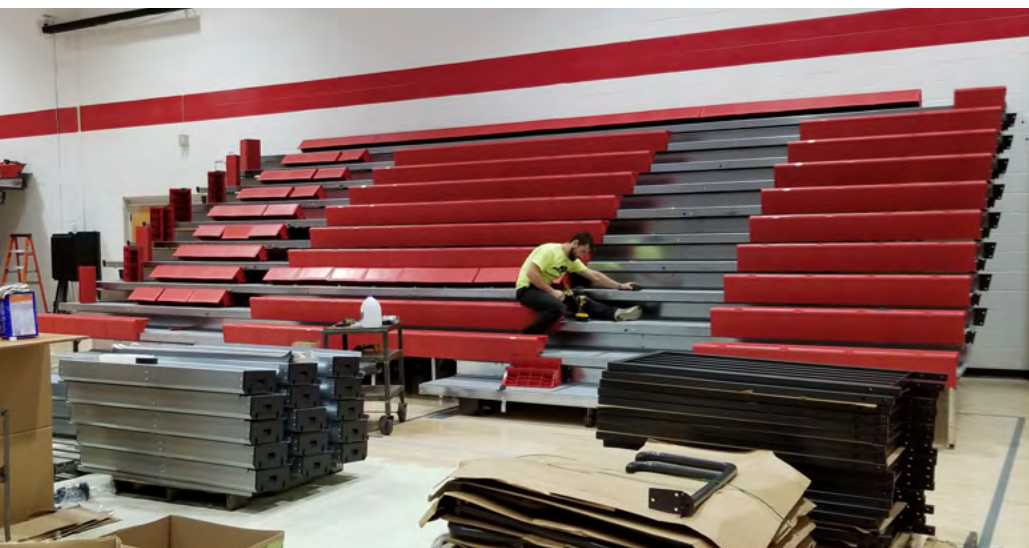
TURKEY CHASE AT PMI

Baccalaureate.

The rules, which are referred to as agreements, are being implemented across the district with a specific emphasis on program education in grades PK-5.

The new model emphasizes the importance of students accepting responsibility for actions which do not align with the agreements.

Should a student be cited for improper behavior, a form referred to as a Bus Agreement Reflection Form is then sent home with the student. The form provides the opportunity for both students and parents to understand what took place, how it impacted others and how to ensure the action is corrected in the future. Eventually, a shift from a paper form to a digital form to incorporate the blended learning experience will occur.

Agreements to be followed by riders include:

- I will sit in my seat with a calm and safe body.
- I will talk in a classroom level voice.
- I will follow adult directions the first time.
- I will use kind words.

the Driver Ed program receive the MV-285 Student Certificate of Completion. The certificate allows a Junior Permit holder to schedule a road test, a possible reduction in automobile insurance cost (participation is dependent upon insurance provider participation), and a 17-year-old to receive a senior license (MV-285 form must be submitted to local DMV office to attain this benefit).

Upon signing up, students will be placed on a waiting list. Space is limited for program slots, particularly in the fall and winter/spring sessions when only eight slots per session are available. Seniors are given first preference and the selection is then based on age from oldest to youngest. The selection process is non-negotiable and applicable to all students applying to take part in the program.

Pal-Mac also offers a unique program allowing students to take their learner permit test at the high school. The test consists of 20 questions online using a computer

in the athletic office. Testing is available on a bi-weekly basis. Should the student taking the test pass, a certificate of passage with a barcode will be provided to the student. The certificate is then presented at a local DMV office to prove passage of the test when applying for the permit.
