It's December?!

Whew! What a start to this school year, huh? A sudden email from TekData in September announcing that they would no longer be supporting SNAP starting October 15 meant that we had to accelerate and complete our catalog migration to OPALS several months early



while, at the same time, trying to update student and teacher accounts, send out welcome packets, catalog new books and music, provide training, update database subscriptions and so on – hence the much-belated first newsletter for this school year. Sorry about the wait!

Large Print Titles Collection

We now have a small collection (one copy each) of large print titles to match some titles in our Multiple Book collection. This way, if your student has an IEP or difficulty reading small print, we can provide a large print version. Currently, there are 16 titles available in this collection; if you have a certain title you know a student will need, you can request its addition <u>via this form.</u> It does take up to two months to order and receive, so please plan ahead. As a reminder, e-book versions on Sora often offer larger font sizes as well and can be used for this purpose.

Media Library - SNAP to OPALS Migration Updates

As you all know, on Monday, November 1, BOCES made the full migration switch from SNAP to our new <u>O/H Media Library</u> catalog in OPALS for booking any of our physical materials. Our digital resources can be found there as well, via the Digital Resource Library radio button, although teachers are welcome to continue using SNAP for those until it no longer works.

While there are certainly things that need updating and kinks to work out, so far it seems to be operating relatively smoothly. We sent out an email on the 1st with the access information for our new catalog – please share this with all your teachers if you haven't done so yet. You can also <u>find it here</u> on our website.

If you need help replacing the SNAP links on your OPALS with the new O/H Media Library catalog link, let us know. Or if you'd like help formatting a request for your IT Department to replace any links on your school website, <u>you can take a look at this example, made by Roma.</u>

We know there are several features we still need to have OPALS turn on/create, such as automatic booking emails – please know that we are still working on these. If you have any suggestions, please let us know.

Sora / OverDrive Updates and Upcoming Changes

Sora Summer Reading Contest Winners

As announced at an earlier meeting, the winners for our two

spring/summer Sora Reading Contests were Benton Hall Academy (Little Falls) and Watson Williams Elementary (Utica). We'll be contacting both librarians to let you know how to collect on your prize.

NY Reads and Mid-York Library System Collections

Please let your staff and students know about these two "libraries" that they can add to their Sora accounts - both provide access to even more e-book and audiobook titles. Mid-York allows access to the local public library system collection (only titles corresponding to their account's access level) without having to have a MidYork library card, and NY Reads contains a collection of Simultaneous Use (Always Available) titles, shared by multiple BOCES within New York State.

You can download <u>these instructions</u> on adding the collections and share them with teachers and students.

"Always Available" Sora Collections Updated

We've updated the "Always Available" collections on the Sora Explore tab – rather than being divided by age level, these simultaneous-use titles are now divided into a "Classic Literature" collection, which contains many popular literary titles often used in schools, and a "Contemporary" collection, which contains the more modern, lighter reads.

Upcoming Changes to the Overdrive App

According to a recent email from the company, "OverDrive will soon start the process of retiring the legacy OverDrive app and encouraging all students to use Sora as the primary app." The OverDrive app will be removed from app stores in February 2022. Current app users can continue to use it, while new users would be directed to the Sora app. The OverDrive website (<u>http://ohsls.lib.overdrive.com/</u>) will be



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available until they begin further migration to Sora (no set timeline at this point). Access via the Sora app and the Sora website (<u>https://soraapp.com/library/oneidaherkimer</u>) will remain unchanged.

Going forward, if you've promoted the use of the OverDrive app, we would recommend you highlight the Sora app instead – OverDrive encourages "users to switch to Sora, with a goal of moving most over by the end of 2022."

We'll keep you notified of any further updates and changes as OverDrive informs us.

Kanopy Update

Using Kanopy Streaming Video (Documentaries)

Next time you use Kanopy you may notice a difference: it's now set up more like Swank, where you submit a request for the titles you'd like to use. Because Kanopy is oriented toward the college & university audience, we had a little difficulty in blocking the titles that are not ageappropriate for our students. This change corrects that issue. **These**



instructions are for librarians and teachers only - please do not share with students.

- Visit <u>https://boces.kanopy.com/ (You can also find this link on the "For Teachers" tab in the O/H</u> <u>Media Library Catalog</u>)
- Use the orange "Log in to BOCES" button at the bottom left.
- (The upper right "Log In" button is for individual subscribers)
- Username = boces
- Password = access
- (You will be logged in even though you see the "Log In" button at the upper right. It's still for people with individual accounts.)
- Select or search for a title and click "Watch"
- For films with an available trailer, you can watch the trailer (many titles don't have one)
- Titles that have already been licensed to us will appear in your search without a 'request' form
- New titles will direct you to the request form, which comes to us at the SLS office
- Please enter an educational reason for using the film, just like in Swank
- We should be able to get back to you within 3 workdays
- Play the video in class, or give the link to your students (if virtual teaching)
- Students will also log in with the same credentials. Please note, we have blocked titles that we noticed were age-inappropriate from search, but students can in fact search Kanopy once there. They would only be able to watch titles that are already licensed for our BOCES.
