#### **Process For Weather-Related School Closures**

Monitor 13WHAM TV, Spectrum News, WROC TV 8, WHAM AM 1180, WVOR FM 100.5, WHEC TV 10, WACK AM 1420, WARM FM 101.3, ParentSquare and the district website for closure-related information

With the winter season underway, now is a great time to remind the Palmyra-Macedon community about the process for school closures due to inclement weather.

An early dismissal or school closure will apply to in-person and remote learners.

First and foremost, the safety of students and staff is always a top priority when making a decision regarding the closure of school. With safety as a guiding principle, the decision to close school will be made based on numerous factors outlined below:

- Road conditions reports from transportation staff, town/highway personnel, meteorological experts and law enforcement agencies
- Amount of snow and ice accumulation
- Whether or not precipitation is continuing
- Building and parking lot conditions
- Temperature and wind chill
- Forecast predictions

Early dismissal may be necessary if weather conditions warrant, with a goal of ensuring students are home safely prior to conditions worsening.

The ultimate decision to close school is that of the superintendent. The district will make every attempt to make weatherrelated decisions in a timely manner.

Once an announcement has been made to close school, the decision will be final.

Announcements regarding school closures will be sent out via our messaging system, ParentSquare. Contact information can be updated here: palmaccsd.org/contactupdate.

In addition to ParentSquare, a closure notice will be posted to district social media (Facebook, Instagram, Twitter) and the district website. Local news outlets will be notified of the decision as well. News outlets to monitor for closure-related information include 13WHAM TV, Spectrum News, WROC TV 8, WHAM AM 1180, WVOR FM 100.5, WHEC TV 10, WACK AM 1420 and WARM FM 101.3.

Parents/guardians are advised not to call the district regarding weather-related closures unless it is an emergency.

During the cold days of winter, it is important to remember to bundle up to prepare for being outside for walks to a bus The decision to close school will be made based on the following factors:

from transportation staff, town/highway personnel, meteorological experts and law enforcement agencies

- \*AMOUNT OF SNOW AND ICE ACCUMULATION
- \*WHETHER OR NOT PRECIPITATION IS CONTINUING
- \*BUILDING AND PARKING LOT CONDITIONS
- **\*TEMPERATURE AND WIND CHILL**
- **\*FORECAST PREDICTIONS**

stop or to school. Warm clothing includes jackets, gloves, scarves, and boots. If your family needs assistance in the provision of warm, suitable clothing, please contact the Health Office at your child's school.

The district does not take the decision to close school lightly and carefully examines each decision on a case by case basis. No perfect decision exists and should parents/guardians feel conditions are unsafe, it is advised to exercise best judgement to decide if your student should attend school.



Teams brought treats to first responders, did yard work at the Palmyra Community Center, and even played music for community members, among other acts.






## PAL-MAC CELEBRATES VETERANS DAY

## NEW SELECT CHOIR DIRECTOR LENDS HIS VOICE, ADVICE AS HE ADJUSTS TO ROLE

By now, the booming voices of the Pal-Mac High School Select Choir should be a familiar sound. But now, there is someone different leading the way.

The program's newest Choral Director, Adam Chandler, officially took over when Pal-Mac started its Spirit Week on Oct.3. He was hired back in August to fill the position left by former Director Kayla Osika, who left for another opportunity.

Chandler first directed the group during the singing of the National Anthem at the High School's Pep Rally, just four days after he started.

"It's been overwhelming, and not necessarily in a bad way," Chandler said. "It's just a lot of new things at one time."

Chandler comes to Pal-Mac with about seven years of teaching experience. His most recent stint was with the nearby Victor Central School District, where he taught choir at the Elementary School level. Before then, he spent several years teaching at the Middle and High School levels at the Vernon Verona Sherrill Central School District, his hometown. He was also the advisor for the VVS High School Drama Club, and the director for the VVS High School Musical.

He says he made the switch back to teaching High School because that's where his true passion lies. High School, after all, is where Chandler first really started singing in a choir, though his love for music goes back even further than that.

He sang in church choirs and was part of a regional community chorus. Chandler then turned his passion for singing into a passion for teaching. He graduated from The Crane School of Music at SUNY Potsdam with a Bachelor of Music in Music Education.

At his core, Chandler says he loves the



bonding aspect of a chorus over a more solo style of performance.

"There's a big group of people who love to do the same thing," Chandler said."That drew me and almost more than the music did."

Within just a few months at Pal-Mac Chandler's already made his mark. He's re-decorated the choir room with positive messaging on posters plastered throughout the room. He's also introduced some new team building games.

"[The students] have to know a little bit about each other to feel safe being so vulnerable and sharing something that is so deeply personal in front of other people," Chandler said. "Especially for the people that they just kind of know and are necessarily friends with, you know that puts you in a vulnerable position to be putting yourself out there as a high schooler."

Vulnerability is something Chandler says is helping him connect with the students, because he's felt vulnerable, too, especially

with switching schools.

He says he's made it a point to be an "open book" with his students, meaning he's not afraid to share his thoughts and feelings, but also being open to hearing how the group is feeling.

Chandler is also keeping an open book when it comes to helping shape the future of the High School's music program. He says the students, along with Band Director Deb Davis, have been key players in helping him catch up on the program's traditions, but also plan for new ideas.


"[They've been] Instrumental, if you will," Chandler said with a smile.

Two Pal-Mac Red Raider student athletes made history in the Fall, becoming the first two players to compete for two sports in the same season.

Seniors Mateo Sloan and Brett Rooks split time on the football field while also suiting up for the boys soccer, and golf teams respectively.

Sloan was the team's kicker and punter, while Rooks played several positions on all three phases of the game ranging from linebacker to fullback, as well as the team's long-snapper.

Both students didn't join the football team until this year. Sloan hadn't even played an organized game of football before this year.

"I kind of wanted to see that experience, you know?" Sloan said. "Just wanted to have fun with friends and all of that."

Rooks had tackle football experience, though he says he last played in a Pop Warner league.

"I figured I might as well do it my senior year," Rooks said.

Both Rooks and Sloan say they were encouraged by their friends, and even some coaches to join the football team.

"Basically everyone was all over me about it," Rooks said.

So why didn't they choose to take on the two-sport challenge sooner? Well, for starters, it wasn't even possible until recently.

Section V approved Dual-Participation for student-athletes in March 2020. The approval aligned with guidance from the New York State Public High School Athletic Association (NYSPHSAA), which a spokesperson says has allowed dual participants "for decades." The Finger Lakes High School Athletic Association, in which Pal-Mac competes, approved the move shortly after.

Pal-Mac adopted the policy in 2022, as Athletic Director Tom Schmandt said he first wanted to observe how the approach worked in other Districts before bringing it here.

The process is not as simple as telling coaches you're going to play for both teams. Per NYSPHSAA and Section V guidelines, a

student-athlete must meet the requirements for practice and game participation. Those requirements differ between a team sport like football or soccer and a more individually-focused sport like golf or swimming.

For team sports, players have to compete in at least six scheduled games, while individual athletes must compete in at least three games. Those scheduled games all must happen before the postseason.

For safety reasons, certain sports cannot be played at the same time.

Rooks and Sloan also met with Schmandt to get approval before moving forward.

"They are pioneers at Pal-Mac, at least in my tenure," Schmandt said. "It is difficult to do and both did it well."

On top of the state and local requirements, Schmandt said playing for two teams in one season is quite the time requirement for everyone involved.

"For me, it was easier to be a kicker just because I can go to football practice for like 30 minutes and kick a couple of times," Sloan said. "But if I had a football game I would miss [soccer] practice."

Rooks says he did not practice with the golf team in the Fall but did appear in most of their matches unless, of course, the match was on a Friday.

Athletics aside, Rooks and Sloan are both STUDENT-athletes, so on top of practices, they have to make sure they are hitting the books.

"I really didn't have many struggles with classroom stuff," Rooks said." I'm usually a pretty smart kid, I get my homework done in class. So that didn't really affect me."

Sloan added he was able to stay focused in class, though the time spent practicing and playing did cut into his ability to work.

Regardless, Sloan and Rooks said they have no regrets.
