Reports	<p>Recognition of Outgoing Board President Sheril Logan. New BOE President Stan Reeser recognized Ms. Logan, who served as BOE President in the 2014-15 and 2016-17 fiscal years, and from July 24, 2018 through January 11, 2021. As President, Ms. Logan has served the most terms (4.5) and also the longest continuous time (2.5 years) since unification of the Wichita school district and other area districts into USD 259 in July 1965.</p> <p>Report – Good News</p> <p>2021 Scholastic Art Awards. The Scholastic Art and Writing Awards is the oldest and most prestigious recognition program for creative teenagers in the U.S. This year, 45 works from three USD 259 high schools were selected for the Eastern Kansas Scholastic Art Awards. <p>Reconvene</p>	<p>At approximately 6:28 p.m., President Reeser reconvened the meeting.</p>
<p>New Business: BOE District 5 Vacancy (Continued)</p>	<p>President Reeser recognized former Board member Mike Rodee for his dedication to the Board of Education from July 2013-present, efforts with special needs students, work as a Northwest High School athletics booster, and unwavering support of public education. Board member Sheril Logan said Mr. Rodee's presence on the Board will be missed. <u>Motion #4</u>: Ms. Logan (Ms. Hedrick) moved the Board bring up an item concerning the appointment of a new Board member for District 5 to replace Mike Rodee. The motion passed 6-0. <u>Motion #5</u>: Ms. Logan (Mr. Blankley) moved that the Clerk of the Board be directed to publish a notice one time in the Wichita Eagle on February 11 stating that a vacancy has occurred in the BOE District 5 seat, and that the unexpired term will be filled by appointment by the Board not sooner than 15 days after publication of the notice. The motion passed 6-0. <p>New Business (Continued)</p>	<p>2. The deadline for printed application packets to be received in the Clerk of the Board's office is February 24 at noon. Qualified applicants must reside within the boundaries of BOE District 5. Applicant addresses and voter registration will be confirmed at the Election Commissioner's Office. USD 259 employment will be checked. The Kansas Supreme Court has ruled that it is a conflict-of-interest for a person to serve as a Board member and as an employee of a school district at the same time. A USD 259 employee may apply for this position; however, if selected, the employee must resign from the district before taking the oath of office.</p> <p>3. The Board will conduct interviews of qualified applicants on March 3 at 6 p.m. during a Special BOE Meeting at the North High Lecture Hall.</p> <p>4. The Board will continue the appointment process on March 8 during its regular BOE Meeting at 6 p.m. at the North High Lecture Hall. Provided at least four Board members vote to appoint a qualified applicant that evening, the appointed person will be required to take the official oath of office at the Sedgwick County Election Office by March 12. 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<p>First Review: New BOE Policy 1117 – Sexual Harassment and Complaint Procedures</p> <p>Appendix 15</p>	<p>The Wichita Public Schools prohibits sexual harassment. New BOE Policy 1117 - Sexual Harassment and Complaint Procedures is intended to ensure compliance with certain amendments of the regulations implementing Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 (Title IX) that took effect on August 14, 2020.</p> <p>For Title IX and proposed policy 1117 purposes, sexual harassment means conduct on the basis of sex that satisfies as least one of the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A. A school employee conditioning an educational benefit or service upon a person's participation in unwelcome sexual conduct ("quid pro quo" harassment); B. Unwelcome conduct that a reasonable person would find so severe, pervasive, and objectively offensive that it denies a person equal educational access; or C. Sexual assault, dating violence, domestic violence, or stalking. <p>An employee found to be responsible for sexual harassment will be subject to discipline, up to and including termination. A student found to be responsible for sexual harassment will be subject to discipline, up to and including suspension and expulsion. New BOE Policy 1117 supplements 1115 and 1116. In the event of conflict between the requirements of new BOE Policy 1117, on the one hand, and 1115 or 1116, new BOE Policy 1117 will control.</p> <p>This item provided an opportunity for the Board's first review of new BOE Policy 1117 - Sexual Harassment and Complaint Procedures. The Board had no suggestions for additional work on this policy.</p>

<p>Wichita High School North Mascot Appendix 16</p>	<p>Many organizations and teams – from professional teams to college teams to high schools teams – have started evaluating the impact of culturally-insensitive mascots. The Board received many letters requesting that they look at the Wichita High School North mascot to examine the social impact and ramifications on our students and our district. BOE Policy 1216 – School Themes was provided in Appendix 16 for reference purposes.</p> <p>Executive Director of Public Affairs and Special Project Terrell Davis presented four recommendations of the North High Mascot Committee. The complete presentation is included in the archival copies of this BOE Agenda and Minutes.</p> <p><u>Recommendation #1:</u> Discontinue the use of the Redskin mascot/nickname. Rationale: The term is offensive to Native Americans and the Native American Culture. The term is racially and culturally insensitive.</p> <p><u>Recommendation #2:</u> Adhere to BOE Policy 1216 – School Themes. The policy states: “The building principal is responsible for the development of school themes, songs, flags, mascots, and so forth. The principal is particularly responsible for determining that these themes are not offensive to minority ethnic groups within the school.”</p> <p><u>Recommendation #3:</u> Begin a two-year phase-in plan starting in the 2021-22 school year to remove Redskin from Athletic and Fine Arts uniforms, jerseys, facilities, school-related activities ,and school apparel.</p> <p>Exceptions: All trophy cases and statues will remain as they are currently. The Committee emphasized that this plan is not about rewriting history or erasing the great pride and accomplishments of the Wichita High School North Community and Alumni.</p> <p><u>Recommendation #4:</u> The development of a 9th grade curriculum to be implemented in Advocacy class that highlights the great history of North High School and it’s Native American influence. The curriculum would be developed in conjunction with the Native American Program and include hands-on experience with Native American artifacts. Highlights would include: History of the location of the school, why the location was selected, history of the building, its construction, and unique historical architecture.</p> <p>Ms. Logan (Mr. Rosales) moved the Board adhere to BOE Policy 1216 – School Theme’s and accept this committee’s recommendations, which include dropping the use of the name Redskins as the North High mascot.</p> <p>The motion passed 6-0.</p>

Esteemed Members of the Wichita Board of Education,

I write to you in gratitude for your recognition of the critical opportunity before us to reconsider North High School's racist mascot. While there are some truly difficult challenges facing us as educators, the issue of the mascot is uniquely within our complete control to make right. Rarely is it so simple to make a profound change for the good, and it is our great fortune to be the ones who can put North High on the right side of history at last.

I am the proud parent of a North High graduate (class of 2019) and a current North senior, and I am equally proud to teach in the North High English Department. To work here and to have my children educated here are choices I would make a hundred times over: I believe in this school, its devoted staff, and its wonderful students, who every day give me cause for hope and joy.

I also believe with my whole heart in the transformative power of language, in its potential to act as a balm against the abrasive, corrosive forces that threaten us: this belief fuels my work. But there can be no doubt, in this year of national reckoning, that language can itself be the corrosive, abrasive agent that inflicts lasting damage. We choose which it will be.

As proud as I am, and as proud as my children are, to have invested our identities in this school, there has always been an element of shame attached, an embarrassed unease and demurral when dear friends and classmates wear clothes and repeat slogans that feature the word *R**skin*. In honoring North tradition, generations of graduates have been compelled to dishonor entire cultures, to engage symbolically, if not consciously, in seeming support of the acts of cultural hegemony and genocide that drove indigenous peoples from the very lands where the school now stands. I do not doubt that this is meant as anything more than innocuous school spirit. But I believe it is not innocuous, that instead it damages us at the level of the soul to so casually use this word, attached as it is to historic acts of racist hatred and violence.

I fear, too, that it marks us in the eyes of the world. As teachers, we work tirelessly to ensure our graduates can take their rightful place on the global stage, heads held high. I fear that a self-proclaimed identity as *R**skins* will cost them the respect they deserve and have worked so hard to earn. Let a choice of a new mascot be our gift to the students we serve, and for generations we will never meet, that their pride in North High may shine unabashed as a beacon, an emblem of the choice to do better. Let that choice be the tradition we choose to honor. Let it start with us, today.

I'm a North High alum, not in favor of the mascot name change. I'm also white and although I am of Western European heritage I am still referred to in media and by government by the color of my skin. And usually I'm asked to identify as a non-Hispanic white. I'm not complaining. It seems convenient and only to some is it considered a slur. My guess is it is primarily whites who define the North mascot as racially insensitive. I believe it was likely recognition for native Americans and not insensitivity that brought their culture and heritage into the building architecture, traditions and mascot. I'm also under the impression that the result of striking the mascot name in the guise of racial sensitivity will also strike the visible heritage and traditions of a proud and historic race. I see it as cancel culture's way of minimizing the contributions of a racial minority. USD259 School Board Members,

My name is David Quick and I have enjoyed living in Riverside fifty of my seventy-five years. My mother was a proud student in the first Wichita High School North class in 1929 and my brother graduated from North in 1957. I graduated from North High fifty-eight years ago in 1963. I salute North High School Graduates of 2020 and 2021 and honor their incredible and unexpected educational adventures. I was involved in music and theater programs at North and I ran track and was on the tennis team and I was very privileged to get to take advanced art courses and honors english and literature programs. I got a very solid education that helped lead to my later being an Artist-In-Residence at the University of Pennsylvania and teaching for Bryn Mawr College as well as at historic Philadelphia prep schools including William Penn's own Penn Charter Academy and at notable art centers in Pennsylvania and New Jersey and at Wichita State University. All without graduating from college because the tumultuous times of the 1960s interfered with my graduating from Friends University. Still I achieved much because of my three years experience at Friends and a solid academic base at North High School.

While at North some of my friends and I made a little poetry and opinion chapbook and during my senior year in 1963 I visited with Principal C.E. Strange and other school administrators and asked if some school related materials being sold in the little school closet bookstore could be removed from sale because they were demeaning and discriminatory. One item I showed them is the car window decal shown below. I said that I felt it was not honoring Native American culture but came frighteningly close to the type of stereotypical propaganda produced during the 1930s Germany dictatorship. I was also in the honors history program.

The administrators did not want to discuss the issue so I was sent to visit with the Senior Class Counselor who suggested that I was just trying to gain unwarranted attention and that I should simply be quiet and learn to be more loyal to my school. Nobody with authority would discuss the stereotypical image or nickname with me other than two nurturing teachers and some personal friends. Before the earlier School Board Meeting that was to once again discuss North's nickname had to be cancelled because of our on-going health emergency a woman who was also in my graduating class suggested that " various out-of-state and nationally known organizations such as football teams and Nike were again trying to make decisions for the entire country " and saying "No cancel culture can truly erase history and reality." She stated that was why she supported keeping the traditional nickname. "Cancel culture" is of course a currently popular political trope that was not yet invented when we graduated from North High fifty-eight years ago.

I do believe that some types of "cancel culture" have existed and that it is a truly terrible thing. Over a hundred thousand Native American people being forced to leave their homelands because of the Indian Removal Acts beginning in the 1830s with hundreds of men and women and children dying as they traveled on the notorious Trail of Tears from the Eastern and Southeastern United States to the arid and remote unsettled Southwest seems an obvious attempt to cancel several cultures. Likewise dozens of broken treaties and whole peoples being driven to live in remote parts of our land where health and social problems and abject poverty often still abound seems like on-going cancellation of culture. I have had friends in Kansas and Oklahoma who as children were forcibly separated from their families and tribal groups and sent to schools where they were punished for speaking their native language and that is without doubt another form of cancelling culture. Sadly anyone familiar with the often violent history of western expansion in this country is aware of the terribly violent other non-racial meaning of the North High School nickname.

This month The Riverside Booster monthly newspaper is publishing five of my photographs of Park Villa at various times of year. I enjoy sharing my love of this area with others and a couple of weeks ago I began preparing a second submission to the paper I hope the editors might find interesting. It includes seven of my photographs of North High School and The Minisa Bridge I've made over the last dozen years plus a short article I have been preparing regarding the amazing famous decorative sculpture and murals at North High that were designed by the Wichita sculptor Bruce Moore. Moore's work was carefully complimentary with the actual real history of the life of Native Peoples who once lived along the Little Arkansas River. It beautifully pays homage to the lives of both Native Americans and this area's early settlers as well as highlighting some of the wildlife such as buffalo and eagles that once thrived in the area. Bruce Moore's nationally recognized vision had nothing to do with an at best controversial nickname or with misguided and stereotypical mimicking of tribal practices that have no relation to the real lives of the original residents of Riverside and the North High School area.

I have long believed that we can continue to proudly honor our original Native American residents as well as early area settlers who include some of my relatives and also honor Bruce Moore's loving visions of Native Peoples without continuing to propagate stereotypical inaccurate political and social tropes that did unfortunately exist in the late 1920s when North High School opened. I respectfully believe it is far past time for a change to a more appropriate North High School nickname. Hopefully we can have a respectful and thoughtful discussion about this issue and hopefully not have to revisit it yet again in the future. (Below is the 1963 North High School car window decal I mentioned juxtaposed with one of my photos of Bruce Moore's beautiful and respectful sculpture on the Minisa Bridge.) Dear BOE Members,

We are now in 2021, moving into a decade which a few years ago, was conceptualized as "Vision 2020" - the embodiment of a New Beginning. It is (past) time to deconstruct the paradigm of White Supremacy that has prevented genuine cultural pluralism in this nation far too long.

Among other changes, deconstructing the White Supremacist model means we discontinue the use of derogatory terms that refer to "racial" appearance of "non-White" people - like "Darkie", "Slant-Eye" & "Redskins". It also means re-evaluating the concept of having a caricatured Native American as a "mascot", including the misappropriation of regalia taken totally out of cultural context to use as a "mascot costume".

The issue of the NHS "Redskins" has been around a long time. When I was a senior in 1965, I took this issue to the Student Government. I spoke up against the racism of this term, because of family heritage & because I was raised with strong social justice values. Two long time members of Mid-American All Indian Center (MAAIC), Sandra Hulseley & Bob Marley, related that they had been part of an Indian panel that spoke (circa 1980's) to NHS parents/students to educate the non-Indians as to why the term & mascot were disrespectful. They said that the (non-Indian) audience "booed" them. There was a circa 1995 "survey" about the issue, which evidently did not seek out Native Indian Community input. Strangely, the survey showed that those (non-Natives) surveyed did not find the name "Redskins" to be a problem. See link below for some Indian Community feedback given at that time in response to the survey. A link is also included that elaborates on the historic tie between the word "Redskin" & the scalp bounty paid for having killed an Indian.

Now, thanks to the Shawnee Mission School District & the Washington "Redskins", the NHS "Redskins/mascot" issue comes back around again. It's time to discontinue this cultural insult & the psychological damage it causes to Native kids who grew up internalizing these caricatures of their culture. Drop the name "Redskins" & find a respectful way, including input from the Native Community, to arrive at a new "mascot" name - it doesn't have to be a person (Bison Butch might be an option). The upset people will get over it & eventually re-establish their loyalty to the new NHS identity. Below is a link to a 2019 article re Wisconsin's School system when they rose to this same challenge.

My name is Monte Vines, a 1974 alumnus of North High. I saw in the Wichita Eagle today that the Board of Education will be taking up the matter of North High's mascot/name at Monday's meeting, and that input from the community is welcome by sending it to you as Clerk of the Board. I have a suggestion I'd like you to pass along to the Board.

Over the years I had been on the fence about the issue of North's Redskins name/mascot. When I was a student there, and over the years since then, it seemed to me that North did a nice job of embracing the Native American connection in a positive and uplifting way. It seemed like a way to honor that culture rather than to demean or belittle it. But I also saw that both the name Redskins and the idea of a racial or ethnic group put into the status of a mascot could legitimately be seen as offensive and demeaning. In recent years I've come to think that the name and mascot does need to change.

I know that's a challenging process, because of the traditions and strong feelings of many North High alumni and others in the community. It would be a challenge to change—and not to change.

The Board may not be aware that North High counts among its many interesting and successful alumni a person who has excelled at working with institutions on their identity and rebranding. Bill Gardner, of Gardner Designs, North High Class of 1975, has a wealth of experience with that. If the Board were to engage Gardner Designs to undertake a process to rethink North High's identity and brand, I think Bill and his team, especially with his North High connection, could find a way to harness many of the various feelings and ideas and much of the energy people have about this issue toward a productive end.

I'm sure engaging Gardner Designs to lead this effort would involve substantial time and effort for them and entail a significant cost as well. As to the cost, I can think of three potential sources of funding for this. Of course, USD 259 may think an effort like this would justify some direct funding. Beyond that, I think there would be a number of North High alumni who would be willing to donate to a fund to support this. I would be. And I think the Wichita Community Foundation might consider this to be an issue they would like to get behind with some funding as well. I could contact Shelley Pritchard to explore the Foundation's interest in it if the Board is interested. I don't have a good idea of how much an effort like this would cost, but it seems the funding could be found.

Rather than send you this suggestion with no idea whether Bill Gardner would be interested and willing to get involved in it, I took the liberty of running it by Bill. Since it is right down the alley of his expertise, and because of his North High connection, he let me know that he would be interested. And I understand from Bill that USD 259 has worked with Bill and his company before on other rebranding type projects. So I assume the Board may be familiar with Bill and his work.

The bottom line for me is that it seems inevitable that at some point North High's mascot will change. We might as well do it now when there is a lot of momentum for such things in our society, and we might as well make it as positive a process as possible. I think engaging Bill Gardner and his company to lead the process would be a way to make it as positive a process as possible—and come away with a well thought out, well-designed, fresh new identity and brand for North High that would be widely embraced.

Let me know if you would like anything more on this idea from me. Or, if you want to look into what such an effort might entail, I'm sure Bill could engage with you or the Board or other USD 259 staff about it.

Subject: Please Cease and Desist using my Cultural Identity.

Boozhoo! I am a member of the Ojibwe, Meskwaki, and Dakota Nations and I have a lot of experience and knowledge in this matter having run a family youth drum at the Mid America All Indian Center. Mascot imagery has always been an issue since the inception of sport related activities in the school districts. Several Native rights groups have brought this to the forefront of our direct action because there are several correlations that often go unnoticed. Issues pertaining to not only self esteem and academic performance, but how Native youth perceive themselves, as well as how they are perceived by non-natives. While many are often quick to point out that this may be their first time hearing of these issues or that it's the first time anyone has raised concern. This is simply untrue and due to the lack of representation and dismissiveness of these communities. Many Natives are often met with dismissiveness as well as divisiveness by those claiming to "honor" them through the stereotypical and often racist imagery, with some exchanges even escalating to the point of hostility. Many Natives would rather sit quiet for fear of being ostracised or being excluded from the communities that they are a part of. Mascots tend to dumb down and dissolve a very complex and diverse group of people into what is considered to be their base traits or "stereotypes". Focusing solely on the aesthetic and superficial, this is not only demeaning but it commoditizes their existing Identity and eventually eclipses another's understanding of it. This is racist whether intentional or not, due to the gross overgeneralization and exaggeration of what traits make an "Indian", "Indian". With people misusing the imagery from our spirituality and painting themselves red or with warpaint. This not only parodies an existing minority but it is also extremely harmful to our communities. We have some of the highest statistics pertaining to suicides, dropout rates, sexual assaults and missing and murdered women in the United States and Canada. The reason for this ties back to the dehumanization stemming from mascot imagery and the notion that our communities exist in the "past tense". Mascots do this regardless of intention and they do this to great extent often rendering us invisible. Using imagery that is often offensive or romanticized, they continue to dehumanize and place us further into the realm of myth. By putting us in the same category as animals, inanimate objects and civilizations from a bygone era, this not only locks us into that past tense but portrays us as something fun or humorous. Something to be mocked or imitated and exploited. Regardless of intent, the harm far exceeds anything "honorable" that is said to come from mascot imagery. This also creates an alienating and hostile atmosphere for traditional Native students who are being pitted against other "native" students who are either self identifying, less than 1/4, or simply didn't grow up in their culture. It not only tokenizes "well behaved" students but forces the traditional students to assimilate and expects them to keep quiet in order to fit in. Thus perpetuating the "Kill the Indian and save the child" mentality of the boarding schools, furthering Native erasure and any attempt in salvaging an already wounded Identity. The other issue here is with the conduct of the other schools who will be playing against these teams. Again Mascots only create further hostility towards Native people, continuing the "us vs them" mentality harkening back to manifest destiny and early colonialism. How is a Native student expected to feel safe and comfortable while trying to process other students shouting "F++k them redskins!" or carrying banners that read "We'll send you on another Trail of Tears!". They are literally trivializing ethnic cleansing and using the suffering of people for "good fun" and for the sake of throwing a few barbs at the rival team. That is not only irresponsible but harmful to our native communities. The term "Redskin" was originally used in reference to the scalps taken from native people as bounties by settlers and bounty hunters and the argument posed by the "Washington Redskins" about the body paint worn by a specific tribe does not represent the entirety of our people and would've been unique to the eastern region and a very sacred practice, therefore it does not hold any merit. Another issue I'd like to talk about is ownership and Identity. We have a right to our identity and we are not a commodity. The only arguments being raised are only being done by those who feel like they have as much of a right to our Identity and culture as we do. Anything that would be argued by current students or alumni is based in sentimental value and superficial reasoning. They do not own our likeness and are losing nothing in showing us respect and decency. Our culture and Identities were stolen from us while we were forbidden from practicing, let alone being Indian. It appears that pressure from The Wichita Eagle's Editorial Board has caused the 259 school board to hurry and schedule a meeting on the North High mascot even though we cannot have public participation in-person to voice our opinions. The following is a letter to the Editor of The Wichita Eagle that I submitted following their editorial, but so far there have been no published letters allowed to be printed. We may have run out of time since there is a push to act immediately so I am forwarding it to the board for consideration.

Suzanne Perez, on behalf of The Wichita Eagle Editorial Board has declared the North High School mascot "Redskins" as being "a derogatory term for Native Americans ... it's insulting, offensive and racist." The cancel culture is trying to claim yet another victim. As a graduate from North High in 1968, I never heard any student refer to the term in a derogatory manner. We were quite proud of the Native American theme of our school in portraying a positive picture of American Indian culture. We have a buffalo head mounted in the hallway named "Butch" that was a center of attention. The pep rallies revolved around Indian culture. The building and bridge over the Little Arkansas River contain many references to the American Indian. The Washington Post has traced the origin of the term "redskins" through history and found that it was first used in 1769 in a letter from Indian Chief Mosquito to a British lieutenant colonel that referred to his people as "redskins". The next reference was on August 22, 1812 when Little Osage Chief Sans Oreilles (No Ears) referred to the whites and red-skins. Then Sioux Chief French Crow referred to himself as a red-skin. On July 20, 1815, Meskwaki Chief Black Thunder gave a speech referring to red skins and white skins as reported in the Western Journal in St. Louis. Obviously the Indian chiefs were not intending to refer to their people in a derogatory manner. The Washington Post has reported about a poll that was conducted by them and also the Annenberg Public Policy Center. Both polls show that 90% of the Native Americans were not offended by the Washington Redskins name. In 2014, even the Red Mesa High School in Arizona on a Native American reservation had 88% of the students in favor of retaining their own mascot "Redskins". Only 7% of the students found the term offensive. It seems that the majority of those trying to change the term are white liberals that proclaim to be woke and never attended Wichita North High.

I ask the Wichita school district to follow the example of so many other districts and sports organizations and retire the North High Redskins mascot. Across the country, it is a term that's heralded by a white majority as an honorific while the majority of native nations call for its retirement. I went to the University of Illinois that used Chief Illini as the mascot for most of the school's history. A large number of the alumni threatened to withdraw support from the University if the mascot was retired, saying the Chief was central to honoring the heritage of the university and nothing was wrong with it. I see a nearly identical situation here in Wichita regarding North's mascot.

But it's the outcomes that matter, not intentions. I am a North High alumni. I am writing you as a promise I made when I was a student there. The North High mascot of Natives should not be changed. The school has a very rich tradition surrounding the mascot, changing the mascot would be a waste of public funds, and those who oppose the mascot make their arguments using false information.

The origin of the North High mascot has its roots in the Civil War. The Riverside area of Wichita was inhabited by an Indian tribe the city was named after. They fled to the Wichita area to escape persecution and help support the Union in winning the civil war. When Wichita needed a second school we decided to continue to honor the tribe by decorating our entire school with native imagery. We are the only school in Wichita that requires learning to canoe to graduate. Many of the schools rituals and traditions are based on this mascot.

Those who oppose the mascot oppose it for two reasons. The first being they believe that only schools on reservations have the right to use the term. This would require a remodeling of the entire school and removal of all the statues along with a remodeling of the bridge on 13th street. Dear Members of the Board,

I am writing to express my support for changing North High's mascot. I was born and raised in Wichita, and graduated from North High in 1978. My three siblings are also North High graduates: 1969, 1973, and 1975. I recognize the great affection many former and current students have for our beautiful school and its traditions. However, despite that affection and the sincere conviction of those who hold it that the term is not derogatory, the racial epithet used for North High's team and its mascot is indeed an offensive slur to many people and a perpetuation of ethnic stereotypes. Those who have nostalgia for this term are not entitled to decide that others have no right to be offended by it. In 1968, the National Congress of American Indians launched a campaign to address stereotypes of Native Americans in media. Since that time, more than 40 sports teams have taken a step forward and moved past the idea of using Native Americans as mascots. Last July, after a long and very public campaign to convince the Washington, DC, football team to change its name, the team and the National Football League finally announced that the name would change. And in December, the Cleveland Major League Baseball team announced that it would end its use of "Indians" as its name and mascot. In 2013, USA Today compiled this partial list of colleges and universities that have changed their teams' names:

- Stanford University – Indians to Cardinal (1972)
- University of Massachusetts – Redmen to Minutemen (1972)
- Dartmouth – Indians to Big Green (1974)
- Siena – Indians to Saints (1988)
- Eastern Michigan – Hurons to Eagles (1991)
- St. John's (N.Y.) – Redmen to Red Storm (1994)
- Marquette – Warriors to Golden Eagles (1994)
- Miami (Ohio) – Redskins to RedHawks (1997)
- Seattle University – Chieftains to Redhawks (2000)
- Louisiana-Monroe – Indians to Warhawks (2006)
- Arkansas State – Indians to Red Wolves (2008)
- North Dakota – formally dropped Fighting Sioux in 2012. No nickname currently.

Martin Luther King, Jr., reminded us that "the arc of the moral universe is long, but it bends toward justice." The fact that our country's long journey toward civil rights, equality, and dignity for all has made progress but is not yet over is demonstrated by the fact that this part of the struggle continues. I would remind the Board that this issue was discussed nearly a quarter-century ago in Wichita, at a public hearing resulting from the recommendation of USD 259's Committee on Desegregation to change the North High mascot. The arc of the moral universe bends toward justice not on its own, but through the efforts of those who pursue that goal. I am hopeful that this time the Board will take this step forward that we may continue our path toward justice.

It was the 1970's and while our culture was beginning to be more aware of cultural diversity, we were not yet there.

Forty decades have passed since I graduated and I have had an opportunity to become more aware of what is appropriate and what is not in terms of cultural identity. I am absolutely sure that when the mascot was chosen no disrespect was meant. However, I am also sure "Redskin" was never a term of honor. Mascots are supposed to be strong and fierce, hence the choice of "redskin" for a mascot to match the beautiful architecture and to portray a school that is strong and warrior like.

I believe the name needs to change. It is offensive to Native Americans. It is offensive, period. There is no way to make the name appropriate. It doesn't matter what alumni think or the dominant culture thinks, it IS inappropriate and offensive. The headdress was retired years ago when it became clear that it was not honoring tradition, but was using it in a way that was culturally inappropriate.

Years ago we didn't know better, now we do. When we know better, we do better and we can do better. Many schools have changed their mascots in light of new information and in order to not offend. The world did not come to an end when the name changed. In the years to come the current students and students who follow will still be proud of their school, their relationships and their class identity.

It is past time to change the name. It may not be popular with everyone, but it is the right thing to do. I am a proud alumni, not because of a name, which I don't use any more, but because of the wonderful teachers and staff and coaches and friends that have made those memories sweet. Please do the right thing and let's come up with a new mascot that does not degrade our Native American brothers and sisters.

I am a 1969 graduate and have always been proud of my high school with its tribute to its history.....
"The Indian theme used throughout the design of the building is more than a matter of choices - the Indian was responsible, indirectly, for the founding of North High School.

In the 1860's the Wichita Indians moved here from Oklahoma to escape persecution for their support of the Union cause in the Civil War. They settled near the junction of the Big and little Arkansas Rivers in what is now the Riverside area. In 1867 the United States government sent Company 'A' of the 10th Division to the forks of the Arkansas to protect the incoming cattle drivers from the Indians. After the arrival of the Army troops, white settlers came to the Area and a small settlement began to develop. The school had fourteen students enrolled and was located at Twelfth and Jackson Streets. North High School is located on the site.

By 1929, the population of Wichita was so great that the only high school (East, built in 1922) could no longer accommodate the city's high school students. Plans for a new high school were begun. A fifteen-acre land site was purchased at Twelfth and Jackson Streets and three architectural styles, Romanesque, Gothic, and Modern American, were presented to the Board of Education - the Modern American style was selected for the new school.

Bruce Moore, an artist who graduated from East High School, designed the decorative portions of the building's exterior. Using his knowledge of the site's history, Mr. Moore used a Pioneer\Native American theme for his design. He constructed the original small-scale figures of plaster. Full-sized figures were then made and arranged to tell the story of pioneer days; the Indian chief, scout, hunter and teepee represent the Indians' story; the buffalo, eagle, plowman, sunflower, and state seal symbolize the early pioneers."

Instead of allowing that history to go by the wayside, educating students and the public about the tribute before any decision is made concerning the mascot would be appropriate.

Subject: North High School mascot; BOE Meeting Monday 2-8-2021

I taught for 25 years at Wichita West High School. I remember the debate over the North High mascot back in 1998, when Ralph Teran was principal. I remember visiting with some of my Native students who were in favor of retiring the mascot. This is certainly not a new issue – here we are 23 years later. Now, because it has become a “national issue” and others are making changes, we are finally once again considering changing a racist mascot. I wish we could say that we here in Wichita had led the way in making this change. As was the case over 20 years ago, there will be those who argue on the side of “tradition”. What about tradition? We have a devotion to our school and its history. We’ve always been the R-----s. Agreed – that is tough to deal with. It involves abandoning a significant symbol tied to one’s devotion, one’s loyalty, one’s pride, and even one’s honor. How can a community possibly neglect and consider abandoning years and years of tradition -- of being R-----s? An honored tradition at North High School might be lost. Believe me, Indigenous Peoples around the world know what that’s like. Having one’s time-honored loyalties, pride, and honor removed is something with which they are all too familiar. A dominant white society has taken almost everything away from First Nations Peoples – their homes, their lives, their lands, their language, and their culture. Children were taken from their families, and were forbidden to speak their own language. Native American’s spirituality was ignored; they were reduced to “savages”. The mantra was to “kill the I-----n but save the man”. Manifest Destiny crushed the very essence of what it meant to be Kaw, Osage, or Wichita. Although ignored by authors of our history books, these injustices toward Indigenous Peoples are acknowledged by most people today. We have robbed hundreds of tribes of their dignity. And so we’re saddened about losing our “tradition”? Let’s face reality -- We have created our tradition at the expense of another’s.

A second argument for keeping a racist mascot has always been the idea of honoring the Native American. We say, “we have no intention of degrading or demeaning Native Americans by choosing R-----s as a mascot. As we put on our sweatshirts, voice our cheers, and display Go R-----s throughout our school, I am certain we are not thinking in that moment of the Kaw tribe. We are not thinking of, much less honoring – the Cherokee, the Chickasaw, the Kiowa. And that - I maintain - is the problem. If we were thinking of living breathing people of Native American descent, we might reconsider our words and actions. Our 70+ years of use, has created a “brand”, a “label” an “identity”. It becomes engrained into our culture and has created a tradition which we value and to which we pledge our loyalty and in which we take pride. We are the R-----s.! Once a R-----n, always a R-----n! As time passes, we “don’t think about real people behind the symbol; it’s just our mascot – like Eagles, Grizzlies or Wildcats. We aren’t really honoring a people; and we don’t really intend to degrade a people, yet we are indifferent as to how Native American Peoples may be affected by our use of R-----s as our mascot. Through the years of use, the R-----n mascot is relegated to some past notion (I would call it a stereotype) of what R-----s were. That image is not accurate regarding Indigenous People of the past and it is most certainly not accurate as to the reality of Indigenous People today. This has occurred, not by design or intention, but by lack of awareness and concern. Past wrongs slip from our memories. We become indifferent to historical reality and to the integrity and dignity of a people living in two worlds. In creating our caricatures, we are not intentionally pejorative, but neither are we being thoughtful.

How do we return the long overdue dignity and respect to Indigenous tribes of the Americas? As I discuss my concerns with those willing to listen, the question which arises is, “what can be done?” “We can’t possibly return ‘everything’ back to the tribes. It’s hopeless.” On the contrary there is much we can do, and we are morally obligated to do it. We can return the respect for and the dignity of the Navajo, the Arapahoe, the Cheyenne, the Sioux..... In my opinion we can begin by eliminating all Native American mascots from all our schools. I urge the Board of Education to begin a concerted effort to return the power, the honor, the glory, and the dignity to our First Nations People. One small step will be eliminating the overtly racist R-----n mascot from North High School.
