Parking lot renovations on tap for Gates Elementary this summer


Dropping off and picking up students should be a whole lot easier for Gates Elementary parents come next school year.

Construction on a new parking lot that will include a separate bus loop will begin Saturday, June 23. Work is expected to be completed by August 10.

Board of Education members voted Monday, April 16, to pay \$523,109 to DCC Construction, Inc., to complete the project, which includes a total reconstruction of the south parking lot and addition of a horse-shoe style driveway for improved traffic flow. The project also includes a newly constructed bus loop, which will keep cars and buses separated and additional parking.

Funds from the voter-approved Building and Site Sinking levy will be used to pay for the project.

Prior to board approval, the project was reviewed by the Board's Building, Grounds and Transportation Committee as well as the district's architecture firm, Kingscott Associates.

Mrs. McCollum was nominated by Gates Elementary Principal **Theresa Wendt**, who wrote:

"Cindy is truly a Davison Community Schools Kids First Employee! Starting early morning until late evening, Cindy structures her whole day around her students and their academic progress. She packs each day with meaningful instruction and performance activities for students. Students are the center of the classroom and she works closely with her students to regularly evaluate both behavioral and academic progress.

"Cindy develops amazing relationships with both her students and their families. She welcomes her students each morning at the

door and bids them goodbye at the end of the day...and letting them know that she loves them. Which she truly does!

A couple of examples of Cindy's Kids First Approach include:

- Tutoring students in reading after school, at no charge to the parents, and transporting them home at the
 end of each session. This additional one-on-one attention has made a difference in the academic progress of these students.
- Working with a parent to help get the medical assistance her child needs. This has included researching doctors and therapists who accept the parents insurance and are open to taking on new patients.
- Meeting the individual needs of students based on data...even if this means individualizing instruction for 31 students!
- And finally, Cindy's Kids First approach includes knowing where all 155 third grade students are academically and assisting her colleagues as need be in meeting all students' needs."

Board approves ACC recommendations for curriculum

Music for grades K-12, art, math, reading, Spanish and Success 101 are among the subject areas that will be receiving new textbooks and curriculum materials for the 2018-19 school year.

Board members approved purchases totaling a bit more than \$300,000 for the materials.

Other subject areas scheduled to receive curriculum materials include: Beginning Broadcasting at Davison Middle School, Humanities and Interior Design.

The recommendations were made by the district's Advisory Curriculum Council.

Board authorizes courses for high school credit

The Michigan Department of Education now requires boards of education to authorize its courses offered for credit and on-line courses annually. Board of Education members did just that at their Monday, April 16, Board of Education meeting.

The courses offered for credit can be found in the Davison High School Course Catalog, which is located on the district's website.

In addition to those courses, Davison Alternative Education also offers the following courses for high school credit: School to Work, Current Events, Senior Project, Creative Writing and Advisory.

The district has also created its own Davison online courses utilizing the ACC-approved curriculum aligned to state standards. The courses are taught by Davison High School teachers and students from anywhere can enroll in those online courses through the Genesee Intermediate School District's Gen-NET learning portal.

"It is quite impressive that those online courses were written by our teachers," said Superintendent **Eric Lieske**. "People all over the country are taking those online courses that our Davison teachers developed."
