# Board hears from recipients of DEF grants, Professional Scholar

Drawings and doodles are being transformed into tangible and touchable things in **Mike McCollum's** engineering and architectural design courses at Davison High School. The pens are new to his classroom this year thanks to a \$1,000 mini-grant from the **Davison Educational Foundation**.

"It's like plastic creations appear out of nowhere," said sophomore **Carlee Allard**. "...With this kind of new technology, it makes you think that maybe this pen could be used to make sutures in the medical world or create things to make life and society better."


Senior **Mariah Seybold** said it's exciting to use the pens, which have different modes so you can doodle or fill in spaces with an LED light.

"It has really helped me learn about engineering and redesigning things," she said, adding that she is looking at a career in engineering.


This school year, more than \$8,248 in classroom mini grants were awarded by the DEF. Davison Middle School Teacher **Tiffany Hopper** was one of eight teachers who applied—and was awarded— a \$3,500 grant to fund "Operation Outdoors." 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activities that teachers can grab and go and use at the Williams Nature and Historical Learning Center in Davison Township.

"We wanted to utilize the incredible opportunity we have at the Williams property," Hopper said. "But we also realized that not everyone is as passionate about the outdoors or as comfortable with it as we were."

Hopper showed that the tubs were filled with items like digital microscopes, binoculars and fishing nets. In all, there are more than 15 team building activities, 15 curricular activities and seven investigation-type lesson plans.

"Our goal is to keep this project for grades five and six but we are hoping to set the example so other buildings can get in there and see it's doable," Hopper said, adding that staff will continue developing lessons and placing them in a binder to make it a living document.

Other mini-grants awarded this school year by the DEF include:

 "Thomson Sensory Program." This \$1,000 grant allows for the development of a sensory program that includes several activities and equipment designed to help students calm down or prepare for academic

tasks and provide a proactive strategy

for students who have difficulty regulating themselves in the classroom. "Cardinal's Nest Safe Place." This \$500 grant provided a location in the classroom where students can

go when they are struggling to regulate their emotions and behavior. The primary objective of this project is to teach students strategies at a young age to help them develop successful behaviors.

• "IXI.com." This \$332 grant provides membership to this math and language arts website, which allows students in Mrs. **Kateri Blake's** Davison High School class-room to access technology as well as gain a whole new appreciation for how fun learning can be.

• "iPad Minis." This \$1,916 grant provided two iPad minis for each kindergarten classroom at Hill Elementary to facilitate Readers Workshop and Math Workshop and provide differentiated instruction and interventions.

In addition, the board also heard from **Rachel Loftus**, the Davison Educational Foundation's 2015 Professional Scholar. Loftus teaches Spanish I at Davison High and Davison Middle schools. Loftus attended the Blaine Rey Total Physical Response Storytelling Workshop, which she said gave her new tools to engage students in applying new concepts, analyzing stories and creating their own works.

"There are other ways to experience the vocabulary rather than using a flash card," she said.

Each year, the DEF selects a Professional Scholar to receive up to \$1,000 to experience a unique professional development opportunity.
