Purchase of parcel gets nod of approval from board members

The district is moving forward with plans to purchase a 1.16-acre parcel at the corner of Aloha and W. Flint streets.

"Anytime you can look at property adjacent to a school building that is available, especially to help with traffic flow, it needs to be considered," said Phil Thom, Director of Operations.

The vacant land, which is located next to Hill Elementary, is being purchased for \$35,000.

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The Unified Champions Club has been very active this school year.
