Sora/Overdrive - Updates and Information



Collections

Over the past several months, we have been updating and creating new, browsable digital book collections on various subjects for the Explore page in Sora. We intend to continue creating more collections, as it seems to have increased interest and checkouts.

Multiple Copies

We've recently purchased quite a few new titles for our Overdrive library, including several titles of 30, 50, 100, or even 300 copies. These can be found on the Explore page in Sora under the Multiple Copies collection, and can be used by teachers for class assignments or just for casual reading. The number of copies we own of a title can be found by clicking on its cover, then clicking "More Details" beneath its listed Levels.

Computer Science Education Week 2020 December 7th-13th

Celebrate CS EdWeek 2020 with a new Hour of Code activity from CS First - no internet or devices needed!

Google has just released its latest <u>CS First activity</u> as part of this year's Hour of Code, a celebration of Computer Science Education Week which starts on December 7! Hour of Code™ activities may look different in 2020 for many teachers, students, and families, so to support a variety of learning environments, CS First created a new lesson that can be used completely offline and without a computer. <u>CS First Unplugged</u> includes a printable booklet that contains three computational thinking activities in which students (grades 4-8) learn about how computer science helps us communicate and stay connected with people around the world.

Check out the CS First's Hour of Code lessons

For those looking to participate in Hour of Code with a connected device, CS First's <u>Dialogue</u> lesson is a great one to engage with this year. This beginner-friendly activity includes video-based instruction to guide students as they program a conversation between two characters. They'll use Scratch, a block-based coding language, to animate and bring their story to life with movement, dialogue and more.

CS First Unplugged and Dialogue are both available in English and Spanish. Lesson plans and solution guides for teachers (or parents and guardians!) are provided so that anyone can teach and learn with Hour of Code™ -- no prior CS experience required.

Upcoming PD Opportunity:

Project READY: Re-imagining Equity & Access for Diverse Youth

A 5-month course (January 2021-May 2021) for school librarians, educators, and others interested in improving their knowledge about race and racism, racial equity, and culturally sustaining pedagogy to be prepared for difficult conversations. The primary focus of the Project READY curriculum is on improving relationships with, services to, and resources for youth of color and Native youth. The project will be led and taught by Dr. Evangela Q. Oates.
