

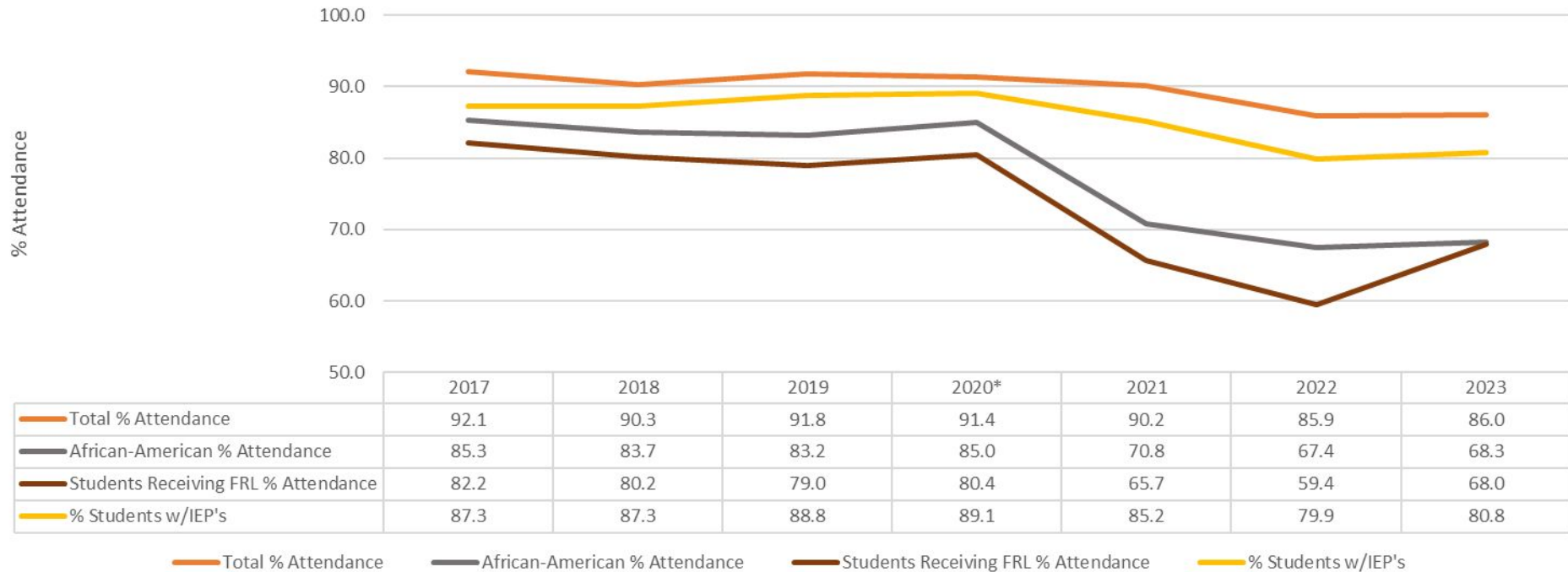

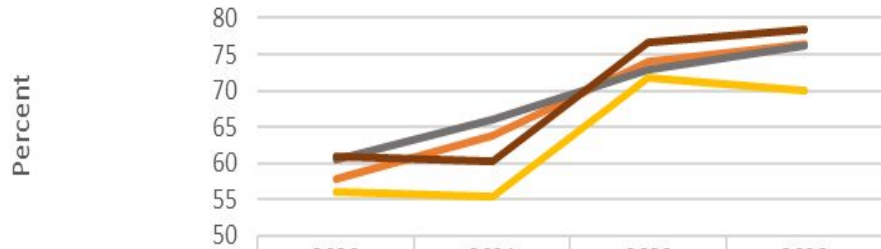
# Attendance Rates

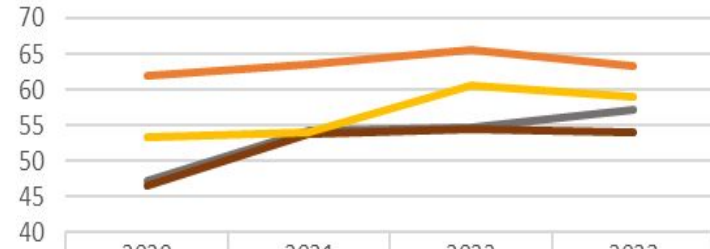

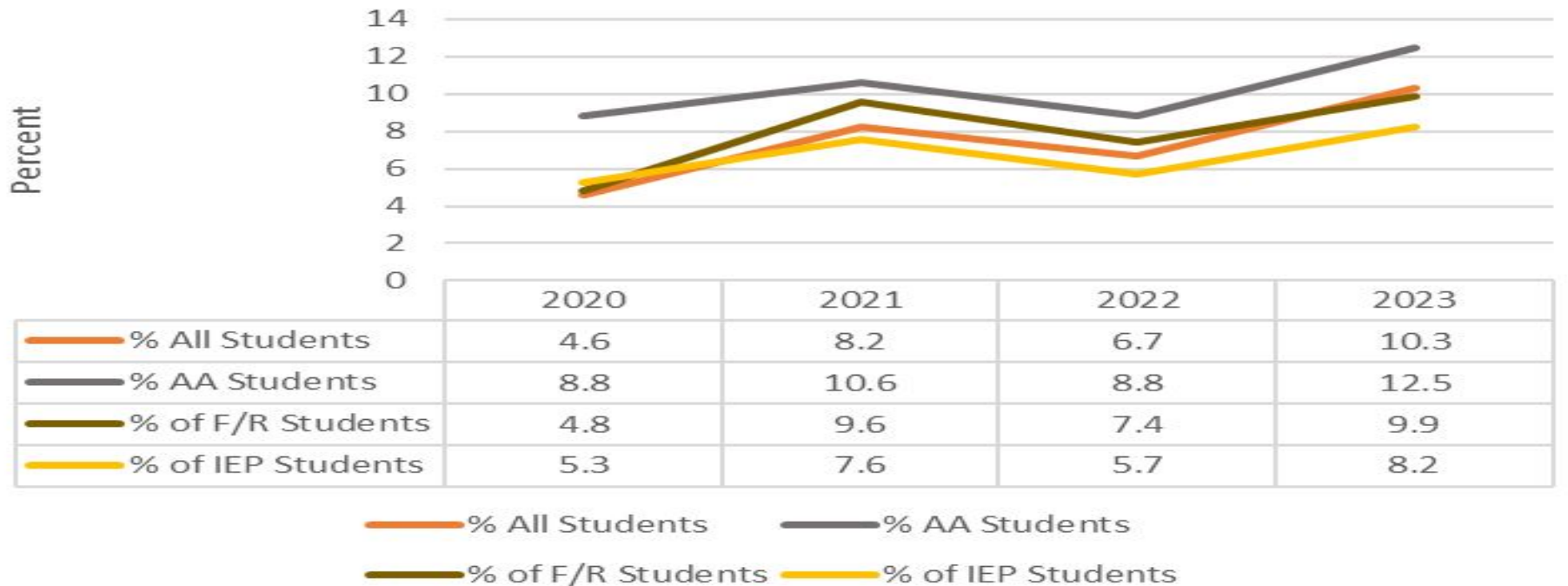

## Total Proficient and Advanced Students - MAP 2023

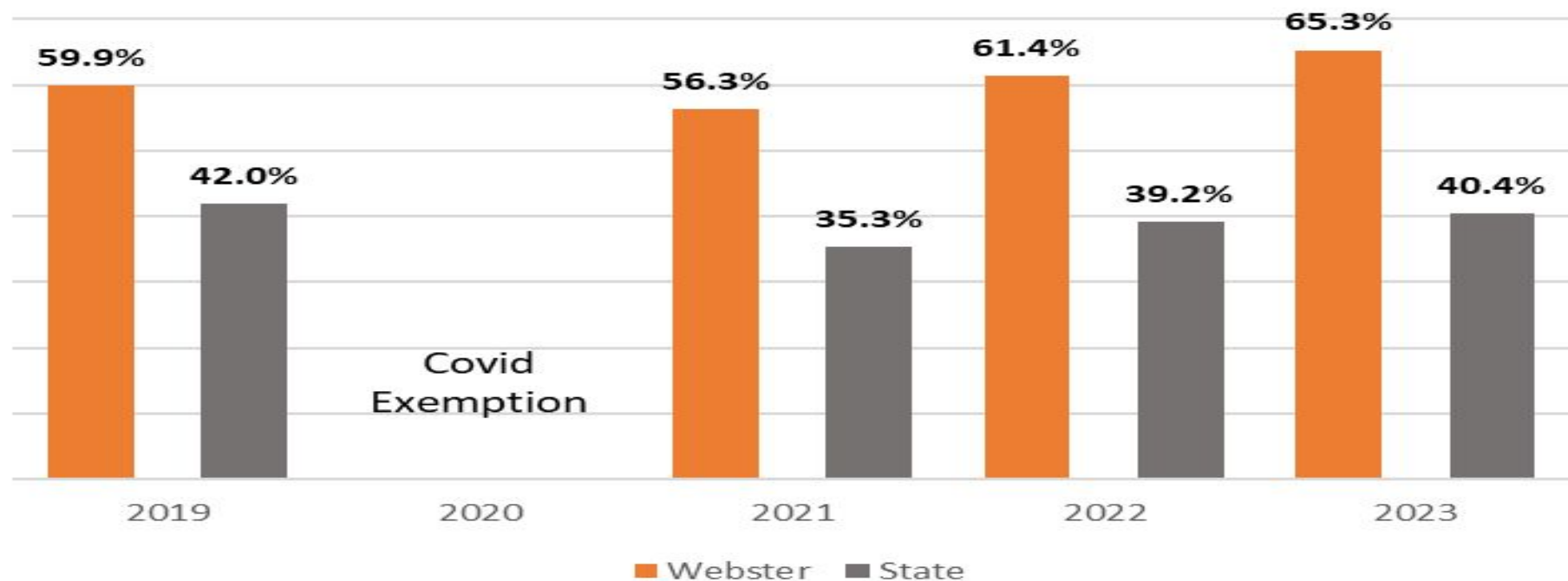

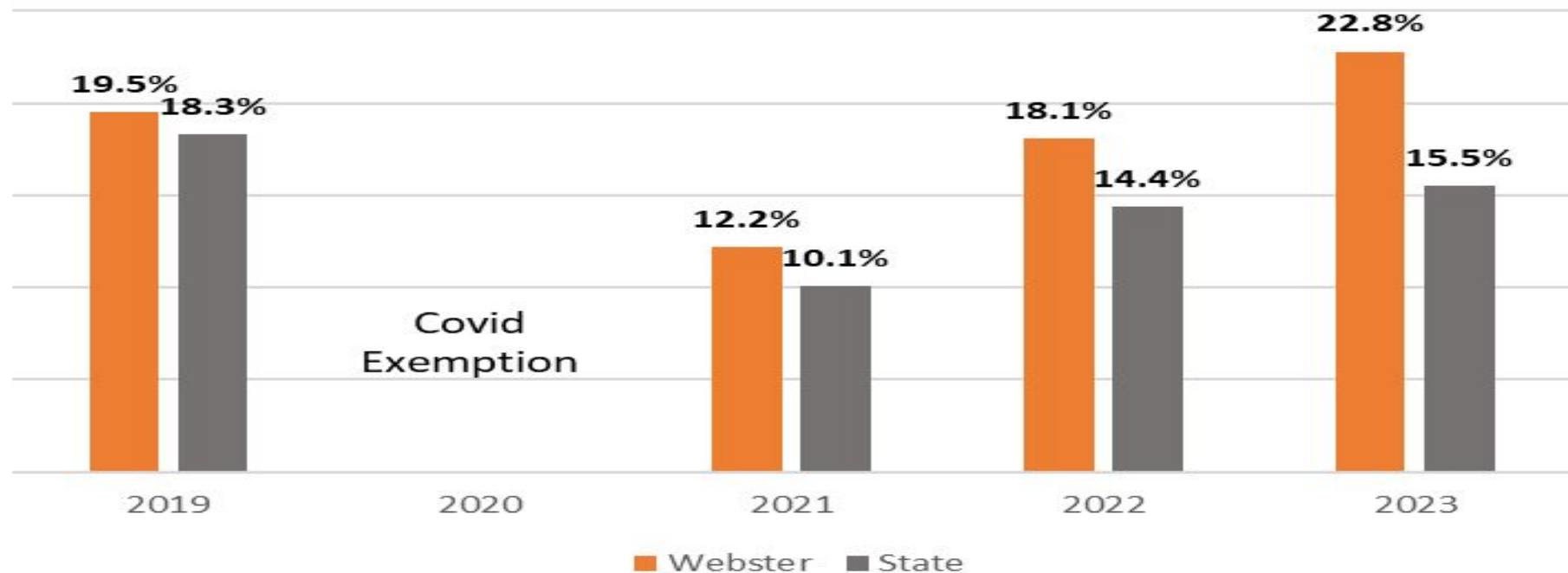


# Math MAP (Grade Level 3-8 and EOC) 2019-2023

### Percent Proficient/Advanced

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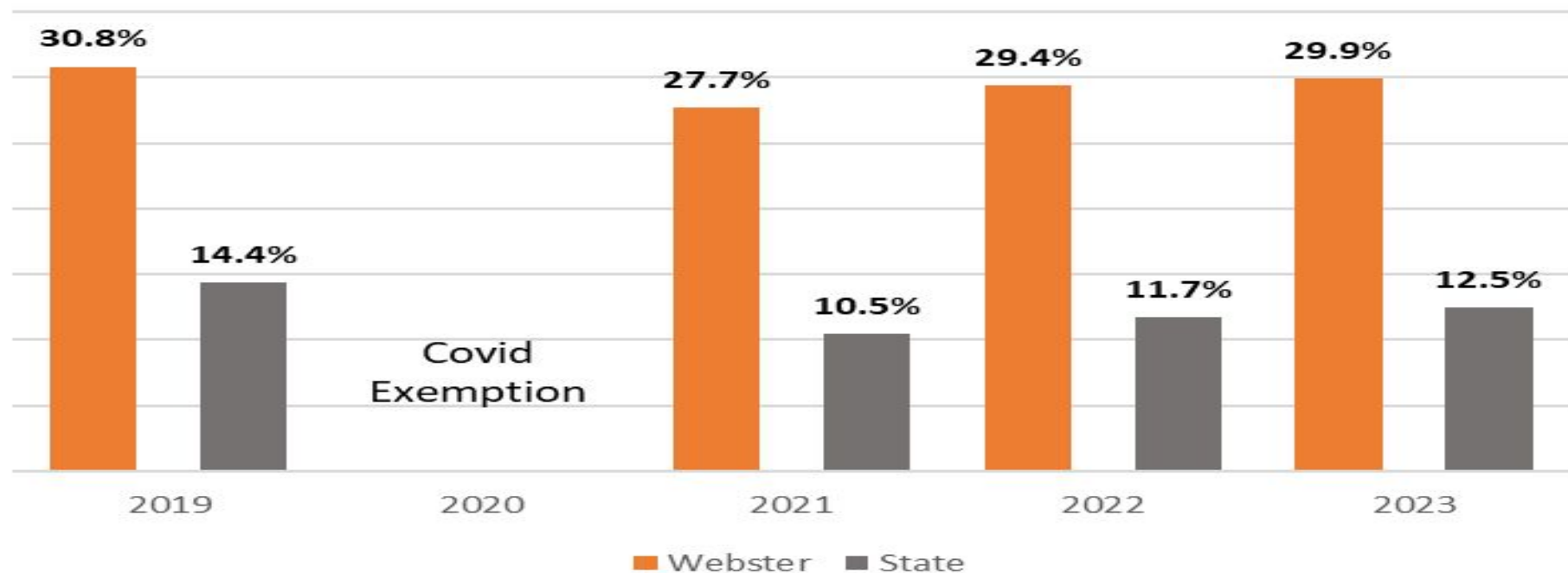


# Math MAP (Grade Level 3-8 and EOC) 2019-2023

### Percent Proficient/Advanced

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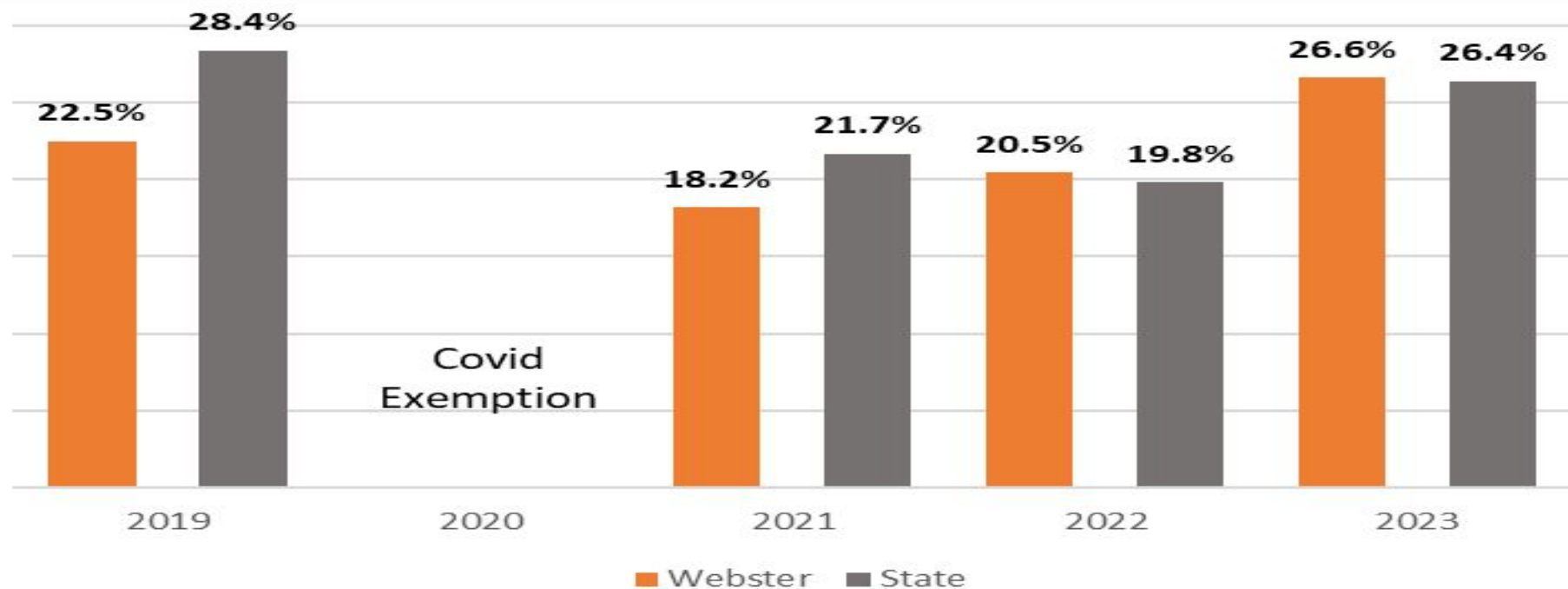


# Math MAP (Grade Level 3-8 and EOC) 2019-2023

### Percent Proficient/Advanced

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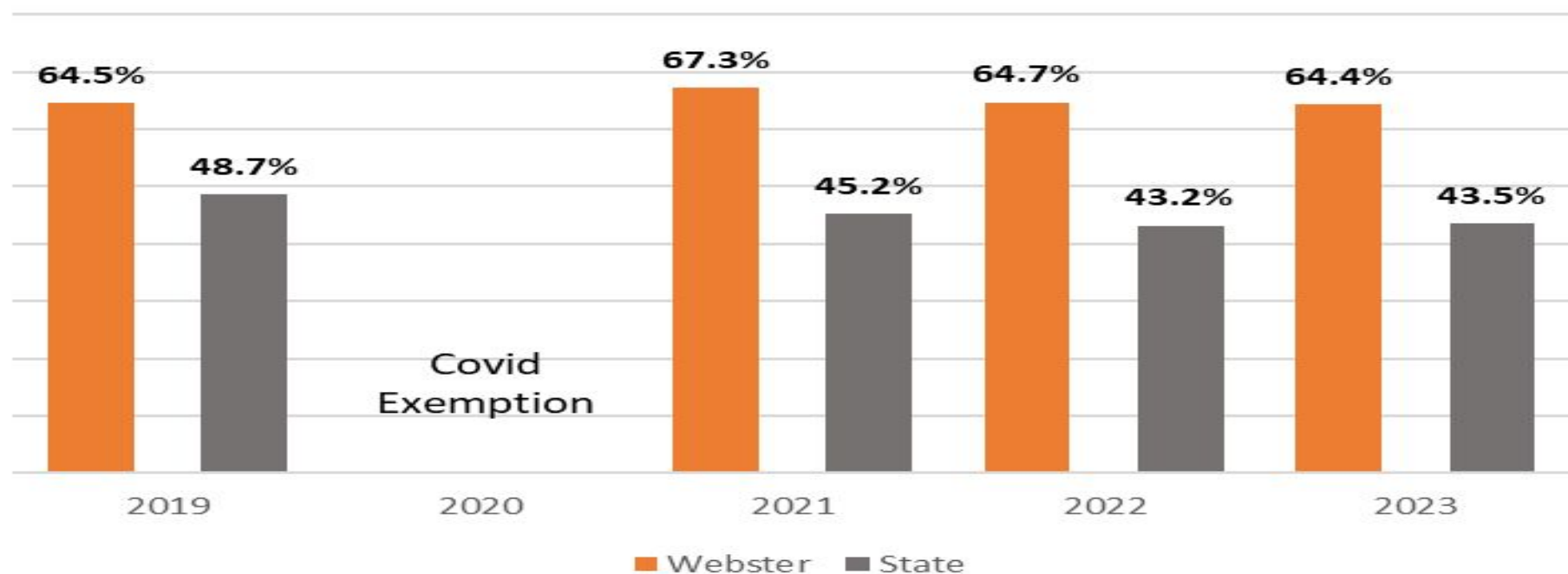


# ELA MAP (Grade Level 3-8 and EOC) 2019-2023

### Percent Proficient/Advanced

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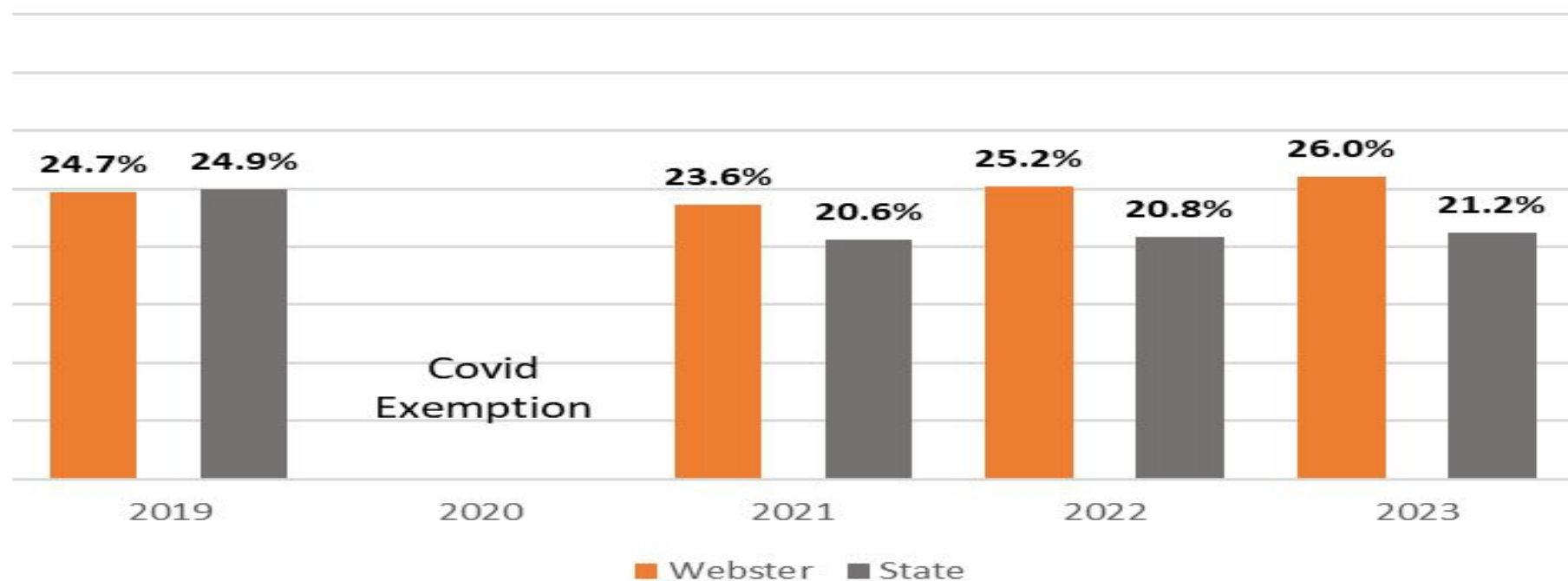


# ELA MAP (Grade Level 3-8 and EOC) 2019-2023

### Percent Proficient/Advanced

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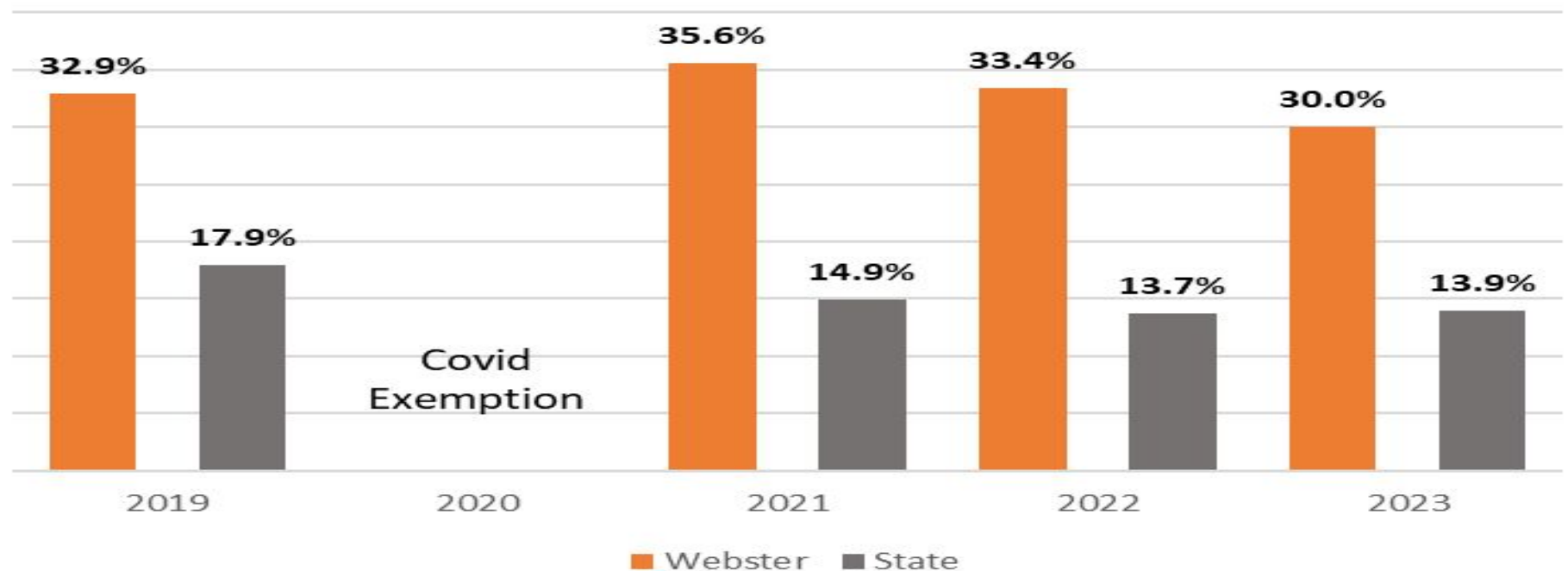


# ELA MAP (Grade Level 3-8 and EOC) 2019-2023

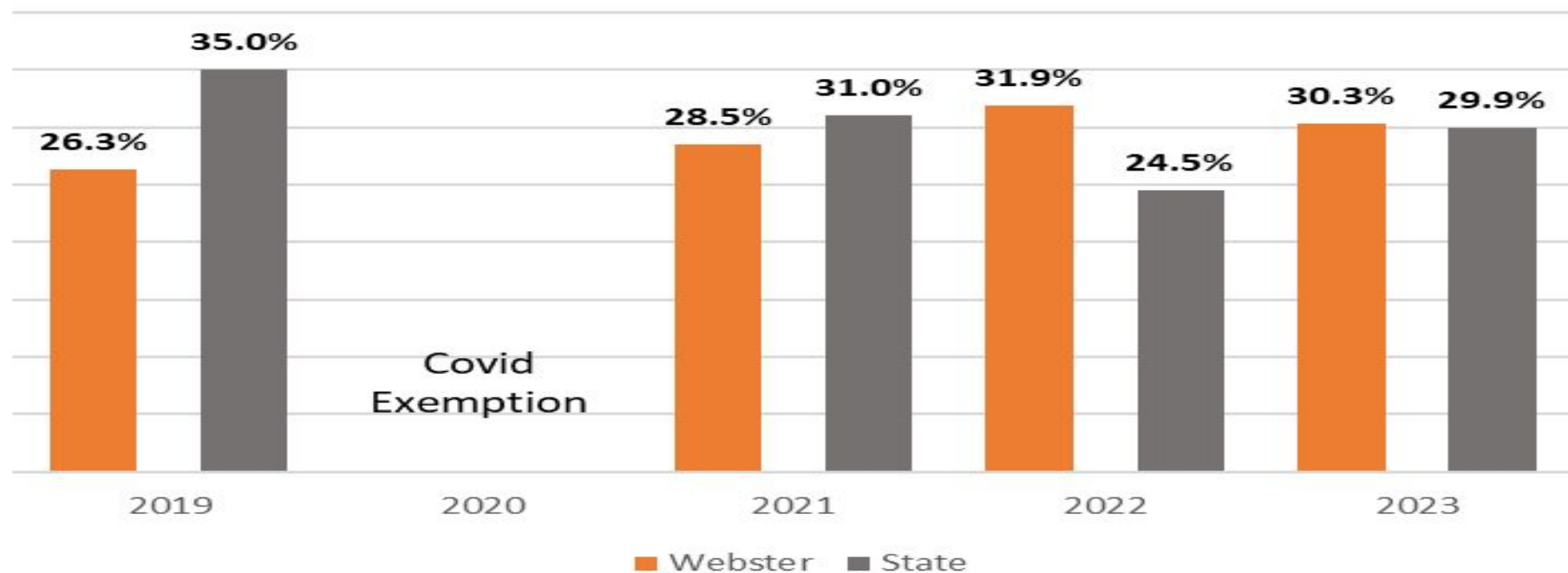

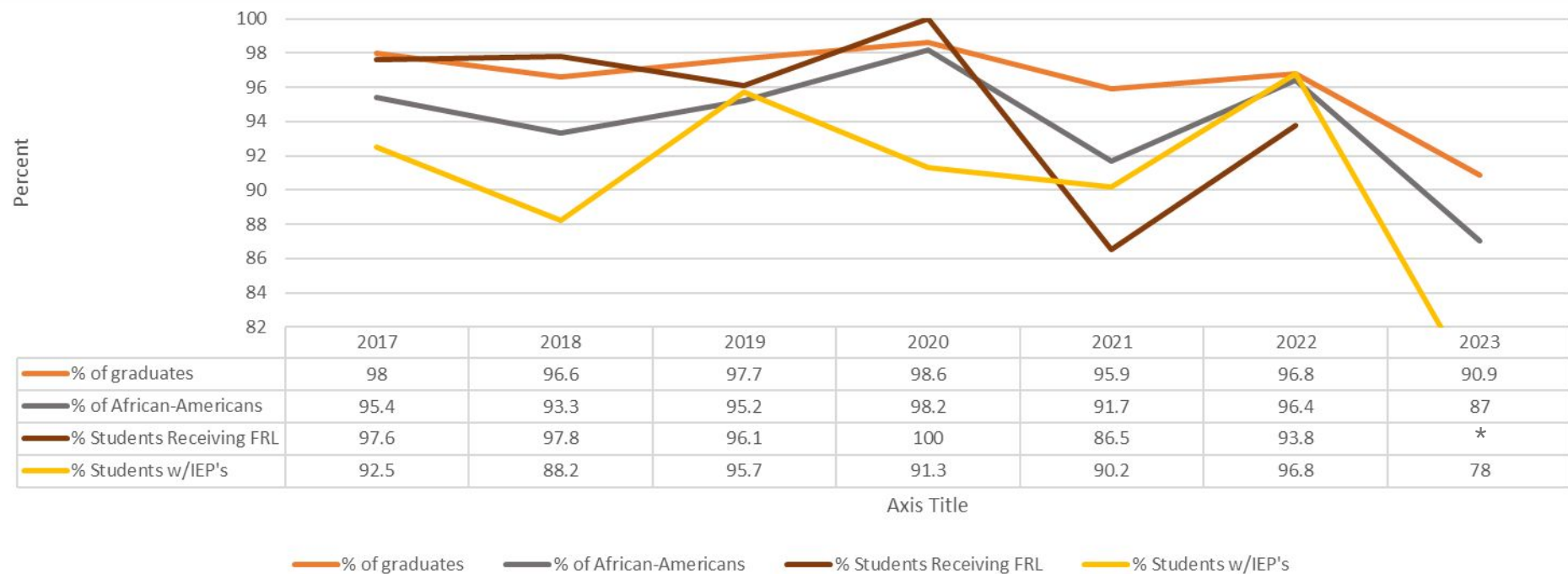

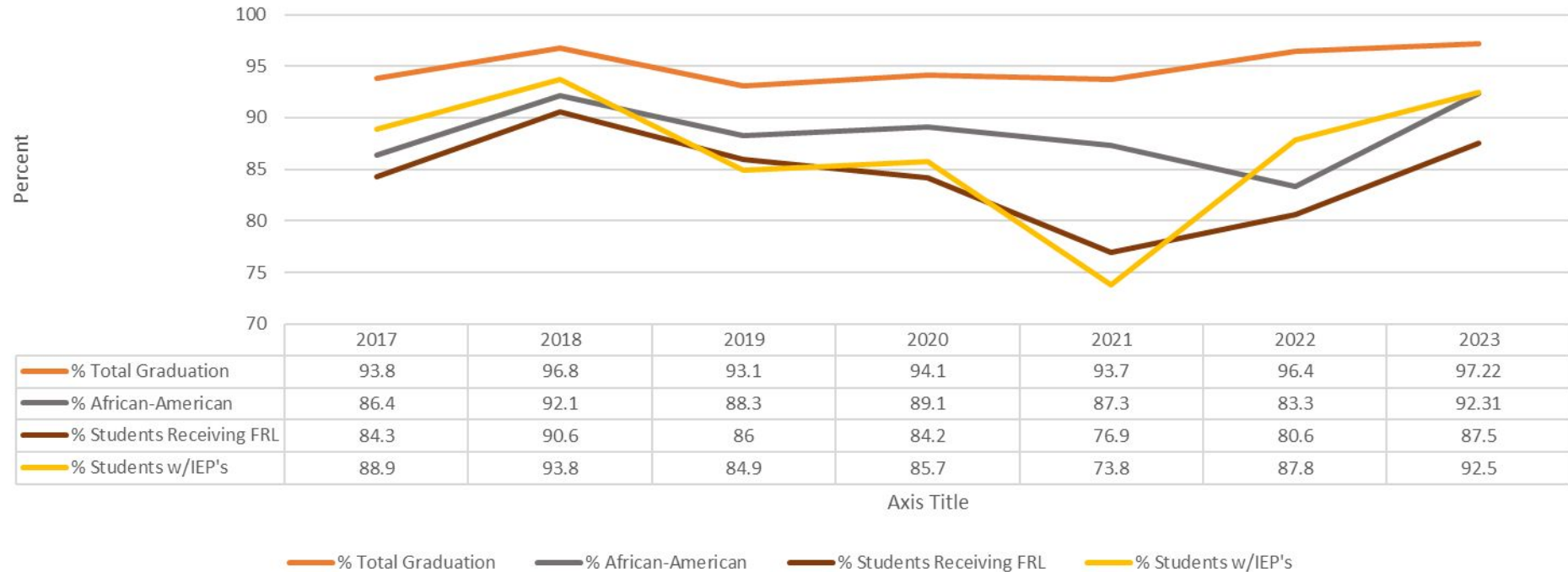

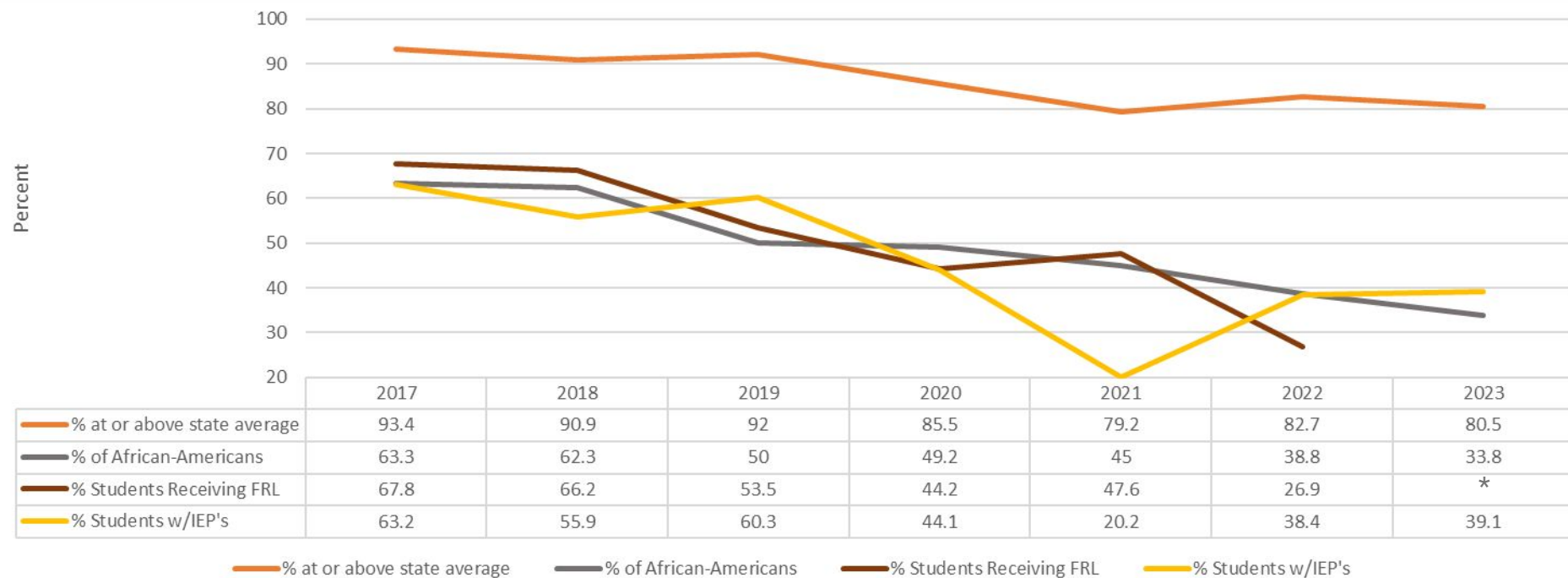

# % of Graduates Scoring Above State Standards for College & Career Readiness (ACT, SAT, COMPASS, ASVAB)



# Examples of Strategies and Systemic Changes




- Created Director of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion position
- Board adopted Policy ACI: Equity
- Created 4-Year Equity Professional Development Plan for New Teachers
- Created 2-year Equity Professional Development plan for New administrators
- Equity Evaluation Standards for all employees
- Established district-wide protocols and expectations for high quality Collaborative Learning Teams
- Revised Comprehensive School Improvement Plan (CSIP) to include a section on student groups
- K-8 Social Studies Curriculum
- Program Evaluations (curricular and non-curricular)
- Utilization of data (disaggregating data by student demographics, teacher level, and content)
- Ongoing District-wide and building level professional development
