Kindergarten Readiness

According to the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC), readiness must be flexibly and broadly defined:

- Young children develop in different ways and at different times.
- Kindergarten entry should be based on chronological age (5 years old by August 31, 2024), not on mastery of skills.
- A school must take into account individual differences in language, culture, and prior experience.

FOCUS AREAS

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Early Literacy Skills

√ Foundational Reading Skills

- Print Concepts (read left to right; connect print to spoken language, etc.)
- Phonological Awareness (words have constituent sounds-/book/ and /b//ook/ and /b//oo//k/)
- Phonics and Decoding (stresses sound-symbol relationship to translate printed word to speech)
- Read common high-frequency words by sight

✓ Engage In Complex Text


- Identify characters, setting, and major events
- Ask and answer text-based questions about details
- Recognize common types of text

√Writing

- Use appropriate capitalization, punctuation, and spelling
- Express thoughts through writing

√Oral Language

- Ask and answer questions about what is read
- Engage in text-based discussions with peers
- Speak clearly and express thoughts, feelings, and ideas

Early Science Skills

- Make guesses and predict what might happen based on observation and past experiences.
- Describe the weather changes from day to day over the seasons.
- Understand the needs of plants and animals for survival.
- Investigate how different materials can be solid or liquid depending on temperature.
- Recognize that the push or pull on an object affects the motion of the object.
- Understand scientific vocabulary for grade level.



Preparing Your Child for Kindergarten

- ✓ Help your child develop independence at home.
- ✓ Focus on self-help skills.
- ✓ Teach responsibility.
- ✓ Develop and follow routines.
- ✓ Read aloud to your child.
- ✓ Engage your child in meaningful literacy activities- such as conversation about everyday activities.
- ✓ Acknowledge your child's feelings.


Ensuring Children Are Ready to Learn

- ✓ Establish regular sleeping hours.
- ✓ Allow enough time for morning routines and breakfast. Breakfast is served free of charge to every child every morning if you would prefer your child eat breakfast at school.
- ✓ Dress your child appropriately for indoor or outdoor school activities.
- ✓ Label all your child's personal belongs.





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Supporting Kindergarten Learning

End the day on a positive note.

- Talk to your child about school and listen carefully to what he or she tells you.
- Encourage daily physical activity- indoors and out.
- Set aside a quiet place for reading and at home practice.
- Monitor your child's television watching and screen time.

Special Education in Kindergarten

- Special Education supports and services are available district wide for those who have qualified for an Individualized Education Program (IEP).
- You and your child's Special Education Team will work on what supports he or she will need in Kindergarten.
- Most of our students receive their supports in their neighborhood school.
- In that model, staff work with students in their kindergarten classroom or in a designated space as outlined in their IEP. This includes related services such as speech or occupational therapy.
- When a youngster has a specialized level of need, his or her Team may recommend he or she attend one of our more specialized programs.
 - Life Skills
 - Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) Strand
 - Integrated- combines students w/disabilities and peers
 - Emotional Impairment (EI)





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English Learner (EL) Education in Kindergarten

Federal law mandates districts to assess incoming students whose home language survey indicates a language other than English is spoken at home for English language proficiency. The assessment results determine whether a student requires Sheltered Content and English language instruction (ESL) and at what level.

Programs:

- Launch Program: Designed for students at the initial stages of English language proficiency. All students enrolled are English Learners (ELs) and are actively developing their English language skills.
- Integrated Sheltered English Immersion (ISEI): Tailored for students transitioning in their English language proficiency. Some students in this program are ELs, while others are not. ELs receive 30 minutes of English language development (ESL) daily.

Parent Options:

- Accept the program recommendation, choosing either Launch or ISEI.
- Refuse the recommendation for Launch and opt for ISEI.
- Decline the recommended program and all associated services.






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Dual Language Programs

- Literacy and content in two languages
- Daily transitions between classrooms and teachers
- Materials and resources in both languages
- •Reading, Writing, Listening and Speaking in both languages
- Content areas (Reading, Math, Science and Social Studies) in both languages
- Multicultural perspectives, projects and events
- Parent engagement and participation







Annual Process for Dual Language Program Entry



- Complete and submit <u>Kindergarten OLR Online Registration</u> and <u>DL</u>
 <u>Lottery Request Form (online form within application)</u>.
- Dual Language Lottery Registration begins when kindergarten Registration begins
- Choose the Dual Language program you would like your child to be entered in.
- Pay attention to deadline for completing all kindergarten registration documents/files. (May 17, 2024)
- Lottery: The date of the lottery will be posted on the kindergarten registration website (May 29, 2024)
- Waiting list created
- Kindergarten screenings and Parent Questionnaire-by appointment
- DL Kindergarten Parents' Orientation
- Letter of Commitment-signed

WHEN DO I REGISTER?

All registrations must be completed with required documentation by May 17 to be eligible for the Dual Language Lottery and sibling preference.

WHAT DO I NEED TO REGISTER?

Child's birth certificate or passport

Child's photo (from shoulder's up)

Parent/Guardian's valid picture I.D.

Proof of Brockton residency


Recent Physical Exam (dated within 12 months)

Proof of lead and vision screening with stereopsis

Required Immunizations

Contact information (doctors and emergency contacts)

Individual Education Plan (if applicable)



REQUIRED IMMUNIZATIONS FOR KINDERGARTEN

Hepatitis B	3 doses
DTaP/DTP	5 doses
Polio	4 doses
MMR	2 doses
Varicella	2 doses or documentation of disease

HOW DO I REGISTER?

- Gather required documents
- Visit <u>www.bpsma.org/enroll</u> or scan the QR code
- Make note of the application number



After submitting your application, you can expect to receive a confirmation email. Your application will be temporarily placed on hold for review. A registration specialist will then contact you to review your application and guide you through the process.

HOW DO I SUBMIT THE REQUIRED DOCUMENTS?

You can directly upload documents into the online registration (OLR) or send them by text, email, fax or in person to your registration specialist. If you are unable to submit documents directly into OLR, the registration specialist assigned to you will help with this process.











HOW DO I PROVE RESIDENCY?

To establish Brockton residency, you need to submit two of the following documents:

- ✓ Utility bill dated within the last 60 days (gas, oil, electric, phone, cable, or water)
- ✓ Mortgage, lease agreement, rental contract, or notarized BPS affidavit
- ✓ A letter from an approved government agency (i.e., DTA, DCF, DOR)


Please ensure that your name and home address are clearly visible on the provided documents, as part of the residency verification process.


