


"Batch" legacy honored by daughter

Donna Joan Kifer '45, daughter of former Grand Blanc teacher and coach, Donald Batchelor, has contributed assets of a value of \$5000 to the Grand Blanc Educational Foundation in memory of her father, "Batch."

Batch came to Grand Blanc in 1929, and enhanced the lives of students over a period touching five decades. He taught a full schedule of classes while coaching football, basketball and baseball. He became Athletic Director in 1950, and continued to remain active in sports even after he retired in 1961. The athletic field behind Perry Center was named in his honor.

Those coached by Batch will recall his fairness and desire to give everyone a chance. Those taught by him, particularly the science classes, will recall his enthusiastic approach, practical demonstrations and constant advice to "observe your surroundings."

Among Batch's peers were
Edgar Malott, Bernice Berdan, A.J.
Brendel, Howard Pepper, Joy Hough,
Joe Jewett, Howard Cornford, Pete
Dowd, and many others who gave Grand
Blanc students an exceptional education.
Batch would be described by people of
today as an icon. He was a mentor and
friend to many and respected by all, as
evidenced by his election by Genesee

County citizens as their representative to the Michigan Constitutional Convention held in 1962.

It is the hope of the Grand
Blanc Educational Foundation that the
generous gift of Mrs. Kifer, while
rekindling fond memories of that
wonderful era to which her father
contributed so much, will inspire fellow
alumni to make a contribution to the
Foundation. The mission of the Foundation is to generate supplemental finan-



Batch...a mentor and friend to many, and respected by all




Jeff Zittel '81

Mary Pickett, Fondly Remembered

Her eyes still sparkle. The trademark flower still adorns her hair. The enthusiasm to help remains at a high ebb. Time has been her friend. Mary Pickett, now 88, still corresponds with specific students (out of 1500) who sat in her classroom during her 34 year teaching career which was mostly

spent at Grand Blanc schools.

Her calling was to help. Her standards were high. Perhaps she was the one who began the "tradition of excellence."

She's been an hon-ored speaker,

the topic of numerous feature stories and the recipient of several awards. Her desire as a teacher was to be honest, straightforward and fair. She recalls her first day as substitute in a class of 6th graders, the boys being notorious for leaving a messy bathroom in their wake. Enter Mary Pickett. She simply told the boys, "If you don't know how to use the bathroom & pick up after yourselves, I can go in there with you and help." No more problems!

She taught in the days when class size could be as large as 52 and multi-age classes were the norm.

Teaching on character and values was a regular part of her day. She's had her share of woes over the years: 6 surgeries including 3 battles with cancer, yet remains optimistic. "I count my bless-

ings." She's up at 5, does her own cleaning and cooking and still follows two sporting events simultaneously on radio and TV. She daily writes 2-3 cards or letters and receives as many as 10 calls. She's still

One recent phone conversation concluded with the caller saying, "You've made my day better."


She wants to be remembered for four things:

- -her concern for other people
- -the flower in her hair
- -her desire to bring joy to others
- -her strong belief in the Lord

Football field renamed to honor Frank Thomas

Football great Bob Suci retires jersey

Bob Suci, considered to be the greatest athlete in the seventy-eight year history of Grand Blanc High School, was honored in a special half-time presentation September 12 when his jersey, #22, was retired.

Suci starred on the gridiron during the 1955-57 football seasons, in which he scored a school record 45 touchdowns. He led the Bobcats to a school record of a 21 game winning streak while under the guidance of Coach Frank Thomas.

played in the American Football League for the Boston
Patriots and Houston Oilers

Current football coach, Joe
Delaney, proudly presented the

jersey to Suci's former coaches Frank
Thomas, Joe Pitock and Jack Pratt.


