#### District earns "clean audit"

For the 12th consecutive year, Davison Community Schools has received a "clean" financial audit, which means the final budget figures provided in July to the Board of Education by Director of Business Services **Leslie Young** and her staff did not change once the audit was completed.

Mike Frawley of Yeo & Yeo CPAs and Business Consultants conducted the audit and shared his findings at Monday night's Board of Education meeting. Auditors annually assess the District's financial risk and test internal controls.

Frawley found that the District's financial statements were fairly presented and no accounting records needed adjustment. His company focuses on key controls including disbursements, payroll and receipts (PaySchools, Athletics, Food Services and DCER).

Frawley noted that the district did dip into its fund equity to the tune of \$1.8 million—or 20 percent—for the 2011-12 school year.

"One reason for that is the large reduction in federal revenues," Frawley said, referring to dissipating funds from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 and EduJobs. "Basically these have been used for back filling (to make up for shrinking) state aid. Federal funding is now back to 2008 levels."

Expenditures were also up to the tune of \$1.5 million in the areas of instruction and instructional support.

"But that is putting money right back where it should be—in the classrooms," Frawley said. "the whole budget process is an ongoing thing—always anticipating what the state is doing and what is coming. I think you did a very good job this year."

Frawley said dipping into reserves was planned for and intentional, as the district had been preparing for a "funding cliff."

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The mission of the Davison Community Schools is to develop individuals who demonstrate skills necessary for lifelong success in a changing, global society.

## GenNET pioneer and Hahn teacher makes presentation

As part of the Genesee Intermediate School District's GenNET Pioneers program last school year, Hahn Intermediate Teacher **Theresa Jones** was allowed to borrow an iPad for five months to explore ways she could use it in the classroom.

"For those of us who haven't had one before, it was quite exciting," Jones told Board of Education members Monday night.

Jones took advantage of the time she had with the new technology and soon discovered it offered benefits such as immediate feedback. Students could Google questions immediately and she could make adaptations to lessons quickly. Jones said the iPad also helped her to monitor student understanding and find gaps as well as allowed students to take advantage of the interactive lessons offered by student textbook publishers online.

With the iPads purchased by the district this year, Jones said her students are preparing to make short videos to go along with an anti-bullying script they will be writing next week. The District purchased mobile iPad labs for every school building this school year with the exception of Davison Alternative Education where students there are using Google Chromebooks.

"I think there is so much potential with this new technology," said Trustee **Doug Theodoroff**. "It was exciting to hear about these in the curriculum committee meetings. Our children are so much more technology advanced than most of us and this offers our teachers so much."

# Board views updated Cardinal Code videos


