


Services Reflections


Along with service hours, service reflections are an integral part of the Career-related program (CP). Students are required to have a minimum of 50 reflections by the end of their senior year. Service Reflections are logged into ManageBac, and have students reflect on any or all of the five criteria:

- 1. How is your service helping in addressing global issues?
- 2. What are you doing in your service and how were you helpful?
- 3. Did you work with another person? If so, how did this help you with your service?
- 4. What are some of your strengths? How did you develop these during the service? What are some places where you can improve?
- 5. Recognize and consider the ethics of choices and actions?. These reflections are meant to show your growth throughout the program and the service. **Ty**

Service Hours
