Class of 1983

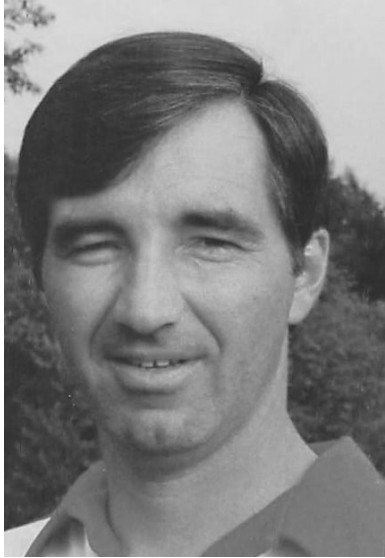


Barry Chubb, Class of 1983, was a three-sport athlete at Clarence High School from 1980-1983. Throughout his tenure at Clarence, Barry earned nine Varsity Red Letters in football, indoor track, and outdoor track. Barry was a three-year player on the varsity football team. As a sophomore, he was called up from the JV squad. He led the team in the Sectional Championship game at Rich Stadium, running for 156 yards and earning MVP of that game. During his football career, the teams won the divisional title in 1980, '81, and '82. He was named MVP on defense in 1983. He concluded his career by playing in the 1983 Kensington Lions Club All-Star game to help the North squad beat the South squad as the starting linebacker/strong safety.

Barry also competed in indoor and outdoor track for three years from 1981-1983. In 1983, he was named team captain for track. He was named Most Valuable Sprinter and earned the Good and Kind Sportsmanship Award.

Barry went on to compete in football and track at Colgate University, lettering in both sports for three years. He started at running back for esteemed head football coach Fred Dunlap. Barry still holds the Colgate record for kickoff returns for touchdowns (3).

In 1987, Barry signed a free agent contract during the strike season with the Buffalo Bills under head coach Marv Levy and running backs coach Elijah Pitts.



Glenn Faust  
Coach



Glenn Faust graduated from Brockport State College in 1965 and taught at Clarence Center Elementary and Clarence Middle School for 36 years.

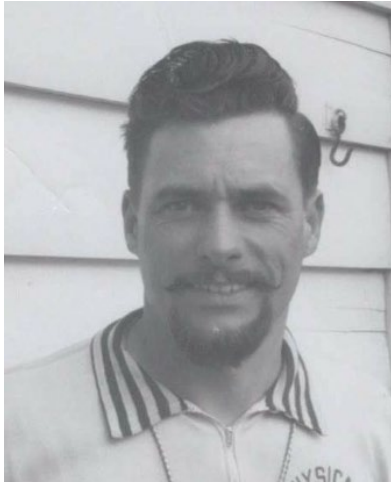
He coached in the Clarence football program for 26 years – 15 as varsity head coach, 2 as varsity assistant coach, 7 as junior varsity head coach and 2 as freshman head coach.

As the varsity football head coach, Glenn's record was 84 wins, 45 losses, and 3 ties. He led the team to nine Section VI championships in 1978, '79, '80-'83, '85, '86, and '88. His team made eight Federation Division Playoffs at Rich Stadium and earned five wins. Glenn was honored twice as Section VI Most Outstanding Coach.

As the assistant coach on the varsity team, his overall record was 13 wins, 2 losses, and 1 tie. The team won the Divisional title in 1977. Glenn, as the Junior Varsity head coach, compiled a record of 44 wins and 12 losses.

He was also an assistant coach for the Clarence wrestling program for 11 years.

Glenn has long been recognized as the scientific engineer of football at Clarence. He was passionate, intense, a master motivator, and the heart and soul of the Clarence High School football program. He mentored all of the coaches that would follow in his footsteps and made a life-long positive impact on all of his assistants and former players.



Charles Fiegl  
Teacher/Coach



Charles Fiegl was one of the first physical education teachers here at Clarence High School. He worked in the Clarence School District for thirty-two years in the high school and the middle school.

Charles was a graduate of Blasdell High School in 1943 and Brockport State Teachers College in 1950. From 1944 to 1946, Charles served as a quartermaster in the United States Navy in the Pacific Theater.

He began his teaching career at Parker High School and moved to Clarence High School when it opened in 1952. Charles spent his entire career teaching and coaching for the Clarence Red Devils. While teaching, he touched the lives of thousands of young people. With Coach Fiegl's encouragement, they participated in sports while in school and followed his example by playing and coaching throughout their adult lives. Charles was also class advisor at the high school, influencing many youths.

Coaching was his passion, and he coached many sports including baseball, basketball, football, and volleyball.

Charles established the first wrestling team at Clarence and laid the foundation for the wrestling program that we have here today.

He also established the Red Cross Swim Program during the summer at the Clarence pools. After his coaching career, Charles was a swimming/diving and volleyball official for over forty years.



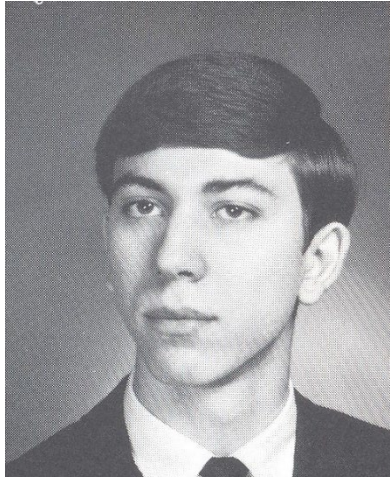
Erin Goddard Fix  
Class of 1999



Erin Goddard Fix, Class of 1999, was a three-sport athlete at Clarence High School from 1997-1999. Throughout her tenure at Clarence, Erin earned twelve Varsity Red Letters as she competed in cross-country, indoor track and outdoor track. During her career, she won league, sectional and state awards. Erin is one of the most highly decorated runners in Clarence history. In cross-country, Erin earned four ECIC team championships, four sectional team championships, and was a member of two state runner-up teams. She was a member of the 4<sup>th</sup> best NYS cross-country team of the decade. Her individual awards include being selected 1<sup>st</sup> Team All-ECIC for four consecutive seasons.

In indoor track, Erin qualified for three individual events and three team relays at sectionals and won several league awards. She won four state medals and two federation medals. Erin received numerous invitational awards during her career. Her versatility on the track made her valuable in several events. Erin was a member of four ECIC and five Sectional championship teams. She was a 3-time ECIC and Sectional individual champion. Her 4 x 400 relay team still holds that record today.

In outdoor track, Erin was a member of six ECIC and seven Sectional championships teams. She was a 3-time ECIC and Sectional individual champion in the 800-meter and 1500-meter runs. Her 4 x 400 relay team still holds that record today.



Donald Torok  
Class of 1969



Donald Torok, Class of 1969, was a three-sport athlete at Clarence High School from 1966-1969. Throughout his tenure at Clarence, Donald earned ten Varsity Red Letters in cross-country, basketball, and track.

Donald came from a very strong athletic family, and he remarkably joins his brother Robert (WOF Class of 2016) and sister Beverly (WOF Class of 2013) on the Clarence Athletic Wall of Fame. When Robert and Beverly were inducted, they thanked their older brother and stated they believed the committee inducted the wrong Torok.

In basketball, Donald was captain and the Most Valuable Player in his senior year. He led his team to a divisional championship with an overall record of 13 wins and 7 losses. For his efforts on the court, Donald was named 2<sup>nd</sup> Team All-League.

In track, Donald was captain his senior year. Excelling in jumps, he earned the honor of Most Improved Player. He capped off his high school career as the Sectional long jump champion.

For his high school athletic achievements, Donald was named Buffalo Evening News Outstanding Senior Athlete. He was also very active in school as president of the Varsity Club.

Upon graduation, Donald attended Geneseo College, where he competed in track and held the school record in javelin. He spent over forty years in education at several institutions, including Geneseo and Florida Atlantic University.
