Central Elementary project will head to voters on Feb. 26

After 16 months of meetings, a facility study and seeking community input, board members officially decided Monday night to ask voters to consider funding a measure that would turn the district's oldest building, Central Elementary, into a 21st century learning center.

The project, which will be placed on a February 26, 2013, ballot, includes additions for classrooms and a cafeteria, renovations to the existing 81-year-old building and installing educational technology.

The \$11.9 million project equals .75 of a mill, which would cost the owner of a \$100,000 home (with a taxable value of \$50,000) \$37.50 a year. The owner of a home valued at \$75,000 (with a taxable value of \$37,500) would pay around \$28 annually. The tax levy is for 15 years.

"I feel like we are doing the right thing," said Trustee **Mark McGlashen**, who also serves as chair on the Board's Buildings and Grounds Committee. "This building has been an icon for education in this community."

Superintendent **Eric Lieske** said plans call for the school to continue looking like a 1931 building from the front while the back and inside would be updated to a state-of-the-art elementary school building.

"It's an exciting opportunity for the school district and our students but it's also an exciting opportunity for our community to have that big, historic landmark on M-15 to get some much needed attention," he said.

Board Treasurer and Finance Committee Chairperson **Kim Lindsay** said he was impressed with how much work is planned for the price.

"It's amazing the bang the district is going to get for the buck with this project," he said. "All of my children went through Central Elementary and it's a good place to learn but this is going to make it a superior

Board approves purchase of property

Lieske said the property, located at 1458 N.

Funds from the district's building and site sinking fund will be used to pay for the \$54,000 purchase price.

School improvement and accreditation: an ongoing process since 1963

A lot has changed since Davison High School was the first building in the district to become accredited in 1963 but one thing has remained the same: the process is a lot of work.

"We are very proud of the work we have done," said District School Improvement Co-Chair **Angle Hards**. "Our process has changed very much over the years."

Davison Middle School has been accredited since 1994 while Central, Gates, Hill, Siple and Thomson Elementary buildings earned accreditation in 1998. Davison Alternative Education has been accredited since 2000 and Hahn Intermediate earned the title in 2001.

Co-chair **Eric Chorley** updated the Board of Education on current district accreditation efforts through AdvancED. Davison Schools was one of the first dozen schools in the state to earn district accreditation in 2009. The district will undergo its second review to continue that accreditation during the 2013-14 school year.

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place. I'm hopeful the community will support the project so we can move forward."

The project includes additions for classrooms and a cafeteria, renovations to the existing building and installing educational technology. Other highlights would include:

- A new entrance with the main office on the west side of the building near the parking lot and bus drop off loop.
- 100 percent accessibility to the entire school building.
- All classrooms would be at ideal sizes. The ideal size for a classroom is 800 to 900 square feet. Currently classroom sizes range from 500 to 1,100 square feet; there is one classroom so small there isn't even room for a teacher's desk!
- A complete hot water heating system that would be energy efficient. Currently, part of the building is heated by steam heat while the other portion is heated by hot water.
- New cafeteria/multi purpose room. Students now eat in the basement of the building. The new cafeteria would be at grade level and could also serve as a "holding" place for students before school and at dismissal.
- Additional classrooms and a new media center. Enrollment projections predict that Davison Schools will continue to grow during the next several years.
