2. Door and Hardware Replacement – Bryant Opportunity Academy

2022-23 Budget

Purpose: The 2022-23 Capital Outlay Budget includes monies for Door and Hardware Replacement(s). At Bryant Opportunity Academy, revisions to the door partitioning of the building that are used for fire compartmentalization and egress are needed to accommodate critical programming needs. Final door and hardware selection is being designed by Alloy Architecture that includes two (2) sets of double doors and four (4) wood office doors with the respective hardware required by code for each application. The doors are being pre purchased now to overcome supply chain lead times to facilitate installation starting over Spring Break 2023.

The doors and hardware materials will be purchased through DH Pace via purchasing cooperative (TIPS).

Recommendation: It is recommended that The Board approve an amount not to exceed \$60,000 for the Door and Hardware Replacement at Bryant Opportunity Academy.

Purpose: The 2022-23 Capital Outlay Fund includes monies for HVAC Upgrades at various district sites. Bids were received on October 17, 2022, according to plans and specifications prepared by Midwest Engineering, Inc., to provide HVAC Upgrades at Cessna Elementary School. Replacing the aging mechanical systems at Cessna Elementary School will improve the indoor air quality by providing higher quality ventilation and filtration. Equipment to be upgraded through replacement includes roof top units and split systems. HVAC control system upgrades are also included and incorporate new sensors and alarm functions to monitor and control indoor air quality, comfort, and energy, consistent with current code requirements and district standards. Final project completion is anticipated at the conclusion of summer 2023. The low base bid was submitted by Dean Norris Inc in the amount of \$2,401,806.

Recommendation: It is recommended that The Board approve an amount not to exceed \$2,642,000 which includes the above base bid, and contingency amount of \$240,194 with Dean Norris Inc for HVAC Upgrade at Cessna Elementary School.

4. ESSER HVAC Upgrade and Renovations – Cloud Elementary School

Purpose: The 2022-23 Capital Outlay Fund includes monies for HVAC Upgrades at various district sites. Bids were received on October 31, 2022, according to plans and specifications prepared by Midwest Engineering, Inc., to provide Building Upgrades at Cloud Elementary School including HVAC, roofing, and windows. Replacing the aging mechanical systems at Cloud Elementary School will improve the indoor air quality by providing higher quality ventilation and filtration. Equipment to be upgraded through replacement includes boilers, chillers, HVAC pumps, dedicated outside air system, classroom units with new blower coils, and replacement of hydronic and chilled water piping. HVAC control system upgrades are also included and incorporate new sensors and alarm functions to monitor and control indoor air quality, comfort, and energy, consistent with current code requirements and district standards. The planned HVAC improvements will be completed in four classroom blocks of staging during the school year, with new piping scope to be performed over summer months to allow the existing HVAC systems to continue functioning while the replacements occur. A portion of the building's roof and windows will also be replaced in order to better mitigate water infiltration and humidity impact on indoor air quality. Final project completion is anticipated at the conclusion of summer 2024. The low base bid was submitted by Key Construction Inc in the amount of \$8,041,000.

Recommendation: It is recommended that The Board approve an amount not to exceed of \$9,422,073, which includes the above base bid, alternate one (1) \$329,855, alternate two (2) \$42,218 and contingency amounts of \$1,009,000 with Key Construction Inc for HVAC Upgrade at Cloud Elementary School.

Purpose: The 2022-23 Capital Outlay Fund includes monies for HVAC Upgrades at various district sites. Bids were received on November 1, 2022, according to plans and specifications prepared by Midwest Engineering, Inc., to provide HVAC Upgrades at Jefferson Elementary School. Replacing the aging mechanical systems at Jefferson Elementary School will improve the indoor air quality by providing higher quality ventilation and filtration. Equipment to be upgraded through replacement includes boilers, chillers, HVAC pumps, dedicated outside air system, classroom units with new blower coils, and replacement of hydronic and chilled water piping. HVAC control system upgrades are also included and incorporate new sensors and alarm functions to monitor and control outdoor air, comfort, and energy, consistent with current code requirements and district standards. Final project completion is anticipated at the conclusion of summer 2024. The low base bid was submitted by Central Consolidated in the amount of \$3,673,460.

Recommendation: It is recommended that The Board approve an amount not to exceed of \$4,216,000, which includes the above base bid, alternate one (1) \$357,725, alternate five (5) \$268,460, alternate nine (9) \$161,490, alternate ten (10) \$497,650 and contingency amounts of \$542,540 with Central Consolidated Inc for HVAC Upgrade at Jefferson Elementary School.

6. Security Improvement Projects – Construction Manager at Risk

Purpose: K.S.A. 72-1152, et al., Kansas Unified School District Alternative Project Delivery Building Construction Procurement Act, enables school districts to retain a Construction At-Risk Manager on school construction projects. The district intends to design and construct various security improvement projects involving: front entrance controlled access remodels, classroom teacher locks, door replacements, intercoms, and code compliance corrections as needed. The CM At-Risk alternative project delivery method offers some clear advantages on a project of this scope and size, as disclosed in the following state statute requirements for consideration:

- Delivery method will save time and money by enabling construction to start sooner, more effectively stagger work/scope, better plan for lead times and material pricing fluctuations.
- Design and construction phases can be overlapped in order to expedite less design-intensive scope, while completing and procuring larger scale scope.
- This delivery method will enable us to accelerate the schedule in the interest of more quickly addressing top priority security improvements.
- The scope will span across numerous buildings over multiple years. The phasing and coordination will be complex. Engaging both the design and construction team early on as collaborative partners in the development process will help ensure successful project completion.
- This delivery method encourages fair competition amongst contractors and provides more bid transparency, while reducing project risk.

A public hearing is required before a school board takes action on such a project. The district scheduled a legal notice for publication in The Derby Informer on 10/31/22 which ran through 11/6/22. This agenda item provides an opportunity for public comment prior to the Board taking any action.

Recommendation: It is recommended that the Board authorize approval to proceed with the Construction Manager At-Risk Delivery Method for security improvement projects at forty-eight (48) sites.

1. Motion Picture Licensing Corporation - Umbrella Copyright License

Purpose: Movies and TV entertain, educate, and inspire. However, content is intended for personal, private use only and requires a license when shown in public. This provision of the U.S. Copyright Act applies to public exhibitions of movies including public education organizations. TV, and other audiovisual content enjoyed from sources like broadcast, cable or satellite television, DVD, Blu-ray, download, or streaming platforms.

A Motion Picture Licensing Corporation (MPLC) umbrella license provides a comprehensive copyright compliance solution. With the Umbrella License you can show unlimited movies, TV, and other audiovisual content with the assurance of copyright compliance. Obtain content on your own in any legal format including, but not limited to broadcast, cable or satellite television, DVD, Blu-ray, download, or streaming services. There is no obligation to report the titles shown.

Recommendation: It is recommended the Board of Education approve an agreement not to exceed \$25,000 for districtwide copyright compliance with MPLC.

2. Untamed Athletes

2022-23 Budget

Purpose: Untamed Athletes will provide mentoring and support services to at-risk youth identified by school staff as needing individual, school-based mentoring. Students will meet regularly with mentors to focus on prosocial skills, goal setting, and behavior modification through physical fitness. This program is currently being used at Wells Middle School, with a potential to add others as interest increases.

Recommendation: It is recommended that the Board authorize the district to enter in an agreement with Untamed Athletes for the 2022-23 school year to provide mentoring services in an amount not to exceed \$54,000 beginning September 1, 2022 and ending May 31, 2023.

This brings the 2022-23 fiscal year-to-date total to \$37,885.73 for Civil Litigation services and \$29,039.56 for Worker’s Compensation services.

Purpose: PebbleGo is a curricular content hub specifically designed for K-2 students. Packed with informational articles, ready-made activities, and literacy supports for students of all abilities, it boosts engagement and fosters independent learning in core subject areas. PebbleGo Next provides a natural next step for 3rd-5th grade students with articles all aligned to state and national standards with a familiar, yet age-appropriate, experience and supports. PebbleGo Spanish supercharges dual language development and content-area literacy to add all 5 PebbleGo Spanish modules to supplement your existing PebbleGo subscription.

Recently Coughlan Companies, owner of a current district subscription – Buncee, has acquired PebbleGo. The district has a multi-year agreement for a Buncee subscription expiring June 30, 2025. Greater usage is expected from a partnership with PebbleGo. Coughlan Companies has agreed to transfer the agreement for Buncee and maintain terms to implement Pebble Go (Gold Package).

This request is for an amendment to the existing company agreement for access to the Pebble Go Gold Package service including Pebble Go Create.

Recommendation: It is recommended the Board of Education approve the proposed amendment and the implementation of Pebble Go.

4. Groundwater Interim Remedial Measures Project

Purpose: The Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) requires implementation of work plans relative to the delineation of groundwater constituents and groundwater remediation as part of the School Service Center Interim Remedial Measures project. This agenda item will provide for consultative services from Geosyntec Consultants, Inc. for the groundwater interim remedial measure performance monitoring and reporting; well repair and maintenance; targeted Enhanced in Situ Bioremediation (EISB) injections and reporting; and general consulting KDHE requests and requires as it pertains to this project.

Recommendation: It is recommended that the Board retain Geosyntec Consultants, Inc to implement work plans for the School Service Center Interim Remedial Measures Project as required by KDHE in an amount not to exceed \$206,200.

5. Water Damage and Concrete Repairs – Cleaveland Elementary

Purpose: On September 16, 2020, it was reported debris fell from the exterior of Cleaveland. Damage is due to water deterioration, resulting in cracking concrete, which is the cause of the debris. SGA was hired to appraise the damages which has been valued at \$86,037.58. Contingency funds of \$5,774.50 are necessary due to a portion of the project being scheduled for 2024.

Recommendation: It is recommended the Board approve a not-to-exceed number of \$91,812.08 for Reconstruction Services, LLC to conduct water-damaged concrete repairs.

6. Workers' Compensation Settlement: A.S.
