

### Student Ambassadors help new high school students feel welcome

They are essentially the welcome wagon for Davison High School.

With personalities as bright as the yellow T-shirts they wear, the Student Ambassadors have made it their mission to make sure all students new to Davison High School feel welcomed and accepted by their peers.

New to the school this year, the 30some members of the group each had to apply to the program last spring. They also had to get written recommendations from their teachers.

"These are kids who really put themselves out there and wanted to get involved," said DHS Teacher **Andrea Ferguson**, who co-sponsors the group with Counselor **Betsy Wambaugh**. "They wanted to be leaders of their peers and advocates for the new students.

Student Ambassadors greet new students when they register for school. They

ask them questions to determine their interests and lead them on a building tour. They also help to facilitate New Student Luncheons and offer to sit with their student at lunch time in the cafeteria.

"We are here to build relationships," Wambaugh said. "That is our course and our purpose."

"I would imagine that one of the hardest things for a teen-ager to do is to go into a new school," said Superintendent **Kevin Brown**. "What (the Student Ambassadors) are doing is a big deal."

Student Ambassadors hope to expand their purpose by offering a helping hand to all incoming ninth graders next school year. Ferguson and Wambaugh recently tasked the group with striking up conversations—and not of the social media kind—with current ninth graders to get their take on what kinds of things the group could do to help eighth graders with their transition to high school in August.

"It helps to give students a go-to peer rather than a go-to adult because they already have a lot of go-to adults in their lives," Wambaugh said, referring to a student's support system of multiple teachers, counselors, administrators and school staff.

Student Ambassador **Olivia Masters** eats lunch daily with one the new students she befriended and even invited her to join her at Art Club after school.

"I don't look at it as taking time out of school but rather working (being a Student Ambassador) into your daily routine," she said.

DHS junior **Carson Bruns** said being a Student Ambassador is not necessarily about becoming a best friend to the new student but helping them assimilate and meet other students who share the same interests. "It's more about helping them find their group of people, not forcing themselves on you," she said.
