Longtime Grand Blanc High School educator, Roger Griffith, enters the Bobcat Sports Hall of Fame on September 10, 2004 at a special ceremony to be held at halftime of the varsity football game.



Roger took in, in 1966, the reins of a wrestling program that was still in its infancy and made it one of the powerhouses in Genesee County and a respected program statewide in a career spanning twelve years.

Highlights of Roger's career as the head varsity wrestling coach include the following:

- · A dual record of 121-38
- Second place in the Big Nine three times
- Broke Owosso's eighty win dual streak in 1967
- Won the Genesee County Invitational in 1975
- Won 2 district championships

1980 Grand Blanc Grad Wins Emmy Award

Todd Haight loves nothing more than to tell a good story. Through his work in print, television and other media, he has developed a passion for telling compelling tales. And last September, he received the ultimate storyteller's prize - the Emmy Award, presented by the National Television Academy.

Appropriately enough, Todd's journey to the Emmy is also a good story.

At 15, he walked into The Grand Blanc News and asked for a job as a reporter. He offered to write a story for free, with the catch that if the story was accepted, he would get a job. It was - and he was hired.

So began nine years of reporting for The Grand Blanc News, The Flint Journal and WTRX radio. He then entered the field of health care communications, developing expertise in advertising

and marketing. Along the way, he graduated with a bachelor's in Journalism from Oakland University and a master's in Advertising from Michigan State University.

In 1995, after nearly a dozen years in health care, Todd was director at an inner-city Detroit hospital when it closed. Out of work, he started Todd Haight Communications, a marketing firm that has developed programs for automotive, academia and other industry groups. His favorite projects have included media relations for the Charity Preview to the North American International Auto Show in Detroit, the largest auto show in North America, and

working with celebrites such as Colin Powell, T. Barry Brazelton and the U.S. Surgeon General.

"Opening the agency has provided great opportunities. You never know what kind of project you'll work on next," he says. New doors opened when he partnered with an ad agency run by a friend, Dan Cobb. "Dan's vision is to create family-friendly, Christian films

and TV shows. He's opened an LA office and partnered with the producer of 'Lost In Space' and several studio heads, so he's making it happen."

Todd's dream has always been to write a book, which made his next project such a surprise. In 2001, he was asked to co-author a health and lifestyle book with Dr. Fred Stransky, a national health expert. The book, The Good News: About Exercise, Nutrition and Weight Control, has sold over 10,000 copies and given Dr. Stransky a voice in the national controversy over Dr. Robert Atkins' diet.

An international tragedy that same year gave Todd and Dan their first shot

at film-making. A family of missionaries was mistaken for drug runners while flying over Peru. The Peruvian Air Force shot them down, killing Roni Bowers and her infant daughter. Husband Jim and son Cory survived, as did the pilot, in an incident that gained worldwide attention. In fact, Diane Sawyer interviewed Jim on prime-time television.

Todd and Dan were asked by Jim's

mission office to create a missionary recruitment video based on the life of Roni Bowers. "Instead, we suggested a mini docudrama that recreates her life," he says. "Jim agreed this was the best way to show why she went to the mission field."


Todd and his film crew traveled to Peru twice right after the 9/11 tragedy. "Seeing their burned-out plane filled with 79 bullet holes - and realizing

three people survived the shooting, fire and crash - really makes you appreciate God's grace," he says.

"We spent nearly three weeks on a houseboat on the Amazon River, and were present when Jim returned to the crash site for the first time. As he arrived, the entire village stood by the river singing hymns Roni had taught them. It was amazing."

The result was the half-hour docudrama, "Worth It All." The response has astounded Todd and his team. "We partnered with Moody Press in Chicago to distribute more than 20,000 videos,

Many people remember Ronald J. Brewer as a distinguished attorney. Some even think of him as a prime example of a "self-made man," who fought against the odds of economics to achieve his goals in life.

Folks in Clio, where he had his law office, remember him as a good man and a good neighbor. Some may even remember him as a young teacher at Atherton Junior High School before a small grant launched him on his career in law.

I didn't know Ron Brewer the man. I was traveling the world and had lost contact. I didn't hear his mother, Mrs. Frank J. Brewer of 2337 E. Hill Rd. when she proudly proclaimed that her son, "has been set on a law career since he was in high school."

I do remember a happy boy, run-



ning around the fields of our little farm on Van Slyke Road when he and his younger brother Bob, came over to play.

Ron was in my older brother Stan's

class. He would graduate with dintinction in 1954, while Bobby and I followed in 1958. We were all playmates.

I remember one birthday party in particular. We had a "weenie-roast," the standard fare in those days with potatoes in the ashes, burnt hotdogs on buns and roasted marshmallows to follow. It was great fun although it must sound tame to today's youngsters.

My mother was a master cake maker and she outdid herself this time. The towering beauty with swirling frosting, candy flowers and candles made our eyes bug out.

I want to thank Kim Smith for her help on this small tribute to her dad, and Bobby, I know how much you must miss your big brother, as all of us who knew him do.

and we're getting reports of hundreds of people committing to the mission field. That's what it's all about."

In September 2003, these experiences culminated in a 2002 Emmy Award for Todd's work as executive producer and co-writer of *Penn Vital Signs*, a half-hour TV series created by his partner, Dan. The dramatic show follows patients through their medical care, from diagnosis to treatment, and has garnered the highest ratings on Philadelphia's toprated ABC station, where the show airs.

It's a regional Emmy Award, so we don't get to go to the festivities in California, but it's the same Emmy you see on TV, awarded at a black-tie event in Philadelphia," he says. "We're just glad to get recognition for an educational show. We were there when one woman

found out her breast cancer had spread, and when a man was saved by a new heart. It's compelling television."

Shows have also been created in Detroit and Chicago, with others planned for Baltimore, Washington and New York. The team has partnered with Lion's Gate Films to develop a national distribution deal, and is creating shows about other industries.

Currently, Todd serves as principal of SmartThinkers, a creative consortium of industry power players and a division of Todd Haight Communications. With its cast of award-winning marketing and events professionals, the agency is poised to become the next successful chapter in Todd's life story.

And later this month, he and his production team will learn whether the show has been nominated for the 2003 Emmy Award.

"We also have the rights to the story of one of the most ethical - and unfortunately, forgotten - men in America. He created one of the world's largest corporations, and got his start in Flint. We're looking for investors and I hope it happens. It's an uplifting story that needs to be told."

He gives a lot of credit to Cathy Snyder, his first news editor. "Without her, it's hard to say what would have happened," he says. "For a small town, Grand Blanc offered a lot of opportunity."
