The following action items were approved by the Davison Board of Education at its October 3 meeting:

 Acceptance of Audit Report: Thanks to the amazing work of Director of Business Services Leslie Young and her crew, Accountant Josh Evans, Business Office Secretary Shawn Hoover, Payroll Specialist Caitlin Bentoski and former Purchasing Secretary (and current DHS Secretary to the Principal) Jacqueline Addison, the district has once again received a clean audit."

"It has been a clean audit ever since I have been here so congratulations to the Finance Department," finance said Jacob Sopczynski, CPA with Yeo and Yeo. "That means the district is spending funds according to the laws that govern those funds.

"Doing audits for school districts can be very complicated and for decades, Davison has always had a clean audit," said Board President **Karen Conover.** "And it has been like that for decades because we have excellent people like Mrs. Young."

Treasurer **Eric Lieske** noted that the Finance Committee has met twice to review the audit prior to the evening's presentation.

- Approval of 8th Grade Washington, D.C. Trip: Davison Middle School
 Teacher Janet Green received the Board's authorization to plan a field trip
 May 25–28, 2023, to Washington D.C. for any interested 8th grade student.
 Seats are filled on a first come, first served basis. The trip will allow students
 to see the Declaration of Independence, Constitution, U.S. Capitol, White
 House, Mount Vernon and Gettysburg while providing a fun and memorable
 experience.
- Approval of High School Music Department Trip: Davison High School Band and Orchestra and Vocal Music students will be headed to Nashville, Tenn. March 15-18, 2023, following the Board's approval of the trip Monday night. Students will attend a 90-minute clinic/workshop facilitated by music faculty at Vanderbilt University to improve upon their skills as musicians. Students will also have the opportunity to visit and use the recording studio at RCA Records and will work with a professional sound engineer to record and leave with copies of their performance. The trip will also allow students to experience guided tours of some of country music's famous landmarks and museums including the Ryman Theater, Grand Ole Opry and the Country Music Hall of Fame.

M-STEP, PSAT/SAT scores: "It's like starting over"

While school officials are hopeful to see "normalcy" soon returning to scores on the M-STEP, PSAT and SAT, this year's results are still a bit "wonky," according to District Assessment Coordinator **Eric Chorley**.

"It has been a weird few years as far as the state testing," he told Board members and the audience at the October Board of Education meeting. "There was no spring testing in 2020 (due to COVID), and last year, 2021, testing was offered but not required of virtual students. This year (2022) was the first year all students were assessed in the spring."

In regard to state testing, Chorley said this year feels like "starting over again" with 2022 spring results serving as the baseline data.

Among Genesee County schools, Davison ranked first in sixth grade math, sixth grade English language arts (ELA), eighth grade social studies and eighth grade science, second in seventh grade ELA and third in third and fourth grade math and ELA.

What is most impressive, though, is how Davison student scores compare to other schools across the state that are very similar in size and free and reduced lunch rates. Davison landed at number one on that list.

"If you are on this list, you are beating the odds," Chorley said.

Director of Curriculum Dr. **Angela Hards** said it was important to remember that the scores indicate "one test on one day."

"We all use state standards," she said. "There is not a magic formula and very similar structures are used in all of our schools. Overall, this is just one piece for our data story. It's something we look at but it ebbs and flows with each year of testing."

Dr. Hards said the addition of intervention teachers and instructional coaches this school year is an investment that will surely pay off in the future. It surely did last year thanks to the efforts of district math coach, Mrs. Julie Crockett.

"Our math coach met with the sixth grade group for intensive coaching last year," said Chorley, who pointed out that sixth graders scored first in the county in M-STEP math. "That's a small glimpse into the future of what the coaches we hired will be able to do."

"This data is still a little bit wonky, but I like to talk about student growth because growth in my mind is much more important than achievement," said Superintendent **Kevin Brown**.
