Overdrive Ebook/Audiobook Records Fixed in Media Catalog

The links to Overdrive ebooks and audiobooks in our Media Library catalog have been corrected and should all work properly now, rather than only directing to the excerpt. Going forward, these should be updated with new titles weekly.

Lost Materials Invoices Going Out

Invoices for materials lost from the Media Library during the 2020-2021 school year will be going out to districts soon. Fines for materials lost prior to that time, including those lost during the initial COVID-19 shutdown, have been forgiven as a courtesy.

Going forward, we will be sending three overdue email notices to teachers about a specific title before marking those items as lost, unless an extension is requested. We will include the librarians on the final notice. All lost materials will be invoiced during the summer following the school year they were borrowed.

Sora / OverDrive Updates and Upcoming Changes

ARPA Audiobooks Added to Collection

With our ARPA Grant funds, we were able to add 375 audiobook titles (506 copies) to our Overdrive/Sora library. These audiobooks match titles in our Multiple Book Library, in order to ensure better accommodation for any students or classes who need matching audio while reading. Several of these titles were extra copies of the most popular Media Library audiobooks, for better class availability.

The default loan length when first signing into Sora appears to be three weeks – users can change this to four weeks by going into the Settings menu (three horizontal lines in the top right corner), scrolling down and clicking on All Settings, then clicking on Lending Periods and changing them to 28 days. This is particularly useful when teachers are using class sets with students but haven't requested that they be assigned, as it will require fewer renewals.

Correction: NYPL Collection - Card Required

It appears as though, in order to borrow books from New York Public Library, you **will** need a digital NYPL card. Anyone age 13+ who lives or works in New York State can <u>apply for one here</u> -- however, because this is several steps and requires you to create an account with personal information, this is probably better suited to teachers rather than students. Apologies for the inaccurate information last month!
