For the past twelve years the GBHS Alumni Association has produced and mailed the <u>Bobcat Alumni Banner</u> in the Spring and Fall of each year. It had been a labor of love for the Alumni Board to continue to keep you informed about the happenings of former classmates - and we will continue to do so with our future editions.

The Grand Blanc Educational Foundation has funded the Alumni Association through generous contributions from GBHS alumni and friends. The Foundation has also funded many additional educational programs for Grand Blanc students. There will be no charge for the **eBanner**, which will be sent in PDF file format - although, we hope you will love the additional material that will be included.

AN ITCH TO RUN





Sharon (Dickie)
Thompson Class of 1998
has an "itch to run." After
an illustrious running
career that includes
All-State, while in high
school, All-America at
the University of
Tennessee, and a twotime qualifier for U.S.

Olympic Track & Field Trials, Sharon was preparing to hang up her running shoes. Now married and living in Franklin, TN, with two children, she told everybody she was no longer going to race. But, during the summer of 2010, six months after the birth of her youngest child, something happened.

"After I did the Olympic Trials in '08, I said I just wanted to stay with my family," Sharon says, "Then this summer I got the itch to start doing some road races."

Sharon set a course record, in April last year, during the Country Music Half Marathon in Nashville. In August, she returned to the Flint area to compete in the Crim 10-Mile Road Race where she placed fourth overall among women.


Last October, Sharon qualified for the U.S. Olympic women's marathon trials by posting a time of 2:41:28 in the Chicago Marathon. The trials will take place in Houston, TX, in January of 2012. Her time

met the "B" standard for women. A time of 2:39, or better, would have qualified her for "A" standard. Runners qualifying for the "A"

standard receive some financial support.

Though she is 31 years old, it is not unusual for women in their mid- to late-30's to compete for Olympic marathon berths.

Sharon's marathon training peaked at 70 to 80 miles a week and she doesn't plan to increase it much before the Olympic Trials. She balances her training and her family life by getting out before her children arise. Her husband, Kevin Thompson

GB Grad on set of "30 Rock"

Stephanie Zielinski, GBHS Class of 2007, currently a senior at Lafayette College in Easton, Pa., walked into Silvercup Studios, watched filming for the next episode of 30 Rock, and chatted with Alec Baldwin. Although her externship was a thrilling experience for Zielinski, it was just another day at the office for her host, Catherine Miervaldis an '07 alumnus of Lafayette College and an NBC Universal executive assistant.

This 10-hour externship gave Zielinski a valuable perspective into what goes on behind the scenes at the popular television show.

"Being around these celebrities was of course a new and exciting experience," Stephanie explains, "I'm a huge fan of 30

Rock and of Tina Fey, and I was lucky enough to meet her. But for me, it was also very important that I got to meet the people behind the scenes."

During her externship, Zielinski had the opportunity to meet with department heads for graphics, locations, set decorating, and post production. Stephanie says, "I learned about all the components and people necessary to produce a television show."

Having enrolled in Lafayette College thinking she would major in neuroscience but Stephanie will be leaving with a double major in English and international economics & commerce. She believes her experience is an example of why she chose Lafayette in the first place. As a freshman, she was told that Lafayette wanted her to grow during her four years and leave a different person than the one that arrived.

"That is exactly my experience," says Zielinski. She was first introduced to the College through her competitive swimming career. "I chose Lafayette because it offers the perfect mix for me as a student-athlete. As a member of the Patriot League, it has the prestige of the

large Division 1 schools with the student-centered approach of a small, academically challenging college. Plus it has a beautiful, historic, East Coast campus located in close proximity to New York and Philadelphia, an especially nice feature for someone coming from the Midwest," says Zielinski.

For Stephanie, the externship helped her focus on what she wants to do after she graduates. She hopes to work in either television entertainment or news. At this point, she is not sure as to whether she is interested in the production or business end of the industry. For this reason she says, "I'm pursuing graduate rotational programs which give you a variety of experiences. Like this externship program, it allows you to find out where you fit best within a company and gives you exposure in a variety of departments.

A Celebration of the 50's

Under blue skies and temperatures in excess of 80 degrees, 375 GBHS graduates from the 1950's descended August 14 for an old-fashioned picnic at the Creasey Bicentennial Park in Grand Blanc Township. There was a mountain of food as everyone brought a dish to pass.

Beverages and hotdogs were paid for by a small fee charged to participants.

When the idea of a 50's reunion first surfaced in the Fall of '09, an optimistic estimate of crowd attendance was in the order of 75 - 100 people. Graduating classes in those days were in the neighborhood of 100 students. Obviously, we misread the interest in this get-together.

Grand Blanc, in the 1950's, was a far different community and school system than it is today. The farm community that was Grand Blanc in the latter half of the 19th century and the first four decades of the 20th century was rapidly being overtaken in terms of employment, after WW II, by the General Motors juggernaut. While graduating classes numbered 100 in the 50's, today they are in excess of 600. Hay rides, sock hops, "orientation" for 9th graders (brutal by any standard), senior trips to Chicago, New York City, or Washington, D.C., were part of the social scene at GBHS in the 50's. Respect, courtesy, and civility were hallmarks of behavior. Strict discipline in the school, and in the home, were very much in vogue. A paddling by Mr. Pepper, or Miss Dowd, (always justified) followed some major indiscretion. When either of them walked in to Room 307, the Study Hall, looking for a student half of the room would attempt to hide beneath their desk! In those days, a paddling at school was usually duplicated by one at home.

Everyone knew everyone in the 50's and so, for four glorious hours on August 14th, we reconnected. Memories of people and times past created laughter and tears.


Conversation about lost classmates was part of that interaction. In most cases, other than one's own classmates, the last contact with members of other classes was more than 50 years ago.

A final note on the "reunion". The \$500 that was left, after all expenses were paid, was donated to a local food bank for needy children. What a fitting exclamation point and testimonial to the spirit of giving and sharing that helped define this era.
