

Arrival

Students should time their arrival at school between 8:15 and 8:30 if at all possible, unless eating breakfast which starts at 7:45. Students should enter only by the main doors and either go to the gym or to the playground . A sun on the column in the hallway means the students go to the playground, and the cloud means they should go to the gym. If the wind chill falls below –15 degrees, students will remain indoors in the gym where there is adequate supervision.

Students may not go to their classrooms before the $8:30\ \text{bell}$ since that is a time for the teachers to prepare for the day.

If students arrive after 8:35, they are counted tardy. Please check in at the office before going to your classroom. Children who are tardy for school miss the most important part of the day. Please make every effort to get your child to school on time. If a student arrives more than one hour after the starting time for the morning or afternoon session, he/she will be counted absent for that half-day.

Although the main doors to the school open at 7:30 AM, it is NOT in the child's best interest to be dropped off long before the school day is scheduled to begin. If they do arrive early they will go to the gym until the supervisor arrives.

Attendance

Attendance at school is of the utmost importance; children learn best when they are actively involved in the classroom. However, if your child is ill, it is in the best interest of the child and of the other children in the class that your child stays home. The Attendance Policy requires that letters of concern be sent out after every 5th absence. After the 15th absence or tardy, a parent meeting will be set up to develop a plan to improve attendance. If the 20th absence is reached, Child Protection Services will be contacted and a report filed for educational neglect.

It is also important for children to be prompt, because the school day starts better for a child when he/she is on time. Your child should arrive between 8:15-8:30 in the morning when there is the most supervision on the playground. Classes begin at 8:35.

- Please call the office (323-4290) before 8:30 if your child is going to be absent. Please bring in doctor notes when appropriate.
- If you know that your child is going to be tardy, prior notification is appreciated. When students are tardy, it is important that they check in at the office upon arrival. If they are going to be more than 15 minutes tardy parents please walk them into the building.

If you need to pick up your child before dismissal time, please come to the office to sign out your child. At that time, we will call your child to the office where we will release him/her to you. We appreciate your cooperation in helping make our school the safest possible environment for your children.

Bicycles

Children may ride their bikes to school, but it is important that they lock them to the bicycle rack on the grounds. The school is not responsible for damage to bicycles parked at school.

Skateboards and scooters should also be stored at the bicycle rack by the lower playground. Bicycles may not park by the front doors.

Book Fair

The week of parent-teacher conferences is set aside as a fund-raising activity for our library. Students may preview a large selection of books during one class visit and make their purchases at another time. Book Fair date will be determined by our LMS, Mrs. Joseph.

Parents are also invited to visit the Book Fair when they are in the school for the parent-teacher conference.

Book Orders

Many teachers send home book orders from various paperback companies from which students may order books at reduced prices. Purchase of books is entirely optional and is done as a service to students and parents by the classroom teacher. Your child's teacher will let you know if they are doing book orders, and what the procedure they are using to order books. The option of ordering online seems to be the most preferred.





Breakfast

We will be serving breakfast from 7:45-8:15. The Cost to students is \$1.45. They have the choice of cereal, toast, string cheese, juice, fruit, and milk. They are required to take a minimum of 3 items, and are allowed to take up to 4 items. There is a cost for additional items.

Building Use

School sponsored groups are allowed to use the building after hours when scheduled online with a program called rSchool Today. Certain building and district restrictions apply. Please click the link for more details: rSchool Today Link

The Bismarck School District allows the gym to be used by Bismarck Parks and Recreation for after-school basketball and volleyball for grade 3-5 students.

All groups using the building must sign an agreement; through rSchool Today. There is a fee to use the gym. Please see the secretary, Ms. Bullinger, if you have questions on how to make arrangements for gym use. Close supervision of students by the sponsoring group is essential. The group is responsible for leaving the area clean after use and locking the doors.

No student activities may be booked on Wednesdays in cooperation with the Ministerial Association.

Clothing

It is very important that students dress sensibly for the weather and in anticipation of the rapid changes in weather conditions that can take place during the day. Many children come to school inadequately dressed for the elements, not because they don't have the proper clothes, but because they left home before checking the weather and the forecast. Shorts are permissible when the weather is warm, but they should be long enough to be appropriate for school attire. Our building is air-conditioned, so skimpy attire is neither needed nor permitted.

Please make sure your child has a hat or hood, gloves or mittens, boots and a jacket or coat that closes properly for our cold winters. Boots are necessary for warmth, and because the playground can get muddy. Students are expected to play outdoors at recesses unless they have a note from a parent, so they must have adequate clothing for the elements.

Centennial supervisors will be using the following chart as to what is appropriate for the temperature (this is with windchill):

50 or higher — no coat required
41-49 - Light jacket or sweatshirt required
40 or below—coat required

Basically, students should not wear clothes that serve as a disruption to the educational process. This means that students should not wear clothes that endanger the health and safety of other students (wallet chains, for example), that promote the use of tobacco, alcohol or other drugs, or that display objects, pictures, writing, designs or representations that are obscene, profane, lewd, vulgar or sexually suggestive.



Computers

All students are assigned a Chromebook to use while at Centennial. Students will be trained on the BPS acceptable use policy. If students violate this policy, they may receive an Elementary Major discipline citation.



Counseling Program

Our school counselor, Miss Bothun, conducts a lesson in each classroom every week for grades K-1, and every other week for grades 2-5. Issues such as peer relations, peer pressure, friends, decision-making and drugs and alcohol are some of the topics discussed.

Students can also be referred for individual work with the school counselor. Parents are free to call the counselor if they have concerns about their children.

Cold Weather/Winter Storms

Students are expected to go outdoors unless otherwise directed by a teacher or parent. When the wind chill falls below –15 degrees, students will be required to stay indoors. Students should report to the gym upon arrival where there will be adequate supervision.

If severe weather worsens during the day, students will be permitted to leave only with parents, older siblings or with parent-designated drivers. School will not be closed once the day has begun.

Communication

We use a variety of methods to keep our families informed. Teachers communicate with notes, newsletters, facebook, or telephone calls. You will receive information on this communication from your child's teacher. Many teachers also use their e-mail as a form of communication. Generally, a teacher's e-mail address is firstname_lastname@bismarckschools.org.

Monthly newsletters are posted on our school website. Parents will also get a notification of the newsletter through a Power Announcement that will be sent to the email address on file. This newsletter contains important information about school activities, and other newsworthy items of interest.

Complaints

It is important to keep lines of communication open between the school and home, especially when difficulties or misunderstandings arise. Problems are best solved as close as possible to the source; therefore, it is wise to discuss the concern first with your child, then with your child's teacher.

If satisfaction is not reached at that level, a call or visit to the principal may be warranted. Finally, if the problem has not been resolved, Mr. Barnhardt, Assistant Superintendent, may be contacted. He will work with the Superintendent to help resolve the issue.

Please do not hesitate to contact the school when you have concerns. We will do everything we can to iron out the difficulties. We want your child to feel safe, and have a rewarding experience at Centennial.

Discipline

The best discipline is self-discipline and we work hard to instill that concept in our students. We follow the Roughrider 3:

Be Respectful, Be Responsible, and Be Safe

Additionally, our expectations fall into these major areas:

- Students should play in a manner that does not interfere with the safety or activities of others. Rough play, tackling, pushing and shoving is not allowed.
- Students should show respect for their peers as well as for people in authority. They should be verbally and physically considerate of others. Bullying will be dealt with in a serious manner.
- Students should use the halls safely, quietly and properly.

School-wide expectations are posted throughout the hallways and classrooms of Centennial. Students who are not able to meet these expectations will be corrected by 30-second interventions, redirection, and written communication with the teacher and/or parent. Centennial uses Reteach Plans as a way for students to correct or solve a problem. We consider these teaching opportunities.

When students continuously "cross the line," an Elementary Discipline Major will be issued so that parents can help us curtail inappropriate behavior. Harassment, physical aggression, weapons, illegal substances, and technology violations are examples of *bottom line* behaviors which could result in suspension.

Centennial's Discipline guidelines are aligned with the Bismarck Public School District. Our goal is to create a caring school community. Here are some basics of our beliefs:

- We believe that children can understand and share commitment to caring and cooperation. We believe in strengthening the child who offends so he will have less desire to hurt others.
 (Diane Chelsom Gossen)
- Students behave as a result of the five basic needs: belonging, power, freedom, fun, and survival.
- There are social skills and problem solving skills that will be taught and reinforced throughout the year through our Second Steps curriculum, and Conscious Discipline strategies. These lessons promote a positive, safe community.
- Staff members will use a variety of strategies when dealing with difficult behaviors. These strategies include effective questioning techniques, in which students monitor their own behavior, selfregulation strategies, and the problem solving steps from our Second Steps Curriculum.
- "Reteach" plans will be used to deal with inappropriate behavior. These plans help students become responsible for their own behavior. Students learn positive ways to deal with

- difficult situations. They are also taught to have an assertive voice when dealing with conflict by using the Conscious Discipline Time Machine.
- Our goal is to meet all of our students needs, from academics to social-emotional growth. We want students to feel safe and connected as a student of Centennial.

Dismissal / Student Pickup

Students are dismissed at 3:05. Each grade level has an assigned door to exit the building. We encourage you to pick up your child promptly at 3:05. The buses park on the street in front of the school. The loop in front of the building is reserved for daycare vans and handicapped parking; please refrain from picking up students in this area. We recommend you park on the street. We have three Crosswalk Guards that will help students cross the street safely. Please refrain from dropping off or picking up your child in the North staff parking lot. Just a reminder parents are not allowed in the hallways by the classrooms. It is best to wait by the door your child's grade level exits at the end of the day. A map will be sent out with this dismissal information. Our students' safety is of high priority to us, please follow these procedures and cross at crosswalks only on the street and on the property in front of our school.

Field Trips (Study Trips)

Teachers try to arrange meaningful study trips that coordinate with a unit of study. Trips to the legislature, Heritage Center, Capitol, the hospitals and the zoo are popular sites, but other meaningful trips are frequently arranged. Each student must have written permission to participate in field trips. When your child's class is taking a field trip, you will be notified.

Buses are the only option for transportation. Parent drivers are not allowed to drive for field trips because of the safety to students.

Friday Folders

Many teachers have a Friday Folder, or a folder that goes home nightly. Please take the time to read the important papers that are sent home. Many times forms will need to be signed and returned. All classes have plastic folders provided by the school. These folders will not be replaced if lost, so please take good care of them so they last the entire year.

Head Lice

Unfortunately, head lice may appear in classrooms. Once we suspect head lice in a classroom, the school nurse or designated staff will check any student reported to possibly have head lice. If head lice are found, the teacher will be informed immediately, and the child will not use any shared headphones or related items. Parents of the student will be notified. A treatment of a special shampoo, removing the nits (eggs) and special precautions at home are necessary to prevent the lice from appearing again. Students should return to school the next day with the head lice treatment intervention having taken place. The school nurse or other trained staff will recheck their child once a week for 2 weeks. Some Centennial classes have also taken preventive measures of using large vinyl shopping bags to store students outerwear. This is a great way to keep things such as gloves from getting lost. They only cost \$1 per bag. If you are interested in helping purchase the bags for your son/daughter's class please visit with their teacher.

Homework

Homework generally falls into two categories: 1) to provide delayed practice of a lesson's concept 2) to complete that which was unable to be finished in school.

If your child struggles nightly with homework and/or spends an extraordinary amount of time completing assignments, a conference with the teacher is definitely in order.

After consultation with the teacher, homework can be modified if the child is experiencing difficulty. Please do not hesitate to call your child's teacher if you are concerned.

A good rule of thumb to follow is the ten-minute rule: ten minutes of homework for each grade in school. For example, a second grader could handle 20 minutes while a fifth grader should be able to do 50 minutes, if necessary.

If your child is ill, the teachers are very accommodating about makeup work. Please consult with the teacher about the amount of time allowed for make-up after an absence.

Injuries

While we do everything we can to make sure that children are playing safely and are properly supervised, accidents can and do occur. We have a school nurse for 12 hours a week. Our school secretaries also do a great job of fixing up injuries. All head injuries, no matter how trivial, are reported to the school secretary. The secretary or nurse will call parents on all significant head injuries. If we feel your child may need medical attention or needs to go home, you will be notified. Parents will not be notified for minor scraps and bruises.

The school does not provide medical insurance benefits for school-related injuries. If your child has been injured at school but has not reported it to his/her teacher or to office personnel, please call the school so that the injury can be recorded.

Invitations

While it is cheaper to pass out party invitations at school, feelings would be spared if they were mailed or personally delivered to the recipient outside of school. It is understandable that not all children in the classroom can be invited to a child's party, but being discrete about such plans will ease the pain of not being included.

Learning/Behavior Problems

If you suspect that your child may have a learning disability or if you know that your child is having behavior difficulties at school, consult the teacher as soon as possible. If the teacher has already contacted you, please make every effort to understand the concerns and we will work together to make decisions that are in the best interest of the child. Your involvement from the very beginning is of great importance to your child and us.

Teachers will request help in developing meaningful adaptations and strategies during collaboration time. A weekly PLC time serves as a time for teachers to look at all the available resources, the student's needs, and write an intervention plan. This plan is an early intervention, which means that we will provide one on one help in a certain academic area to try to bring the student up to grade level. It is kind of like a special tutor time.

At least 4-6 weeks are needed to determine if the suggested

strategies have been helpful. If not, the teacher may consult with a team, including people who can help in assessment of the child's learning. Before any individual testing is performed, the parent is given prior notice and must give written permission for evaluation. We want parents to be involved in every decision regarding their child.

Levels of Service / Gifted Program

Centennial has the service of a resource teacher, Mrs. Smith, who assists teachers in meeting the gifted needs of students. The program will look different this year due to staffing. BPS will continue improving the GE programming and supporting all students.

Library

Each child has the opportunity to check out books from our library. We have a library assistant (Mrs. Suko) on duty from 8:30 - 3:30 daily, while a library media specialist (Mrs. Joseph) is here helping with technology, student research and teacher support. Mrs. Joseph does an LMS lesson in every classroom every week for 30 minutes.

Students are responsible for lost and damaged books.

Lost and Found

There are two lost and found areas. One is located by the NW doorway, and the other is by the SE doorway. Students are asked to check the bin for missing articles. Very small articles, like jewelry or glasses, are kept in the office. Check with the school secretary. It is helpful if you write your child's name on the tags of coats and sweatshirts.

At the end of the year, all unclaimed items are sent to a local charity on June 1st. If you think your child is missing a piece of clothing, please check the lost and found bin before that time.

Lunch

This year we are holding recess before lunch for grade 5; and after lunch for grades K, 1, 2, 3 and 4. For grade 5, we find that playground issues seem to dissipate during lunch and are not carried back into

Students have a choice of the regular hot lunch menu, or a second choice option for the main entree. Additional milk can be purchased for 40 cents. A student lunch is \$2.35.

Children may be bring a cold lunch from home. We do ask that you do not send carbonated beverages (soda pop) to accompany your child's meal, juice is permitted. We also do not allow parents to deliver lunches from local fast food restaurants to their children for lunch. It would be better to take the child out for lunch instead.

We do have a few students with peanut/nut allergies, so there is a table in the lunchroom that is peanut and tree nut free to accommodate their needs.

If you wish to join your child for lunch, you may do so at a cost of \$4.00 per meal for each additional family member. This cost is subject to change. A child's birthday is a great time to make an appearance. Please call the office before 8:30 to make your meal selection, then stop by the office before lunchtime to check in and pay for your meal.

You may add money to your child's account at any time to cover extra milks. You may send a check to school, or go online to pay using a credit card. You may find the MyPaymentsPlus Link on the BPS website.

Medications

School personnel may not dispense medication unless authorized in writing by the parent. Forms are available upon request in the office or in your Powerschool account. Medicine needs to brought to school by the parent and should be in its original container along with the authorization form.

Students capable of administering their own asthma inhaler medication are allowed to do so in their classrooms, but an authorization form must be submitted to the office. Epi-pens for bee stings or severe allergic reactions may also need to be kept in the classroom or with the student if stated on the appropriate authorization form. Students who require an inhaler or epi-pen must have appropriate health plans completed. Our school nurse will work with you on this plan.

Parent-Teacher Conferences

Centennial holds two evening conference dates in October and February/March. This means that there is no school, nor will teachers be present, on the day that is designated as Parent Teacher Conference day on the school calendar.

A few weeks before conferences, you will receive a letter to schedule a time with teachers through PTC Fast. If you have more than one child you will be given a first opportunity to pick dates and times for conferences.

Since we schedule these back-to-back for your convenience, it's important that all conferences be kept on schedule. If after 15 minutes, you feel you have a need for more time with the teacher, please ask to schedule a visit at another time.

Parent-teacher conferences are vital to school communication and student success. Please make every effort to attend. Most employers are very cooperative about releasing parents from work to attend parent-teacher conferences, but since we schedule our conferences after 3:30, it is usually not much of a problem for most families. We pride ourselves on a high percentage of parents attending conferences!

Parking

The area to the North of the school is reserved for teachers to park. Please do not park in this lot to drop off or pick up your child. The loop in front of the school is to be only used for drop-off in the morning, but is reserved for buses and daycare vans after school. Please arrange for your child to be picked up on one of the side streets by Centennial. We have crossing guards at three different locations to assure safety of children crossing the street. Do not stop in the middle of the street. This encourages children to cross moving traffic, creating very dangerous situations. In the morning please encourage your children to use the crosswalks as they make their way to the playground. Do not allow them to cross the parking lot unless using the designated crosswalk.

Parties

Three school-wide parties are held throughout the year: Halloween, Christmas and Valentine's Day. There is also an end-of-the-year picnic in May.

Lower grades frequently ask for help from room parents, while the older grades plan and prepare menus on their own. Each party should include no more than one food or beverage that does not meet nutrition standards. Students may be asked to take a turn at hosting one of these parties.

If you have religious reasons for not allowing your child to participate in these classroom parties, please inform the teacher at the beginning of the year.

PowerSchool

Parents have the opportunity to keep track of their child's progress by reviewing their current grades online. In order to do this they need to request a PS login from the school office. This login and password will follow them through all their years in Bismarck Public Schools. If you do not have a Username and Password, please contact the school office.

PTO

All parents and teachers are invited to join our Parent-Teacher Organization. PTO works to enhance children's educational experience. The PTO meets the second Tuesday of each month at 7:00 pm. You are welcome to attend this meeting. I invite you to get involved at our monthly meetings, volunteer at events, provide input and feedback, and join the Centennial Elementary PTO Facebook page.

This group promotes and supports our students attending Centennial Elementary. They organize activities that help provide resources that are not provided by the district. Some of the activities they sponsor are Grandparent's Day, a fall fund-raiser, pastries for parents, art and ice cream social, staff appreciation week, as well as many other projects.

PTO provides financial support to the staff and students of our school in the form of technology, library materials, classroom supplies playground equipment, and etc.

A special thanks to parents for your support to make Centennial a great school.

School Photographs/Memory Books

A professional photographer takes head shots of all students in the fall; a class photo will be taken in Spring of the year. Photo packages are available for sale to parents. This year we will be using Phyne Photography from Mandan.

The PTO will publish these individual photos in our annual year book available for sale in the spring of the year.

Snacks / Birthday Menu

It is permissible for students to bring snacks to school. However, students are encouraged to bring something healthy to eat. The Healthy Snack List provides recommendations for a light snack appropriate for fueling young bodies and minds and is available on the Centennial website. You should have received this list the first week of school. Many children enjoy bringing treats on their birthdays, but in accordance with the district's nutrition policy, we have decided to provide other options for birthdays instead of treats. On the student's actual birthday, they will get to choose from a menu of activities. More information will be forth coming in a birthday brochure from the classroom teacher. Please do not allow your child to bring soda, sunflower seeds and gum to school.

Staying after School

If a teacher needs a student to stay after school to finish work or for disciplinary reasons, the parent will be notified if it will be later than 3:15. No child will be kept after 4:00 unless involved in sports or a music practice.

Student Council

Each classroom in grades 4-5 elects a representative to the Student Council. Members meet monthly with the student council advisors to discuss school matters. The group brings concerns of fellow students and tries to come up with meaningful solutions to problems. They help with school events throughout the year, and also may do a community service project.

Telephone

There are telephones in each classroom, but calls will not be transferred during instructional periods. Please do not call the school and ask to speak to your child; this will interrupt important classroom instruction.

Students may use the classroom telephone only with the teacher's approval. Parents are asked to make after-school arrangements with their children before they leave home.

If your child calls you and asks you to bring a forgotten book, shoes, assignment, etc., please do not ask your child to wait for you by the door. He/she is missing valuable class time; it is better to deliver the item to the office and we will call the child down to pick up item.

Students may not use cell phones during the school day. Cell phones must be kept in the child's backpack during the school day and must be turned off. The only exception to this is in the morning when they are waiting to be dismissed for recess.

If you would like to give a message to your child for after school please contact the office and they will make sure they get the message at the end of the day.

Visitation

All visitors to our school must check in at the office and receive a visitor's badge. Parents/Guardians may visit their child's classes on school days for a particular reason, but are subject to advance approval of Mrs. Svihovec. Only supervisors are permitted on the playground for safety reasons.

Volunteers
