### **Assessment for Services**

### **Program Description**

The Marietta Independent Learning Experiences (MILE) gifted education program provides additional academic rigor for students by extending, enriching, and/or accelerating the Georgia Standards of Excellence and through applying the Georgia Programming Standards for Meeting the Needs of Gifted & High Ability Learners.

Specially designed curriculum is aligned to the academic needs, abilities, interests, and learning styles for K-12 high ability learners in real-world interdisciplinary learning experiences. The learning experiences are designed using the MCS Gifted Standards K-12 listed below:

- \* Advanced Research Skills
- \* Creative Thinking Skills
- \* Higher Order Thinking and Problem-Solving Skills
- \* Advanced Communication and Collaboration Skills
- \* Emotional Development of Self
- \* Self-directed Learner

### **Program Delivery Models**

Gifted students shall receive a minimum of 5 segments per week, or its yearly equivalent, of total gifted services.

**Elementary:** Local school leadership determines how the gifted services will be delivered to best serve their school's students. The state allows for students to be served in resource, advanced content, cluster, collaborative, and innovative models to best meet the students' needs.

<u>Middle Grades</u>: Instructional extensions and acceleration are provided in enhanced and advanced language arts and social studies classes using advanced content, cluster, and collaborative models.

<u>High School</u>: Gifted services can be provided in math, science, social studies, language arts, and foreign language. The instructional extensions are delivered through International Baccalaureate, Advanced Placement, Dual Enrollment, Honors, and Internship courses.

### **Referrals, Evaluation & Eligibility**

A referral may come from the student, teacher, counselor, administrator, parent/guardian, peer, or any other person with knowledge of the student's abilities at any time, or with an automatic referral if the student has an achievement score of 90% or higher. There is a fall and winter gifted testing window. Each school's MILE Eligibility Team (MET) oversees the referral, eligibility, and continuance process for the gifted program. The eligibility criteria is as follows:

**Option A:** Both criteria are met for the following categories:

Mental Abilities: (K-2) composite score of 99th percentile by age on standardized test of mental ability (3-12) composite score ≥ 96th percentile by age on standardized test

**Achievement:** (K-12) score ≥ 90th percentile by grade on standardized test in Total Battery, Total Reading or Total Math

**Option B:** To qualify through option B, students must meet 3 out of the 4 areas listed. Only one rating scale may be used to determine eligibility.

**Mental Abilities:** (K-12) component or composite score ≥ 96th percentile by age on standardized test

**Achievement:** (K-12) score ≥ 90th percentile by grade on standardized test in Total Battery, Total Reading or Total Math

**Creativity:** (K-12) score ≥90th percentile total battery of a standardized test of creativity thinking Or ≥90th percentile on standardized creativity behavioral rating scale

**Motivation:** (K-12)  $\geq$ 90th percentile on standardized motivational behavioral rating scale (6-12) GPA  $\geq$ 3.5 on a 4.0 scale for 2 years

\* **Please note:** When testing does not warrant placement, students are not eligible for re-testing for a minimum of two calendar years.
