








Once again, I had the opportunity to attend this year's Grand Blanc High School Alumni Banquet and Award Ceremony, which Charlie Carmody and his committee did an outstanding job planning and hosting! Three former graduates werehonored as distinguished alumni: Steve Jaksa (1974), Bob Stefanski (1980), and Jim Gooch (1985). FISHER IS THE US CHAMPION

Grand Blanc High School Junior Grant Fisher won the biggest title in his career last Fall when he won the Foot Locker Cross Country National Championship. Grant defeated the field of the top 40 high school runners in the country at Balboa Park in San Diego. The victory closed an undefeated season for Grant as he won all six races he competed in during the Fall Varsity Cross Country season including the Division 1 State Final, and the Midwest Regional Finals to qualify for the National Championships.

Grant was a finalist last July in the 1500m event at the World Youth Championships in Donetsk, Ukraine. His track season has begun this Spring with the hopes of helping the Bobcats win the Division 1 State Championship. He has been a member of the State Runner-Up teams the past two

In January, Grant was named Gatorade National Cross Country Runner of the Year. The Gatorade Player of the Year award recognizes outstanding athletic excellence as well as high standards of academic achievement and exemplary character demonstrated on and off the racecourse. Grant is now a finalist for the Gatorade Male High School Athlete of the Year award. Grant was also an All-State Honorable Mention in Boys Soccer this past fall, Fisher has maintained a 3.95 GPA in the classroom. A peer tutor at his school, he has volunteered locally as part of an effort to renovate the Grand Blanc High athletics concession stand in addition to donating his time to youth sports programs.





THE HOLY GRAIL FOUND!

As the GBHS Alumni Association continues to maintain an archival collection of Echo's, one yearbook continued to allude our completing this collection 1923. Only one copy of this paperback first ever GBHS yearbook was known to exist in the collection at the Grand Blanc Heritage Museum. I have searched at garage sales, EBay, local libraries, and spoken with many fellow alums about this 1923 Echo, but I have never seen one. With so few high school students back in the early 1920's, there weren't many copies of the Echo even printed and sold at GBHS.

Walking to the main office at GBHS recently, one of our hall security members stopped me with quite a surprise. He was holding a 1923 Echo that a fellow had dropped off at the front desk. The man has been cleaning out his mother's home and ran across this yearbook. He thought the school would enjoy having it. This 1923 Echo is in perfect condition and more than 90 years old. Our collection is now complete and each year grows with the addition of a new Echo from our award winning yearbook class.



Grand Blanc School before fire

Odds are you probably don't remember this one the Grand Blanc Schoolhouse was originally built in 1867 as "Whole District No. 2". The land was bought for only \$300. The building had fallen apart by 1890, when it was rebuilt. This second schoolhouse can be seen on the far left. It is here that the first consolidated school in the state was established in

1903/1904, when the Cook and Porter Schools joined the Grand Blanc School. It was expanded twice between 1904 and 1920, making a five-room school. It burned on

December 9, 1920 when a kerosene stove in the home economics classroom exploded. When the schoolhouse burned, plans immediately began for its replacement. Construction began in March, 1921 on the new, Warren-Holmes designed school building.

When it opened January 9, 1922, the Grand Blanc Township Unit School was considered to be state-of-the-art; among the most modern high schools in the state. Increases in enrollment forced the construction of additions.

Three classrooms were added above the gym in 1924, followed by 11 in 1926. A separate building with a cafeteria, shop and band rooms was built in 1938. A planned eight room addition, the Annex, was reduced to four during the Second World War due to the project not being supportive of the war effort. The final additions were added in 1946 (six classrooms), 1950 (eight classrooms) and 1952 (six classrooms and a new gym). When

the current high school was opened in 1964, the building became the junior high school. It was named after Ezra W. Perry in 1967. In 1983 the building was renamed the Perry Center, and is currently the home of a number of programs, including community education and an elementary program, City School.

The first high school gymnasium was part of the original segment of the building built in 1921. It was used for gym classes and basketball games. A balcony with bleacher seating rings the upper level. The gym was expanded with a large stage in 1924, with a locker room underneath the stage. The old gym fell out of use when the new gymnasium was completed in

1952, however it was used for physical education classes into the 1980s. When Perry Junior High School closed

in 1983, the gym became a warehouse for the school district.





The cafeteria that students from the 1940s, 50s and 60s remember was actually the second used by the school. The first was located in the oldest segment of the school, where the main offices are now. The first cafeteria wasn't even a cafeteria at all; it was the home economics classroom. Many kids brought their food, or went home for lunch. Only the students who lived farthest away were served a hot meal by the home economics class. The new cafeteria was finished in 1938, in a separate building that was later connected with a covered walkway. It is still in use today, but the stage you might remember was covered.


If you went to the high school in the late 1950s and early 1960s, this was your library. It was the last of many uses for this section of the school. The entirety of the library was built in 1924, when enrollment increases necessitated new junior high classrooms. Three classrooms and offices were built above the original gym a sixth grade, seventh and eighth grade and commercial classroom. The rooms later served various purposes, such as for home rooms. In the late 1950s the addition was reconfigured into the school's library, with the commercial classroom remaining on the west end. Today the entire addition is open, and is not in use.

The old study hall is one of the least changed classrooms in the school. It was built as part of the original school building. While its main use was a study hall, it was also used for home room classes, among other

things. It continued to be used when the building was the junior high school. It is currently used for storage. The picture on the far left is from soon after the building opened in 1922, the middle picture is from the 1930's, and the picture

on the right is from the present.
