3. 2023 Excellence in Public Service Award

The Excellence in Public Service Award Program honors three public service employees each year whose work performance and community activities transcend the ordinary. Through this program, the City of Wichita, Sedgwick County and Wichita Public Schools also acknowledge the contributions of thousands of other dedicated public servants who, day after day, perform the tasks that make our community a great place to live and work.

Tim Elsen, a science teacher at Wilbur Middle School, received the 2023 Excellence in Public Service Award from the Wichita Public Schools. His community work includes being actively involved in Science Olympiad as well as the Kansas Association of Teachers of Science, where he was past president and served on the executive board and as a regional representative. He has been instrumental in creating regional conferences at no cost for teachers, which provided opportunities for networking, hands-on science experiences and fun activities for attendees.

Tim is one of the main facilitators of the regional Science Olympiad competition where middle schools from around the region compete to get to the state competition. He has served as the regional coordinator for two years and as a coach for 11 years. At Wilbur, he is the head of the school's recycling program and serves as an AVID coach. He has also been a mentor for second-year science teachers in the district and his classroom has been used as a model classroom by WPS' new teacher induction team. Tim was named an Outstanding Teacher of Science by the Kansas Association of Teachers of Science in Spring 2022, received the Kansas Association of Teachers of Science Region IV Science Teacher of Excellence Award in Spring 2013, and received the district's Good Apple Award three times.

Tim will be honored, along with the Excellence in Public Service Award winners from Sedgwick County and the City of Wichita, at a reception at Botanica on May 11.

1. New Teacher Center – Professional Learning and Support for New Teacher Induction

2022-23 and 2023-24 Budget

Purpose: The purpose of this agenda item is to request approval to purchase both professional learning and consultation support from New Teacher Center. From August 2023 to June 2024, they will provide professional learning and support to the team of 10-15 full-release mentors. It will include four days of New Teacher Center's Advanced Institute for Mentors, eight Mentor Forums, planning, and consultation support to NTI program leaders through 10 days of pre-implementation planning, implementation consultation, and in-field coaching. The New Teacher Induction Team will also be a member of a National Program Leader Network to partner with other districts around the country to focus on program quality and sustainability. Identified leaders in the New Teacher Induction program would be selected to participate in training to become a New Teacher Center trained facilitator in efforts to sustain these best practices for years to come in the program.

Recommendation: It is recommended that the Board approve the purchase of New Teacher Center Professional Learning and Consultation services to support New Teacher Induction in an amount not to exceed \$140,000.

Purpose: Fleeson, Goosing, Coulson & Kitch, LLC has submitted a statement for March 2023 legal services and expenses for Civil Litigation in the amount of \$20,864.00 and a March 2022 for the same services in the amount of \$10,312.80.

Purpose: The purpose of this item is to contract (for year two) with Public Consulting Group, Incorporated (PCG). PCG is a sole-source provider of the EDPlan Behavioral Threat Assessment software suite. This software is designed to support behavioral threat assessments, intervention, and referral services management. This system helps maximize transparency, fidelity, collaboration, efficiency, and reporting/data collection.

Recommendation: It is recommended that the board approve contracting with Public Consulting Group, Inc. in an amount not to exceed \$55,854 (as listed in the contract for year two) for annual licensing, support, and maintenance for the 2023-24 school year.

7. DreamBox Learning Online Math Program Appendix 10

2022-23 and 2023-24 Budget

Purpose: DreamBox Learning is an online software provider that focuses on mathematics education at the elementary and middle school levels. Students are offered over 2,000 mathematics lessons that adapt to individual learning needs. DreamBox Learning will support all elementary students during the daily math intervention block. Middle and high school newcomer students will also have access to this program to help develop math skills and language. DreamBox Learning can serve as a learning tool outside of the school day as well as students can access the program from their single sign-on.

Recommendation: It is recommended that the Board authorize the purchase of DreamBox Learning for K-5th grades, as well as for middle and high school newcomer students, in an amount not to exceed \$450,000.

8. High School Literacy Intervention Program (Renewal) Appendix 11

Purpose: Read 180/System 44 is the literacy intervention curriculum program for high school Tier 2 and Tier 3 students. Teachers provide large and small group instruction with support for individualized instruction via an online platform. The program is designed for students who are identified at risk in literacy on our district's Fastbridge reading screener.

Recommendation: It is recommended that the Board authorize the purchase of HMH Read 180/System 44 materials and online licenses from Houghton Mifflin Harcourt in amount not to exceed \$100,000.

9. K-8 Tier 2 and 3 Literacy Intervention Program (Renewal) Appendix 12

Purpose: LexiaCore5 is the literacy intervention curriculum program for elementary school Tier 2 students. Lexia Powerup is the literacy intervention curriculum for middle school Tier 3 students and decoding support for Tier 2 middle school students. Teachers provide large and small group instruction with support for individualized instruction in the online platform. The programs are designed for students who are identified at risk in literacy on our district's Fastbridge reading screener.

Recommendation: It is recommended that the Board authorize the purchase of Lexia Core5 and Lexia Powerup professional development and online licenses from Lexia in amount not to exceed \$350,000.

10. Kansas Gas Service Easement – South High School

Purpose: Kansas Gas Service, Kansas Public Utility has requested easement for installation of a new gas line at South High School. The twenty-foot-wide easement will run adjacent to the existing tennis courts south of the main campus, as shown in the attached appendix.

Recommendation: It is recommended that the Board approve the new easement with Kansas Gas Service for South High School.

11. Kitchen Remodels (Various Sites) – Professional Design Services

2023-24 Budget

Purpose: Capital Outlay and Nutrition Services funding have been allocated for Kitchen Remodel projects at East High School, Caldwell Elementary School, College Hill Elementary School, and Stanley Elementary School. The scope includes kitchen remodels and/or expansion for improved serving line operations and optimal use of kitchen space. The selection committee has recommended Schaefer Architecture as the design firm for these projects.

Recommendation: It is recommended that the Board enter into a contract with Schaefer Architecture for professional design services on the Kitchen Remodel projects at East High School, Caldwell Elementary School, College Hill Elementary School, and Stanley Elementary School, in an amount not to exceed \$400,000.

12. Library Connecting Roof – East High School

Funding Source: Capital Outlay, 47 Fund – Self-Funded Insurance Reserve

2022-23 Budget

Purpose: On November 28, 2022, the metal roof deck condition near the library next to the original Roosevelt building was evaluated. Based on the observed condition the metal deck was shown to be deteriorated and the structural capacity was compromised. The remaining areas of the roof were evaluated and shown to have similar deterioration. Temporary roofing was necessary to ensure the area was properly protected until a new roof and roof deck could be installed over the summer when students are not present.

Recommendation: It is recommended that the Board enter into a contract with Reconstruction Services LLC for the necessary roof replacement and temporary repairs as detailed above, in an amount not to exceed \$132,000, with funding split between capital and 47 funds

13. Middle School Literacy Intervention Program (Renewal)

Purpose: ReadingPlus is the literacy intervention curriculum program for middle school Tier 2 students. Teachers provide large and small group instruction with support for individualized instruction in the online platform. The program is designed for students who are identified at risk in literacy on our district's Fastbridge reading screener.

Recommendation: It is recommended that the Board authorize the purchase of ReadingPlus professional development and online licenses from DreamBox Learning in amount not to exceed \$275,000.

14. Nutrition Services Expansion – Construction Manager at Risk Services

2022-23 and 2023-24 Budget

Purpose: On February 13, 2023, the Board of Education approved Resolution “Nutrition Services Expansion – Construction Manager at Risk”. A Request for Qualifications (RFQ) was issued to interested general contractors, and four (4) firms were shortlisted to interview and provide proposals. Final scores were determined based on a combined weighting of interview, proposal, and fee scores, and Hutton Corporation was selected.

Recommendation: It is recommended that the Board enter into a contract with Hutton Corporation, contingent upon an agreeable contract, to provide Construction Manager at Risk services on the Nutrition Services Expansion project. Final construction scope and costs will be established in future GMP (Guaranteed Maximum Price) packages for approval by the Board of Education.

15. Playground Equipment – Various

Purpose: The Capital Outlay Budget includes monies for playground equipment at Horace Mann K-8 Dual Language Magnet, Enders Elementary School, Gardiner Elementary School, and Buckner Elementary School. The scope of this project includes playground equipment and installation. The selected company for these playground projects is ABCreative.

Recommendation: It is recommended that the Board enter into a contract with ABCreative for playground equipment at Horace Mann K-8 Dual Language Magnet, Enders Elementary School, Gardiner Elementary School, and Buckner Elementary School in an amount not to exceed \$600,000.

16. Pool Exterior Wall Repair – Northwest High School

Funding Source: Capital Outlay, 47 Fund – Self-Funded Insurance Reserve
2022-23 Budget

Purpose: On December 15, 2022, structural evaluations of the exterior wall of the pool area were conducted at Northwest High School. At that time, it was determined that the brick veneer was separating from the structural concrete masonry unit (CMU) wall. Additionally, structural steel beams and lintels were noted to have significant amounts of rust. As a result of the investigation, it was noted that immediate repairs are necessary, with the potential need for additional remediation measures, depending on what is uncovered during demolition. The selected company for wall repair is Reconstruction Services LLC.

Recommendation: It is recommended that the Board enter into a contract with Reconstruction Services LLC for pool exterior wall repair at Northwest High School, in an amount not to exceed \$200,000, with funding to be split between capital and 47 funds.

17. Purchase of Introduction to Health Science Resources

2022-23 Budget

Purpose: This program was started at West High School in 2001 and later at Northeast Magnet. It is being expanded to the remaining high schools in response to workforce needs in the community. Kansas has supported the Health Pathway by including courses in Excel in CTE and SB155.

Recommendation: It is recommended the purchase of Introduction to Health Science and teacher resources be approved in an amount not to exceed \$100,000. This will fund new textbooks, replacement textbooks and materials for additional schools in support of the Health Science Pathway. This program is currently being used at Northeast Magnet and West High School. In the 2023-24 school year, it will be expanded to include the other high schools to address the growing need in the workforce.

18. Water and Electrical Repairs – East High School

Purpose: On December 24, 2022, two pipes froze and cracked. Multiple rooms were subsequently flooded. Water extraction, remediation, steam pipe repairs, and electrical damage repairs are necessary. SGA was hired to appraise the damages and recommended a reserve of \$107,052.70 for all damages.

Recommendation: It is recommended the Board approve a reserve in insurance funds of \$107,052.70 for the repair and replacement of damages.

19. Purchase of Working with Young Children Resources

Purpose: Early childhood is in the high need workforce category in Kansas and in the United States and Wichita Public Schools continues to be a leader in preparing students for careers in early childhood at the seven comprehensive high schools. Originally, a review was conducted of available textbooks, and through recommendations from a select group of teachers Working with Young Children was adopted in 2008.

Recommendation: It is recommended that the purchase of Working with Young Children and related teacher resources in an amount not to exceed \$80,000 be approved. This will update textbooks to the most up to date version as it becomes available, replacement textbooks, and materials for additional schools as needed. This textbook will be used in two different classes and replaces the previous version. Each school has a class set and a small supply of books that can be checked out.

20. Window and Roof Replacements, Various – Professional Design Services

Purpose: The Capital Outlay Budget includes monies for Window and Roof Replacement projects at various district sites. The selection committee has recommended Schaefer Architecture to provide design services for these projects.

Recommendation: It is recommended that the Board enter into a contract with Schaefer Architecture for professional design services on the window and roof replacement projects at various district sites, in an amount not to exceed \$315,000.
