Board approves merit pay and one-time payment to employees

Michigan law requires school districts to establish a method annually of compensating administrators and teachers based on performance. Last night, the Board of Education complied with the law by voting to pay administrators receiving an effective or highly effective evaluation rating with merit pay of \$500 and teachers receiving an effective or highly effective evaluation rating with merit pay of \$300. The payments are one-time and off-scale.

In keeping with the spirit of encouraging high performance for all Davison school employees, the Board also voted to offer a one-time off-scale payment of \$200 to all regular, hourly employees working five or more hours. District level supervisors will receive a \$400 payment and hourly employees working less than five hours will receive a \$100 merit payment.

"Even though the law doesn't specify merit pay for staff other than administrators and teachers, the idea of merit pay for all staff members keeps with the spirit of 'we are all in this together,' if we acknowledge all employees," said Superintendent **Eric Lieske**. "We have a great school district because we have great employees. Honestly, I wish I could sit here and recommend much more to the board but, unfortunately, we're not in the position to do so."

Employees can expect to receive their merit pay at the end of the month.

Vegetables and self confidence sprout at Community Garden

You can find more than 20 varieties of vegetables growing in the Hahn Community Garden at the corner of Rising and Genesee streets but the students who planted and nurtured the plants are reaping much more than the harvest they have sown. In addition to tomatoes, cucumbers, squash and corn, you will find seeds of self confidence and satisfaction sprouting as well.

Hahn Intermediate Teacher Bob Konzman and his classroom planted their first garden in 2013 after

Konzman was approached by community member Jim Theolet who offered the space. Three seasons later, Konzman has students who have since left his classroom returning to help plant and tend to the garden.

Each year, students plan the garden, research a vegetable they would like to plant—learn how deep to plant the seeds and research recipes and meals in which they can cook and use their vegetables. Then comes the real work of planting the seeds, pulling the weeds and watering.

"During the summer we encourage the parents to come and pick the vegetables and maintain the garden," Konzman said.

After school begins, the students gather tomatoes and herbs to make such dishes as salsa and pesto.

"They are trying vegetables for the very first time for a lot of them," Konzman said.

The students harvest the vegetables. Some of the produce is consumed while it's fresh while other items such as corn and squash are frozen or canned to be used later for the classroom's annual Thanksgiving feast.

"It's better than just buying fruits and vegetables in the store—you can just pick it right out of your garden," said Hunter, a former student of Konzman's who returned this year to help with the garden.

"The garden inspired Parker so much that he did his own garden at home," said the father another student. "It was a hot summer but he watered the plants every day and took care of the weeds so he learned a life skill."

In April, the district received a \$950 grant from the Community Foundation of Greater Flint Davison Fund (Justin M. Jury Fund and Sherri E. Stephens Fund) thanks to the efforts of **Matt Lobban**, Math/Science Curriculum Coordinator. The money was used to purchase plywood, plastic covering and hardware to construct a hoop house in order to expand the Hahn Community Garden.

"I was blessed to be able to see this special community and see the love that is shared between Mr. K and his students," said Lobban, who helped students and the Konzman family construct the hoop house.

Lobban said Mike Wojciechowski from Wojo's Garden Splendors was also instrumental in helping with not only donating the hoops, brackets and equipment but sharing his knowledge so that the construction could be completed. He also thanked community member Dave Mansfield for tilling up the garden areas, Mr. Woodfield for donating the mulch and Jim Theolet for allowing the students to use the space.

Konzman thanked his students' parents and families for all that they do in order to make the garden and events such as the before school family barbecue held at the garden such a success.

"Without the family members, I just couldn't do it,' he said.
