District recognized for energy conservation efforts, savings

Davison Community Schools was recognized for energy conservation efforts that have resulted in a savings of more than \$400,000 over two years.

Mike Bitar, Regional President of Cenergistic (formerly Energy Education) presented district Energy Specialist **Eric Chorley** with an Environmental Excellence Award for outstanding environmental and financial resource stewardship. The district continues to focus on improving energy efficient behavior.

"This is much more than going in and telling folks that they need to turn the lights off," Bitar said. "It's about creating a process that will sustain you long after the four years we're going to be active with your people on the ground."

The district has a four-year contract with Cenergestic, which shares in the district's energy savings. The company, however, will continue to work with the district once the contract expires as long as it continues to employ an energy specialist.

"We have been working with some districts in the state who have been out of contract with us for 10 years," Bitar said.

Chorley said the district has reduced its energy consumption by 19.4 percent in natural gas and electricity. That amounts to enough reduced CO_2 emissions to take 516 cars off the road for one year or plant 73,500 trees for 10 years.


"We're not only doing our part but being good stewards of the planet," Chorley said.

Chorley credited district custodians and Director of Operations **Phil Thom** for ensuring the program's success as well as school staff who have adopted new habits such as turning off lights and fans when leaving a room.

"These numbers are good but we want to make sure we are putting the pedal to the metal and looking for even more opportunities to save," Chorley said.
