Lieske was evaluated by the seven-member board during a closed session meeting April 27.

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prise International, an instructional model for business, entrepreneurship, economics, financial literacy and technology. The program serves thousands of students from high schools and colleges across the country by creating an online virtual market allowing participating classrooms to communicate, partner and engage in commerce.

"It's basically running a virtual business in the classroom," Fanning said.

Students have the task of completing business training/orientation before brainstorming and researching different business ideas and target markets. Once they have an idea for a business, they must apply for a job, which includes writing a cover letter, creating a resume, completing a job application and getting two letters of

recommendation. Then the student must complete an interview (conducted by business professionals in the community) to determine his/her position in the company.

Once all of the employees (students) are hired, each department works together to finalize a business plan, which must be finalized and uploaded to VEI by Oct. 31.

In addition to coming up with a product to sell, students must also fulfill the responsibilities of running a business, including paying and evaluating employees, creating a human resource manual, marketing the business and creating a website for e-commerce, creating product pictures, utilizing social media and completing a sale process.

This year, students created two companies: Luxury, Inc., an online jewelry distributor, and Rise Enterprise, a company that sold watches and bands that gave its consumers super powers. Fanning said that when consumers from other VEI participants purchased a product from Luxury or Rise, they were sent a picture.

"Our product is a picture of what we're selling," she explained.

In February, students had the opportunity to attend a VEI trade show in Chicago and compete against 64 other "firms" at the first-ever Great Lakes Trade Show in the areas of Best Booth, Best Video Commercial and Best Sales Presentation. Both of the Davison High School VEI firms placed within the top 10 of Best Sales Presentation; Rise Enterprise placed third and Luxury, Inc. placed eighth.
