Introduction

The Music Department of the Clarence Central Schools has enjoyed a reputation for excellence that has extended far back into the 1960's. Our quality band program begins in the fourth grade in all our elementary schools when over 80% of the students begin to study an instrument.

This **ELEMENTARY BAND INSTRUMENT HANDBOOK** has been designed to assist both parents and students in understanding the needs and expectations of the Elementary Instrumental Program. If you have additional questions, either now or throughout the school year, do not hesitate to contact your individual music teacher. When parents and teachers work together, the chances of musical success for the student are much greater.

It is well for all to remember: **PRACTICE** is more important than talent, especially at the elementary level. With practice, student's progress; without practice, they do not progress. It is also important to keep in mind that practicing is not always "fun". However, when good patterns of practice are developed with discipline, consistency, and parental encouragement at this young age, these practice habits will last throughout the student's musical life and impact on many other life situations also.

First there is the practice, then the skill development and musical growth, and then the joy of music through playing in the band.

Selections of Instruments

The Clarence Central School System provides rental instruments for 1st year players. There is no fee for borrowing a school instrument, but families are expected to pay for any damage beyond normal wear and tear. Students will be able to hear and see all the different band instruments at the demonstration held in each of the elementary schools at the beginning of the year. At that meeting, applications will be sent home to the parents. We encourage students to make choices that they feel most enthusiastic about. However, there are physical conditions to be aware of such as thick or thin lips, unusual dental structures, and a large bead or drop in the middle of the upper lip. If you have concerns about the selection of an instrument, please feel free to consult your music teacher.

Instrument Changes

Occasionally, situations arise in which individual students select instruments for which they are not physically suited. An example of this is the flute. A major objective of producing a good tone on the flute is to create the smallest possible lip opening for the air to pass through. A student with a pronounced drop in the shape of the upper lip will have an <u>extremely</u> hard time doing this. Playing any instrument is difficult enough without fighting an unnecessary physical battle. The flute is perhaps the most competitive instrument in the band and a high level of accomplishment will be needed for success.

This is only one example, but the point is that the instrumental music staff would like your child to have the highest degree of success with the least unnecessary frustration. If the teacher suggests an instrument change, it is with the best interest of the student in mind. We have an extremely experienced staff, and our professional opinions in this area are based on many years of observations.

School Lessons

Elementary Instrumental Lessons are given once a week on a rotating basis. Each week the student will miss a different 30-minute segment of the day and students are grouped according to ability and like instruments. <u>Private lessons</u> are encouraged from the very beginning. Please do not hesitate to ask your teacher's help in finding a private teacher. Soon after lessons begin, your teacher will recommend a book. Students are responsible for obtaining their own books.

Practice

There are very few disciplines that require the coordination between mind and body as in instrumental music. <u>Consistent</u> daily practice will help students overcome many problems associated with mental and physical dexterity. It is best that a consistent day-to-day schedule be adopted rather than trying to make up for time lost on days with no practice. We recommend 30 minutes per day at the elementary level. A practice record will be attached to the student's book. Parents should sign this record each week

Concert/Recital/Clinic Dress

A concert/recital is a special event. Tasteful and appropriate dress makes the group look attractive. There is also a positive impact when dressed properly for the concert/recital and this also helps foster group identity.

Care of Instruments

Musical instruments, being mechanical devices of varying degrees of complexity, will benefit from proper care and maintenance. The players will benefit when instruments operate properly. As with any mechanical device, a bit of "TLC" and preventive maintenance will provide long-term performance and minimal repair expenditures.

It is important to have clean reeds and mouthpieces. Students should always brush their teeth before playing their instrument when at home.

Students should <u>never</u> play on another student's instrument. This avoids the transfer of germs, etc. The student who is responsible for the instrument is the only one who should open the case - no friends, siblings or others should touch the instrument. Instrument cases should never be opened on the bus.

Students should refer any questions regarding proper maintenance or cleaning of their instruments to their music teacher.

Band Responsibility

A good <u>attitude</u> and strong sense of <u>responsibility</u> are vital to the success of our elementary band program. Once a student has attained the necessary skill and musical growth to participate in the band, he or she must diligently practice band music, in addition to lesson assignments.

The success of the band's performance is also very much dependent upon <u>every</u> student attending each rehearsal and every performance. We ask parents to please try to avoid scheduling doctor or dentist appointments on days of band rehearsals.

A good positive attitude towards rehearsals, coupled with consistent practice and personal responsibility, will ensure a great deal of success in the band program. You can be assured that <u>attitude</u>, <u>responsibility</u>, and <u>practice</u> will not only create a positive experience in the making of music but will carry over into numerous other areas of your child's development.

Transportation of Instruments

Most musical instruments can be transported on the school bus without problems. Students will receive a sticker for their case that will indicate to the bus driver the instrument may be transported. Students should be aware of the need to hold the instruments on their lap.

Large, bulky instruments, such as some baritone horns, baritone saxophones, and tubas need to be transported by parents when the need arises to take the instrument to school. In most cases, with these large instruments, we can supply a duplicate instrument for home use.

If there is a problem with the transportation of instruments, please contact the band director in your child's school. The chances are good that the problem can be solved.
