

State releases M-STEP scores, leaving many with questions

Since the recent release of the Michigan Student Test of Educational Progress (M-STEP) taken by students last spring, the results are leaving many with more questions than answers.

The test was introduced last year, replacing the 44-year-old Michigan Educational Assessment Program (MEAP). An online test, M-STEP has fewer multiple choice questions and more questions that require problem solving and critical thinking skills than the previous MEAP pencil and paper assessment.

"You are going to see a different type of presentation because it has been a long time since our students have taken a new state test," Assistant Superintendent **Kevin Brown** told board members as District Assessment Coordinator **Eric Chorley** readied to give his annual state assessment update. "It is difficult to compare the new M-STEP to the MEAP. We will also be transitioning this year to the SAT from the ACT and we thought it would be good to look back over the past eight years and provide insight regarding how our students have performed on the ACT."

Unfortunately, the scores are about the only information educators have received about last year's M-STEP tests, leaving many wondering what they really mean. For example, when looking at statewide percentile rankings, Davison students ranged from the high (82nd to 92nd percentile) in the areas of English Language Arts in fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grades but dropped to the 56th percentile at 11th grade.

"It doesn't make sense that our kids are in the 80th and 90th percentiles all along and when they get to 11th grade they fall off the map," Chorley said.

Chorley noted that the M-STEP results offer no explanation into the areas students are being tested on making it even more difficult for educators to address specific areas where students are struggling.

"We literally have nothing to go on," he said. "We have student scores but without specific information on areas of strengths and weaknesses, it is hard to know what to work on."

In math, students scores ranged from the 59th to 79th percentiles in the state rankings.

"We do know that math is an area we have been struggling in the last few years," Brown said. "We have some very good math programs going on right now to try and address those issues but it is going to take some time for those things to pay off. We are very hopeful that we will see math scores climb throughout the next several years ... basically we are continuing to move forward but we are just not sure the assessment that our kids took last spring provides any direction on where we need to go."

For the last time in nearly a decade, Chorley shared the results of the student's ACT scores. The test, historically taken by 11th graders in the spring, is being replaced this year with the SAT.

"We had a good run with the ACT and saw a lot of improvement over the years," Chorley said.

The SAT that will be given to juniors is a new, redesigned test that has never been administered.

Assistant Principal **Jerry Piger** said staff is busy preparing students for the test. Teachers have received training on using the Khan Academy website, which has partnered with the SAT, and are becoming more familiar with the College Board and practice testing sites.

"We are being proactive," Piger said. "Students will have a Khan Academy log in and we will be collecting data so when March rolls around we will know where their strengths and weaknesses are. We will offer after-school study sessions and students will know exactly what area they need help in."

In addition, students will be encouraged to download an app that provides a daily practice SAT prompt.
