
As we look ahead, we are excited to engage with our community to share our district priorities and receive stakeholder feedback. You will notice an increased focus on career pathways and career exploration for all

of our students as we partner with the business community to understand the careers of the future and the skills needed for our students to be successful.




Treasurer/CFO Announcement

Per Pupil Spending FY2022






54 students graduated Summa Cum Laude (4.0+ GPA)
