The following action items were approved by the Davison Board of Education at its October 2 meeting:

- Recognition of Principals: Board members recognized the month of October as National Principals Month. The district is fortunate to have a dedicated group of principals, assistant principals and deans of students leading our school buildings.
- Approval of 8th Grade Washington, D.C. Trip: Once again, eighth graders will have the opportunity to visit Washington, D.C. during the Memorial Day weekend. The 2024 trip is scheduled for Thursday, May 23, through Sunday, May 26, 2024. The trip will allow students a firsthand look at the Nation's capital and chance to see the Declaration of Independence, Constitution, U.S. Capitol, White House, Mount Vernon and Gettysburg and other historical points of interest. Davison Middle School Teacher Ms. Janet Green has been the organizer of the trip for the past 13 years.
- Approval of the Hail Damage Roof Replacement Projects: Bids for the replacement of 39 outbuilding roofs, bundled into six projects across the District, were approved by the Board. All of the bids were reviewed by the Buildings, Grounds and Transportation committee on September 29. Christine Kuzinski, Director of Human Resources and Operations, said the roofs include storage barns, concession stands and dugouts. The work will be completed by SmartComm, LLC in the amount of \$117,699 and DiMar Contracting, Inc. for \$65,805. Money from the hail damage insurance claim will be used to fund the projects.
- Approval of Continued Rooftop Units and Ductwork Removal and Reinstallation Due to Hail Damage: In order to continue emergency roof repairs from the July 20 hail storm, additional rooftop units and ductwork were identified as in need of removal, replacement and/or lifted and reinstalled. Quotes from district-preferred vendor Goyette Mechanical were approved to make the needed repairs at Davison Middle School, Hill Elementary and Siple Elementary in the amount of \$169,393. The work will be paid with funds from the hail damage insurance claim.
- Acceptance of Donations: The following donations were gratefully acknowledged:
 - Danielle Hawley from Susan's Hallmark in Davison donated classroom supplies to Hill Elementary for staff and students.
 - Aaron Wilson donated a set of men's golf clubs and golf bag to the Boys' Golf program.
 - McKee Chiropractic Unlimited donated \$1,000 to the Girls' Varsity Swim team to help with the cost of team jackets.

Each month, administrators nominate a DCS employee or contracted staff member who best exemplifies what it means to be "Kids First." Winners receive a \$100 Visa gift card thanks to Mark Owen, owner of MEEMIC insurance agencies in Davison and Flint Township, and a certificate. The winner is chosen at random.

Karla was nominated by Thomson Elementary Principal Mr. Andrew Criswell, who wrote:

"Since coming to us from another district, Karla has demonstrated what a true Kids First teacher looks and acts like. She is tireless in her work to make school a positive place for kids and it shows in all that she does.

From a curricular standpoint, Karla has not only set up a classroom learning environment that incorporates high quality hands-on learning activities for her students, but she has also pushed her DK colleagues to do the same. When entering her classroom, it is evident right away that students love to be in her classroom. They are engaged in the work of developing their social, emotional and academic skills and there are rarely your typical behavioral incidents. M-STEP, PSAT/SAT scores: "one piece of the story"

School districts across the state now have two years of state testing data since COVID interrupted the assessment cycle in 2020 and 2021. And while Davison students once again ranked at the top of the pack when averaging all M-STEP, SAT scores and free and reduced lunch rates across the county, one thing remains the same: it is only one piece of the story.

"Remember, this is just one piece of data that helps us to make up the whole data story," said Dr. **Angle Hards,** Director of Curriculum. "It's an important piece of but does not tell the whole story."

In the spring, students across the state in third through eighth grades and high school juniors take the Michigan Student Test of Educational Progress, more commonly know as the M-STEP, and/or the PSAT or SAT. Students are tested in math and English language arts while eighth and 11th graders are also tested in social studies and science. Davison also administers the PSAT to freshmen and sophomores but test results are not required by the state. The PSAT is a predictor of student success at the college level.

In addition to averaging all scores and free and reduced lunch rates to compare with schools within the county, District Assessment Coordinator **Eric Chorley** also ranks Davison's scores with schools across the state similar in size and free and reduced lunch rates. Again, Davison rose to the top.


"We have been very consistent," Chorley said. "We seem to do well with our students in poverty. This number (free and reduced lunch rate) has crept up over the years. When I first started this position it was in the 30 (percentile) and now we are over 50 percent."

"It is not a secret that poverty is an educational disadvantage," said Dr. Hards. "I am very proud of the work our teachers and principals have done in recognizing our students' needs and meeting students where they are and getting them where they need to be."
