This presentation is geared toward the application process, BUT we know there are many of you who might not apply to college - that's ok! Counselors want to help you plan for after high school...whatever that is.





Big Decisions

- The process can be stressful.
- Don't let it overwhelm you; consistent, small steps will get you to the finish line.
- Set up a weekly/biweekly* meeting with your parents. Jam all the college talk into that timeframe so it's not constantly overwhelming all of you.

^{*}That means every other week. :)



Search

- Do you have a list? If not then it's time to make one.
- Use online sites like Naviance, College Board and College Scorecard.
- Gather as much info about schools as you can.
- Meet with Admissions Reps in the Guidance Office.
- Talk to people around you about their college search friends, relatives, teachers.
- Look at the school's course catalog, but know that most of you will change majors.
- Have an open and honest conversation with your parents about their expectations?



Visit

- Easily the best way to learn about a school.
- Sign up for an appointment in advance through the college's website.
- Try to attend an Open House if possible; professors are generally there.
- Use the admissions office and tours, but don't be afraid to get off the beaten path.
- Take notes on our impressions of the school on the ride home; things tend to blend together after a few visits, so good notes will help keep everything straight.
- Virtual visits have improved a LOT, but it's still best to visit in-person if possible.




Standardized Tests

- Check the school's testing policies on their website, but almost ALL schools are test-optional. Submitting a score could help you.
- Find out the % of students who submitted a score from last year. Do they require tests for merit aid?
- Scores must be sent directly from the testing institution (ACT or College Board).
- Almost all colleges will superscore.




Timeline

- Try to apply by Thanksgiving.
- Generally no bonus points for early appliers.
- Be sure to have at least one school you can: get into, afford, want to go to.
- EA accelerates the process no real downside.
- ED is a binding commitment, but can increase your chances of admission.
- Be certain about your ED school.

Ways to Apply

- There are several ways to apply Common App, SUNY app, Institutional app. Don't default to the Common App, it might be more efficient to do multiple apps than the CA.
- Common App resources are on the Guidance website.
- Start by filling out the demographic info. That will help break the ice and ease you into the application.
- FERPA Release
- Do NOT use the SUNY app for ECC or NCCC (unless it's during free application weeks).




Naviance


- Naviance is the way counselors submit the school's portion of your application (transcript, recs, forms, etc.) to colleges.
- You must "match" in Naviance if you're using the Common App. CA requires you to complete the FERPA release and add at least one school before it allows you to match.
- Add schools to "colleges I'm applying to." CA will auto-populate the list for you once you match. Invite teachers to submit letters
- Do NOT request your transcript we need to meet with you in-person before we can send it.





You must complete the FERPA waiver in Common App before you can "match" in Naviance.



















Letters of Recommendation

- Most schools only require one or two (if any). Find how how many you need before asking.
- Ask teachers whose class you performed well in AND you established a good relationship with.
- Ask in-person, then invite through Naviance.
- Write a "thank you" note it's common courtesy.
 Keep in mind that every letter takes at least an hour to write.
- Some schools require a counselor letter

Counseling Office Procedures

- Meet in-person to send materials at least 10 business days before the application is due. We will not act on an application until we meet with you. It's ok to email us a question, but not a request to send materials.
- Find out if your school requires a counselor recommendation.
 If so, we'll likely need you to fill out a form each counselor
 approaches it a little differently. Find out what yours needs.
- Counselors send everything from the school transcript, teacher letters, secondary school report.
- We keep good records of what was sent and when. It's
 possible you might get an automated email while things are
 crossing in cyberspace. DON'T FREAK OUT. Come see us and
 we'll help figure it out.



Sherpas

- Think of us as guides on this process - we've climbed this mountain* before and know where some of the tricky spots are.
- You still need to climb the mountain*, no one can do it for you.



^{*}Important note: climbing a legit mountain is *significantly* harder than applying to college, so don't get too freaked out, we're in it for the metaphor.



Financial Aid & Scholarships

- FAFSA us available on 12/1. It's important to file as early as possible. Use the **2024-2025** FAFSA.
- Some private schools require the CSS Profile.
- Use net price calculators to get an early snapshot of what the school might cost.
- The bulk of scholarship \$ awarded is from individual colleges.
- Websites like Fastweb and Cappex are scholarship databases that can match you with possible scholarships.
- We post a number of local scholarships on our website each month.
- In February, students can apply for ~40 scholarships given to CHS seniors through one application.




Essay

The essay is a critical piece of the application. It's the only thing you really have control over at this point. Get feedback from others, but make sure YOUR "voice" is loud and clear. Have a strong introduction. Try to use vivid imagery. SHOW don't TELL. Make sure it's grammatically flawless, but it doesn't need to be super formal, again, your voice should come through. Don't reiterate your resume. Try to answer the question throughout the essay, that will help keep you on track. Avoid gimmicks. Less is more. Read the essay out loud; that will help you eliminate filler and unnecessary words.
