
SWANK Movie Streaming Update

SWANK Motion Pictures is our teacher-only portal for locating full-length films to show your students. You can then send students the link directly to the film, or play it for your class.

We had a couple of requests recently for titles that are visible on the SWANK site and which can be requested, but which are not currently available to show. SWANK owns the rights to a huge number of films, but they don't have digital content on-hand for everything. To obtain or convert it would cost a large additional fee and four to six weeks of lead time.

If you find a film in this category that you feel is worth putting in the extra fee for, let us know and we'll arrange the billing to your district. The ones we've seen so far are in the \$150 range but we can find out an exact amount before you decide.

How to tell the difference? Look for the "Additional fees & time may apply" flag under the Request button:



If you don't see that note, the film is already in SWANK's digital collection and all you need to do is submit your request with an educational purpose for showing the film; for example, "Students will compare and contrast the film and book version," or "Students will be watching [title] to make connections to their own life experience of going through hard times. This will support the social emotional learning standards and curriculum."

(Please note, the film request form defaults to "[School Name] Teacher" as the name, unless you enter your name and email address. Please put in your info (or alert teachers in your district they should do so). That way when your request is approved, we can let you know promptly!)

Down with Dewey?

Last Friday, Cornell University held a <u>Virtual Teach-in on Confronting Anti-Asian Racism</u>. Panelist Reanna Esmail, Outreach and Engagement Librarian at Olin Library, put a call out to fellow librarians to "confront bias and misinformation in ways we approach and teach information and digital literacy." She specifically discussed that the Dewey Decimal System is outdated and upholds systemic racism. TBBL is available year-round to anyone with a disability (physical or learning) that makes it hard for them to use standard print books. The BARD app is particularly appealing, providing simultaneous-use audio books for download.
