he King's Academy is a thriving example of a school that exudes academic excellence and spiritual growth. Our commitment to delivering a wellrounded education is evident in every facet of our high school programs. We provide a robust educational experience rich in content which includes opportunities that transcend conventional classroom boundaries and have Biblical truth woven into each day. Additionally, our Smith Family Conservatory students and athletic teams consistently surpass expectations by delivering highquality, award-winning performances and championships. What sets TKA apart from other schools is the unwavering commitment to recognize and cultivate students' unique talents and passions.

King's consistently achieves remarkable academic outcomes. Students achieved an overall average 87% pass rate on AP exams, well above the 60% national average, with many individual courses boasting a 100% pass rate. TKA continues to make academic strides as we recognized our National Merit seniors, with five students named National Merit Commended Scholars and 2 National Merit Semifinalists, (who scored in the top 1% of the country on qualifying PSATs). Fifteen students were awarded AP Scholars with Distinction, twelve AP Scholars with Honor, and twelve AP Scholars. Additionally, nine National Hispanic Scholars, two African American Scholars, and one National Indigenous Scholar were named. Students have also achieved perfect sub-scores on the ACT and SAT.

We continue to remain Christcentered by providing engaging advisory times where high school students connect with classmates while drawing near to the Lord in fun and meaningful ways. In the fall, TKA hosted a variety of chapel speakers who greatly impacted our student population. Students in the Christian Leadership Program of Distinction were given the opportunity to put their faith into action by participating in MAVEN. They visited a local university and interacted with college students and professors by sharing the gospel message. This opportunity had a tremendous impact on our students and gave them confidence in their faith.

Another factor that sets our high school students apart is their heart for service and their generosity. Students love the opportunity to serve the Lord by helping those in need. We remain in awe of the Lord's blessing at The King's Academy. I am continuously amazed at the Lord's provision for our school and grateful to serve alongside dedicated faculty and staff to ensure our students have the best high school experiences and education.







n the world of education there is frequently news of an improved approach to learning. These trends garner great fanfare in schools and result in frenetic activity in school systems. Through the years, we have periodically observed the pendulum swing in extreme directions on important topics in reading, math, science, and social studies. The King's Academy, however, has remained committed and steadfast in our approach to academic excellence. It is our goal to remain true to our convictions of best practices and approaches to reach the needs of our students and cultivate their God-given abilities. We look to prioritize a balanced approach to learning which allows us to provide our diverse student body with every opportunity to thrive. Our students receive an education that involves many traditional elements

of learning while also benefiting from innovative strategies and unique opportunities.

One of the things that will always remain central to TKA's approach to education is the foundational role of the teacher. The faculty at King's are not only experts in their fields but are also relational teachers that love and care for each student. Every new teacher that is brought onto the team is provided with the training, curriculum, and resources they need to meet the standards and benchmarks for their courses. We recognize these tools are significant, but our teachers are more important as they serve as the living curriculum bringing learning to life.

We believe it is vital for our teachers to use traditional means to deliver their content whether it be using physical textbooks, teaching students to write in cursive, conveying a lesson in the form of a story, or stopping everything to simply pray or read a devotion. Beyond that we look for ways to balance traditional teaching methods with non-traditional strategies to meet the needs and learning styles of all our students. In the elementary Explore program, for instance, teachers provide students with time for in-depth study in areas of individual interest, including building their own boats in an attempt to cross our school pool. Furthermore, these students engage in numerous project-based learning activities that have a high degree of complexity and require teamwork and problem-solving.

Our elementary teachers are always considering new ways to meet the needs of kinesthetic learners including emphasizing learning through song and movement in their own classes. Students can be heard singing about the months of the year, mathematical principles, and many other topics found in the elementary curriculum. Various manipulatives are also utilized throughout our elementary classrooms to provide students with hands-on experiences and to allow students to visualize abstract concepts in math and science. In addition to traditional assessments, elementary students are assessed using non-traditional methods that focus on real-world problemsolving and critical thinking. One example is the Restaurant Menu Project, which is the culmination of our elementary Spanish program. Students collaborate in groups to prepare menus written completely in Spanish. Following the completion of presentations, a winning menu is selected and food from that menu is ordered for all students to enjoy.

Middle and high school students also receive many traditional and non-traditional educational opportunities. These years are pivotal as students build a strong

foundation in their core subjects and experiment with electives. Middle school students excel in diverse course offerings such as Film and Logic. Film students explore how camera techniques such as framing,

shot composition, and camera movement are used to visually tell a story. Mock Trial allows students to develop analytical thinking and public speaking skills while engaging in

simulated trial competitions against teams from other schools.

High school students can explore professional fields through TKA's Programs of Distinction. For example, students in the Aviation Program of Distinction learn both the theoretical knowledge needed to operate an aircraft and the practical aspects of flying, with many students obtaining their Private Pilot License prior to graduating from high school. Students in The Smith Family Conservatory of the Arts receive numerous opportunities to showcase their training at professional venues and community events. These experiences and countless others in these stellar programs build

confidence and expose students to creative avenues of future pursuit.

In addition to our strong oncampus courses, another unique opportunity available to our high school students is The King's Online

> Academy. TKOA is a fully accredited online school with over 80 offerings including traditional, honors, AP, and **Dual Enrollment** courses. The King's Online Academy provides students

with flexibility as they study distinctly Christian coursework that is engaging and challenging.

Ecclesiastes 3:1 reminds us that "There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens." At The King's Academy, we prioritize a balanced approach to learning which allows us to meet our students' needs through both traditional and nontraditional teaching methods. This balanced approach promotes critical thinking, independent learning, and exploration while empowering students with the content knowledge necessary to succeed academically at The King's Academy and beyond.

David Williams '16 earned his Aviation Science and Technology degree from Aviator College and is currently Lead Captain on a Gulfstream G200 for Alerion Aviation. His pilot certificates and flight instructor ratings position "TKA is a place where students can go deeper to really learn something about aerodynamics, airplane control, and procedures."

Desiring to broaden his aviation impact, Hans obtained his instructor ratings as well as his airline transport rating. In addition to using his aviation experience to achieve his personal and professional goals, he has enjoyed investing in TKA's Aviation Program by providing flight instruction and simulator training for Aviation 101 and 201 Honors students. Hans's dedication to the overall growth of our student aviators is moving the Aviation Program of Distinction forward.

Students enrolled in the program are progressing more successfully than ever as a result of the technological advancement that the flight simulator brings, along with the guidance and training that our alumni pilots provide. The Aviation Program of Distinction's efforts in flight simulator technology coupled with the investment of our alumni certified pilot instructors is impacting our students by equipping them to fulfill their dreams of flying.

Dylan aspires to become an Air Force Pilot while other students plan to become commercial pilots or pursue other careers in aviation.





# **Engineering Program of Distinction**

The six-year award winning DiMino Engineering & Technology Program, which was launched during the 2015-2016 school year, experienced exciting changes and innovative developments this past year.

The Engineering lab was remodeled to include powered student workspaces, tool chests, ten 3D printers, transitional seating and a robotics floor for the growing Robotics Club and team. The redesigned Computer Lab was relocated across from the Engineering Lab and became an Engineering and Technology suite featuring new furniture, 27 computers and the innovative Redbird flight simulator, used by both the Aviation program and Aerospace Engineering students.

To complement the updated classroom spaces, two new courses launched within the Program of Distinction; Cybersecurity and Aerospace Engineering. Aerospace Engineering adds an elective offering to the existing Civil Engineering course and provides students with the opportunity to explore the fundamentals of flight in air and space through software simulations and handson experiences. They learn how these concepts apply to a career in aerospace engineering and to other engineering fields. In the area of technology, the new Cybersecurity course gives students a broad exposure to the many aspects of digital and information security, while encouraging socially responsible choices and ethical behavior in personal, system, and network security, as well as applied cybersecurity.

In addition to these innovative spaces and new curriculum, students are provided with opportunities to learn through engaging field trips. These include a visit to Limbitless Solutions, a facility that designs and manufactures custom modular prosthetics for young children and the FAU Ocean Engineering Lab where students learned about ocean engineering, the design and

manufacturing of submarines, and propulsion systems that mimic marine life movement. A visit to Johnson and Johnson's DePuy Synthes Lab exposed students to the engineering process within the surgical equipment of knee and joint replacement. Students were able to test the tools on synthetic bones to mimic the training that surgeons use to hone their skills.

The group's primary responsibility
is to invest the profits generated by
King's Corner Coffee, the student-led
entrepreneurial venture located on
campus.

The King's Investment Group provides a unique opportunity for students to gain real world experience allowing them to make decisions regarding the investment of real dollars. Members actively participate in the investment

decision-making process. They receive advice from experts including TKA parents Mrs. Delia Lalchan, Mr. John Lacy, and Mr. Sean McGould. Sophomore Casey Crews states, "The King's Investment Group allows me to learn from expert panels. I enjoy working as a team to make decisions after researching, comparing, and presenting different stock options."

The King's Investment Group initiative not only empowers students with practical financial skills but also aligns with the broader missions of King's Corner Coffee and The King's Academy. In addition to moving profits into strategic investments, the King's Investment Group has developed a give-back approach. The student leadership team unanimously agreed to develop a program that sets aside 10% of King's Corner Coffee profit for use in an on-campus grant program. Grant applications opened in January 2024, and grant awards ranging from \$300-\$500 will be made semi-annually beginning in February 2024. Authored by senior Jonathan Jones, The King's Corner Student Grant Program will allow teachers and staff members to fund initiatives that fuel and reward student creativity and innovation.

# Students Immersed in Spanish Culture

KA's Spain Study Abroad program was launched in the summer of 2006 after former King's Spanish teachers, Bob and Fatima Silva, attended a summer workshop for teachers in Madrid. During a weekend excursion they ventured to the breathtaking city of Salamanca which houses several universities, including the third oldest in the world. As they explored the city's rich cultural and historical legacy, Mrs. Silva envisioned creating an opportunity for TKA Spanish students to immerse themselves in the Spanish culture and deepen their appreciation for the language. The idea was approved by then President, Mr. Jeff Loveland, and 33 students participated in the inaugural trip in 2007.

Hundreds of students have enjoyed this experience including 48 students from last year's Spanish and History classes who attended the two-week summer program at La Universidad Pontificia de Salamanca. Students

stayed in dorms in a historic part of the city surrounded by striking architecture. They were just a short walk from the lively Plaza Mayor, the central square of Salamanca, which serves as a favored gathering place and boasts many restaurants, musical performances, and a beloved gelato shop. On weekdays, after a stop at Croissanteria Paris for breakfast, students attended morning classes at the University. Following lunch, they embarked on excursions including exciting locations like Merida, Caceras, Segovia, and Avila to explore ancient castles, Roman aqueducts, and other historical sites. In the evening, study sessions were held to review their lessons and prepare for exams. On the last day students participated in a graduation ceremony. Successful completion of the program provides students with college credit.

Students also enjoyed a long weekend trip to Sevilla, Granada, and Cordoba. Hollywood came to life as students toured the Plaza de Espana, the location used in Star Wars for the palace on planet Naboo. In Granada, they visited the Alhambra, an ancient palace perched on a hilltop. While in Cordoba, they explored the architectural wonder of La Mesquita, a mosque-turnedcathedral, and learned about the history of invaders in Southern Spain. When students were asked what their favorite part of the trip was, Ian Bowden '25 said, "Salamanca. It's a beautiful city," but perhaps one student put it best, responding with "Everything! The places we visited and Salamanca...

I just want to go back to Spain!" The trip offers a once-in-a-lifetime experience that students cherish forever. It fosters new friendships, imparts valuable educational knowledge, encourages independence, and provides a profound immersion into another culture.





s we reflect on the inaugural semester of our new middle school, there is much to celebrate. Vibrancy, engagement, and school spirit have been the hallmarks of the school year thus far. The hallways and classrooms are filled with enthusiasm and camaraderie as students enjoy and appreciate the rich and varied opportunities that middle school has to offer. Classrooms have been strategically grouped into middle school specific hallways to enhance the students' experience and create a distinct environment. Lunch periods and tailored chapel sessions have been divided to meet age specific needs while expanding elective options, honors classes, and clubs provide the opportunity to explore new and diverse interests.

Special attention has been devoted to preparing and supporting students transitioning from elementary to middle school. The logistics and rigors of being a secondary school student require preparation and training and the middle school

teachers, staff, and administration have been intentional in meeting that need. To assist students with the transition, a Foundations class for 6th graders was introduced to provide essential skills for navigating online platforms and developing effective study habits. The school vear kicked-off with a donut breakfast to welcome and begin building relationships for incoming 6th and 7th graders.

The first semester has been marked by a series of student life events. More than 300 students attended the middle school Back to School Bash at Rapids Waterpark. This was a day of fun for students and teachers that fostered positive relationships. In September, students attended retreats at the Realife Camp in Vero Beach, providing a respite from studies and a time of team-building and spiritual growth. Homecoming was another highlight as students enjoyed tailored activities planned by the middle school student council. During Spiritual Emphasis Week,

middle schoolers volunteered to create paracord lanyards and write appreciation cards to service members.

Students continue to grow in the classroom and on the field. They participated on sports teams including: cross country, swimming, volleyball, and cheer. Notably, the middle school football team boasted an outstanding season, experiencing just one loss and demonstrating exceptional dedication and sportsmanship. Students also remained dedicated to academic excellence. Those who achieved the Principal's List Honor Roll were recognized with a special off-campus lunch, and the commitment to academic achievement was further celebrated during the induction ceremony of the National Junior Honor Society.

We anticipate a second semester filled with continued blessings and achievements for this vibrant body of middle schoolers.











# Elementary Overview

The King's Academy is firmly rooted in its faith and values with a rich 54-year heritage that guides us in our decision making. With this strong foundation, we are not moved by passing trends, pandemics, or cultural phenomena. The Book of Psalms opens with a description of a blessed man, "He is like a tree planted by streams of water, which yields its fruit in season and whose leaf does not wither. Whatever he does prospers." - Psalms 1:3. This scripture beautifully articulates our prayer and goals for the students. As change occurs, students are learning to adapt and adjust. They are learning to stay firmly rooted in their faith in God who does not change.

The King's Academy is intentional about designing spaces and designating time to enhance the experiences of its faculty and students. I am a firm believer in change of place plus change of pace equals change of perspective. Change is good and change is constant.

When students returned to campus

in the fall, they were excited to see new and reimagined spaces. The newly opened Esther B. O'Keeffe Innovation Center was designed to be a hub of creativity and ingenuity. The elementary music building was completely remodeled and now includes a stage and a larger-thanlife, wall mounted digital piano. The playground received a significant upgrade with the addition of new turf which created a safer and cleaner space for daily play. These new places provide an opportunity for a new pace; therefore, elective classes were increased from 30 minutes to 40 minutes this year. Students move throughout the school day to





different places at different paces. This fosters a holistic educational experience and enhances their perspective. While embracing these changes, we do not waver in our core values and beliefs.

We seek to build their faith by opening each day in prayer. Daily Bible classes help deepen their understanding of God's word. Weekly chapels are carefully crafted to engage and encourage students through relevant messages. The annual Elementary Night at the varsity football game is a major

connecting event for families and a fun opportunity for students to cheer, run, bounce and play. Parents are encouraged to be a part of their child's experience not only for special events, but they have an open and standing invitation to join their students for lunch and chapel.

Our annual Constitution Day chapel is a vivid reminder of our nation's foundation and heritage. Fifth grade students performed a dramatic re-enactment of the signing of the Mayflower Compact, the Declaration of Independence, and the Constitution. The Constitution has had 27 amendments (changes) added to it since 1787. The changes were made in the best interest of the people and were not adopted without careful planning and consensus. The same can be said of recent changes at TKA. We hold strong to our convictions and foundation, while at the same time adopting new additions that will benefit the students and enhance their experience.





he addition of the Esther B. O'Keeffe Innovation Center has been a welcome blessing for our elementary students and teachers this year. The gift of added space draws students out of their classrooms and into another engaging environment where they can collaborate and interact with new content. Throughout the day, students from junior kindergarten through fifth grade weave through the first-floor hallways of the Innovation Center to learn in the Art Studio, STEM Lab, Elementary Digital Lab, and Explore Lab.

Each of these spaces was uniquely designed to enhance instruction through hands-on practical learning. The Elementary Art Studio provides students the

opportunity to study visual arts through drawing, painting, and sculpting. The STEM and Explore Labs focus on collaborative learning experiences where students use critical thinking skills to discover, build, and design through complex activities. Students in these classes are seldom stationary as they move through the classroom to collaborate with classmates, gather materials, or field test their latest creations. The Elementary Digital Lab provides a safe space for first through fifth graders to learn stewardship over technology. Students are taught basic 21st-century skills that move from consuming to producing content.

These designated spaces allow the elementary department to offer robust programming including the

after-school STEM Club, Drawing/ Cartooning Club, Art Club, and Coding Club. These after-school activities encourage students to further explore areas of interest while building a strong rapport with their teachers.

Whether learning basic coding skills, proper pencil strokes in art, or how to create a closed circuit using a potato, learning is coming to life for our elementary students. For something to be innovative, it must move beyond a placid approach toward a steady flux of collaboration and critical thinking. These new classroom spaces provide a steady stream of learning for our youngest learners as we guide them toward innovation.

n its 12th year, the International Student Program is making a significant global impact while shaping and influencing The King's Academy community. The 2023-2024 school year welcomed 67 students from 21 countries, including our first students from Nigeria and Bangladesh. Other countries represented this year include the Bahamas, Brazil, Canada, China, Columbia, Estonia, France, Germany, Honduras, Hong Kong, Japan, Kenya, Slovakia, South Korea, Spain, Thailand, Ukraine, Vietnam, and the U.S. Virgin Islands. The diversity of our program is one of its many strengths and we are grateful to God for continuing to expand its reach. Our prayer each year is that students' lives are transformed by the love of Christ and enriched by the global community at our school.

Fostering cultural integration, mutual understanding, respect, and empathy cultivates an environment that appreciates and learns from diverse cultures. International students choose American high schools not only for the renowned academic standing but also to immerse themselves in the richness of the culture. They desire to learn about and participate in authentic American traditions, holidays, and practices. In return, our domestic students, staff, and faculty have the unique opportunity to discover and directly engage with people from other countries, cultures, and diverse backgrounds. The International Student Program not only connects TKA with the wider world but also promotes a mindset of understanding and acceptance that transcends cultural and political differences.

In an era marked by unprecedented connectivity, fostering global understanding and mutual respect is more crucial than ever.
One innovative approach is the Global Ambassador program. The program offers students a chance

to take on a leadership role while concurrently acting as a supportive peer for incoming international students. Global Ambassadors are thoughtfully matched with new international students, considering factors such as age, grade level, and shared interests. During the summer the ambassadors initiate contact, ensuring that by the time the new students attend TKA, they encounter a friendly face to welcome them to the campus. Global Ambassadors also play a pivotal role during orientation by helping to show students around campus and answering questions about classes, clubs, sports, and more. The program's impact is two-fold. It helps international students feel welcomed and valued by our domestic students and introduces domestic students to various new cultures thus enriching their educational experience and deepening their cultural understanding.

Jonathan has served as a global ambassador for the International Student Program for the past five years. He will graduate in 2024 and plans to study politics in college. With the foundation laid while serving as a global ambassador, Jonathan is now more equipped to exert political influence rooted in a deep understanding of international perspectives and a commitment to promoting global connection and mutual respect.

oe Miura enrolled at The King's Academy in August 2021. The student arriving then is not the same student who will graduate this spring. Perseverance, tenacity, growth, and transformation are a few of the words that describe her time at TKA.


Moe is from Kanagawa, Japan, located immediately south of Tokyo, where her mom, dad, and brother still live. Growing up Moe and her brother, who always loved American culture, watched American TV shows and movies. After watching the show Glee for the first time, she decided that she wanted to experience an American high school. Moe and her family researched various schools but the moment she discovered The King's Academy, with its myriad of programs and courses, she knew it was her top choice. She studied diligently to improve her English proficiency and enrolled in an English language course designed for adults in Hawaii to reach her goal. Moe was determined to make her dream a reality but the path would prove to be a difficult one.

Just before traveling to Hawaii for the English program in 2020, both of her parents were diagnosed with cancer. She describes her time in Hawaii as the hardest time in her life. She was only 15 years old, worried about her parents' health, and studying in a new country. Unyielding in the pursuit of her dream,

she persevered. Her goal was realized when she was accepted to King's and shortly after returning to Japan from Hawaii she was packing her bags to begin her high school career in Florida. After missing her connecting flight, Moe was stuck in a foreign airport for hours and finally arrived in West Palm Beach in the middle of the night where her host family, Cristian and Kristen Valenti, were waiting with balloons and a "Welcome Moe" sign. While she was thankful to be in America and no longer navigating airports, her luggage was lost and she was exhausted. There were several times during her first year that she contemplated returning home, and in her second year a health concern nearly forced her to. A transformation, however, occurred in that season of her life that was not recognized at the time, but now boldly declares "Jesus saved my life!" Moe was a confident atheist when she arrived in the States, assured that Jesus did not exist. Today, she is a believer who knows that He not only exists, but that He loves her and saved her. Moe's perspective changed. She now understands that the challenges she faced helped her become the person she is today and knows that Jesus was always there directing her path.

During her three years at The King's Academy, Moe has become a member of the National Honor Society, Math National Honor Society, Spanish
National Honor Society, Future Business
Leaders of America, and has helped
with the King's Corner Coffee Shop.
She has also served on the International
Student Leadership Council where
she's had a tremendous impact on new

## **Spiritual Emphasis** Week


Each semester, the Student Ministries Office hosts a Spiritual **Emphasis Week and students** participate in various events to grow in their faith and learn more about Jesus. This year's Fall Spiritual Emphasis was held over six days and included morning worship, Bible studies, Chapel services, a local church fair, and special service projects. More than 400 students attended the optional morning worship to launch the week, and more than 100 students participated in the Group 3:16 Bible study. Six churches attended the church fair which gave students the opportunity to connect with local pastors during lunch. This year's keynote speaker for Chapel was Brent Crowe. Brent is the Vice President of Student Leadership University (SLU), an organization that trains thousands of students from all over the world in leadership and faith. Brent is also the author of several books including his most recent, "Ten Steps to Your

Best Life: Connecting the New Normal to the Ancient Wisdom of Jesus." Brent connected with Impact Leadership students to host a unique question and answer time and joined a special luncheon hosted for the 70+ students who would be attending SLU. Middle school students participated in a service project to cap off the week. They created paracord bracelets for the men and women in our armed forces. High school students partnered with Palm Beach Parks and Recreation and collected 58 pounds of trash from Lake Worth Beach. Spiritual Emphasis Week was a true testament to how TKA leads in opportunities for students to be challenged in their faith and grow as followers of Jesus.

## **Equipping Parents Through Workshops**

Raising children in today's culture can be especially difficult and daunting. Parents may feel alone and overwhelmed with how to best teach or "train their child in the way he should go," Proverbs 22:6. The King's Academy partners with parents to

equip them with helpful resources and connects them with experts who can offer sound and godly advice. Parent Workshops are a wonderful way to learn new information, connect with other parents, and discover how to best love their children through their formative years. ## **Double Mission Trips, Double the Impact!**

The opportunity to serve on TKA's annual mission trip has always been in high demand, but this year proved to be entirely unique and miraculous. In record fashion, registration for the 5-day trip filled within the first five minutes of opening, leaving a stacked waitlist of more than 50 students. During this year's homecoming

ministry drive we experienced an unprecedented number of donations collecting more than \$53,000! This allowed us to take two back-to-back teams to Nicaragua with Hope Project International, essentially doubling the number of students able to attend and the homes being built. ## Students Learn to Share & Defend their Faith

In October, students and faculty from the Christian Leadership Program participated in MAVEN's apologetics immersive experience. This engaging mission trip to Florida Atlantic University was led by

Mickey Smith, TKA's Associate Director of Instrumental Arts, captivated us with his Godgiven musical gift and his ability to connect with our students. # Frank DiMino Early Childhood Center

KA's vision to expand its early childhood programs with an on-campus facility is becoming a reality thanks to God's provision and generous donors like Mr. Frank DiMino. In late September, a ceremony was held to celebrate the groundbreaking of the 10,500 square foot Frank DiMino Early Childhood Center. Mr. Frank DiMino, Darren Bardell, and Wendy Balch along with school administrators

gathered to turn the soil on the new Early Childhood Center. The Center will serve nearly 200 two-through four-year-old students with an enriching and developmentally appropriate program and curriculum that will prepare our youngest learners for elementary school and beyond. The center will be an extension and foundation for the school's K-12th grade program.

Students enrolled in TKA's Early Childhood Program will be nurtured through play-based learning and guided by loving teachers through key development milestones in a new on-campus, safe, caring, faith-filled environment beginning in the Fall of 2024.

The Center will feature handson, indoor and outdoor learning spaces. Classrooms will have ample footage and functionality with natural light aesthetics

With furniture and resources sized for our youngest learners, students will be able to access and explore learning materials as well as complete independent tasks like pushing in their chair, washing their hands, and choosing a toy.

The Early Childhood Program seeks to provide an exceptional Biblically based and developmentally appropriate program for the young learners. The program is designed to not only to impart knowledge but also reveal God's love by teaching to the child's heart. Qualified nurturing teachers will provide a fun, engaging, and structured learning environment for students as they grow and learn with the foundation of a Biblical worldview.

# Family Fun Night!






by actors during this transformative period in the entertainment industry. Students worked diligently to produce this monumental production and pushed themselves to reach new limits both on and off the stage.



#### Fall Teams Reset the Standard

The Lions athletic teams set a new standard and rewrote the district championship history book this fall. The off-season preparation by our players and coaches led to five district championships. Boys swim and dive, girls swim and dive, girls cross country, football, and girls volleyball all captured district championships and beyond.

Boys swim and dive acquired their third district championship in school history, while the girls team earned their second consecutive and back-to-back title. This was the first time in school history that both the boys and girls won the district title in the same year.

The girls cross country team won the district championship while also capturing the Palm Beach County Championship for the second consecutive year. This was the 8th district championship for the girls and 13th overall in the cross country program.

The Lions football team followed up their 2022 district championship with another title in 2023 defeating district foes Glades Central, Suncoast, and Inlet Grove for the championship allowing only 7 points total in the three district games.

The girls volleyball team continued its winning ways with their fourth consecutive district championship. The team is chasing the consecutive district championship record set by girls soccer (6) from 2007-2012 and boys basketball (10) from 1976-1986.

Under Coach Jenn Allen, the Lions have competed in the FHSAA State Finals every year since 2009, winning six state championships along the way and seven regional championships. The 2023-24 Lions with a small contingency of seniors and even larger number of underclassmen provided a sound mix of experience with youthful enthusiasm. Through competitions and showcases, the Lions grew quickly and were poised for the finals. They saved their best performance for the last and were strong enough to ensure third place. It was an amazing example how hard work, dedication, skill and commitment breeds success and why TKA Comp Cheer is one of the premier programs in Florida.

# **Cross Country Continues to Chase Success**

Lions cross country has become one of the top programs in Palm Beach County. Boys Head Coach Bill Mitchell and Girls Head Coach Melissa Perry continue to put in extra effort, planning, and implementation leading to new successes each year. The program has grown in interest and we look forward to exciting years ahead. One of the youngest teams in Palm Beach County, the Lions were consistently in the top five in races throughout the season. Senior Hudson Gates led the way, finishing in the top ten five times and finishing second in the County Championships. He was named All-County by The Palm Beach Post. The boys advanced to both the regional and state finals with their strong depth and team approach.

The girls team had a historic run, posting one of the best seasons in program history. The Lions finished in first place in six races, including capturing the county championship and the district championship. They advanced to the state finals where they finished a remarkable 7th out of 32 teams. Avery Fronrath was both the district and county champion and was named All-County First Team. What a memorable season for Lions cross country with a bright future ahead and so many underclassmen returning in 2024.















# **Swimming and Diving** Makes a Splash

TKA swimming has a rich tradition of excellence and this fall season may have been the best overall for the program. The Lions had seven first place team finishes. For the first time in school history, both the boys and girls teams won the district title in the same season. At the FHSAA Regional meet, both teams had impressive performances to move to the state finals, led by individual championships from Aly Bozzuto and **Emma Herrera**. At the FHSAA State Championship, both teams finished in third place, another milestone achievement for the program and the first time both boys and girls finished in the top three at the finals in the same season. Following the season, Aly Bozzuto signed with NCAA Division I Liberty University, and Noah Smith signed with NJCAA power Indian River State College. Aly Bozzuto, Noah Smith, Emma Herrera, Noah Engstrom, Hamilton Gates, and Julianna **Bell** were named All-County First Team by The Palm Beach Post. Girls swimming and dive head coach **Gina Proscia** was named the Coach of the Year by the Post and Sun-Sentinel. Coach Zuchowski and Coach Proscia continue to build a program of excellence and 2023 was a special chapter in the program's history.

# **TKA Football Repeats as District Champion**

Lions football continued to establish a championship legacy of its own in 2023. Coming off a district title in 2022, expectations were high for Coach Dan Burack's team and they did not disappoint. Establishing themselves as a top 10 team in the county from week one, the Lions finished the regular season with an impressive record of 8-2 and another district championship. Along the way, the Lions picked up dramatic wins over traditional powers Gulliver Prep and True North and remained undefeated in the district. In the regional quarterfinals, the Lions picked up their first playoff win in five years with a big win at Kahlert Stadium over Somerset Canyons. **Marion Victor** piled up over 1,000 yards rushing this season enroute to an All-County selection. Wide receivers Javian Jones and Reggie Workman combined for 26 touchdowns, and quarterback **Joe Dailey** threw for over 1,000 yards with an incredible 21-0 touchdown to interception output. Javian Jones, Reggie Workman, and Joe Dailey were named All-County Offense. Defensively, the Lions had a great season with many standouts. Defensive end Nick Darling received All-County recognition and is a nominee for Player of the Year. With 17 wins and two district titles in the last two seasons, the Lions have proven to be one of the up-andcoming powers in the county and South Florida.



# **Golf is on Par for Future Success**

With just two seniors, this year's golf teams made their mark throughout the season and were the youngest in the district overall. The boys were led by **Ethan Keen** but had excellent performances from **Ethan Keen**, **Jadon Lansat**, **Cameron Cantine**, and **Beau Allen** throughout the season. An individual highlight was **Max McCabe's** hole in one at the TKA Invitational at Mayacoo Lakes. The boys picked up five team wins and finished a solid fifth place at the district meet.

The Lady Lions had a breakout season with a team composed of primarily 6th-9th graders and senior **Leelou Girault**. # Girls Volleyball wins its Fourth Consecutive District Championship

Lady Lions Volleyball has long been a powerhouse in Palm Beach County. They came into the season with three district titles under their belts and continued their excellent play. Competing against the toughest schedule in the county, they finished the season at 19-10 with big wins over Calvary, Boca Christian, West Boca, and Dwyer among others. Taking on St. Andrews in the district championship, the Lady Lions played one of their best matches of the season to bring home their fourth straight district title. TKA advanced to the regional championship match and finished the season ranked as the #10 team in 3A. Kelly Kinney, an All-County selection, nominee for Player of the Year, and University of Minnesota commit, led the team in kills and aces and was second in digs. Katie Shelhamer led the team in digs and Sofia Aguilera paced the Lions in assists. # 1983


