INTRODUCTION COMMUNITY TRUSTEE AREA DISTRICTING (CTAD) COMMITTEE

The Community Trustee Area Districting (CTAD) Committee is made up of 16 members representing various community stakeholders within the Fremont Union High School District (FUHSD). Here's what we do:

Educate the Community

Expand community awareness about the transition from At Large to By Trustee Area Elections by sharing important information, with a focus on reaching those not easily reached by the school district.

Enhance Community Engagement

Increase outreach efforts and actively seek feedback from the community on sample maps (Scenarios 1-4), identify and understand communities of interest, and ensure diverse voices are heard.

Feedback Analysis and Synthesis

Review and synthesize the collected feedback and community-submitted maps and create a recommendation of possible maps and sequencing for the School Board to review.

Present to the School Board

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Present the recommended maps and sequencing to the School Board for thorough review and final approval.

The CTAD Committee is committed to ensuring a fair and inclusive districting process, aligning with the values and interests of the diverse communities within FUHSD.

- ensuring the district fulfills its mission to help ALL students succeed;
- managing the district's budget and resources;
- creating and maintaining policies in areas such as curriculum, facilities and other services;
- recruiting and reviewing the Superintendent's performance.



SINCE 1923, FREMONT UNION HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT (FUHSD) HAS ALWAYS HAD 5 SCHOOL BOARD MEMBERS



The number of schools in a district does not equate to the number of board members.

Most school district boards have 5 members.

YOUR CHOICE OF A SCHOOL BOARD MEMBER MATTERS – THEY REPRESENT YOUR COMMUNITY IN GOVERNING YOUR SCHOOL DISTRICT AND SO DOES YOUR INPT ON TRUSTEE AREA MAPS



Board members collaborate to serve the community effectively.



They communicate feedback and concerns from community members to District staff.



As elected representatives, board members are accountable to the community.



Your vote for board members helps choose representatives who align with your values and priorities.

CURRENT STATE

FUHSD SCHOOL BOARD MEMBERS ARE CURRENTLY ELECTED IN OPEN ELECTIONS ACROSS THE DISTRICT


Referred to as "At Large" Elections

 5 board members are elected on a rolling basis every two years, with 2 members elected in one cycle, and 3 elected in the next cycle (sequencing)

• Board members are elected to a 4-year term

 Board members can reside anywhere inside the FUHSD boundaries

 Historically, some areas of the district have not had a board member that has lived in their neighborhood



POTENTIAL DISADVANTANGES OF AN AT LARGE STRUCTURE

- May create concerns about lack of representation across the district
- The board may have less on-the-ground understanding of the impact of local issues
- Potentially fewer diverse candidates may run for school board
- Possible financial hardship for individuals to campaign across the whole district
- California Voting Rights Act lawsuits may only be brought against atlarge elections

POTENTIAL ADVANTANGES OF A BY-TRUSTEE AREA STRUCTURE

- Creates more representation across the district
- Board members may have stronger on-the-ground understanding of the impact of local issues
- More diverse candidates may run for school board
- The financial costs for individuals to campaign are much less, creating more accessibility
- California Voting Rights Act lawsuits can only be brought against At-Large elections, not By-Trustee Area elections

PROBLEM 1: POTENTIAL LAWSUIT UNDER THE CALIFORNIA VOTING RIGHTS ACT

CVRA of 2001 states:

"An at-large method of election may not be imposed or applied in a manner that impairs the ability of a protected class to elect candidates of its choice or its ability to influence the outcome of an election, as a result of the dilution or the abridgment of the rights of voters who are members of a protected class, as defined pursuant to Section 14026."


ACROSS THE STATE DEMAND LETTERS REGARDING THE CVRA HAVE INCREASED

- FUHSD is proactively transitioning to retain control over the process and avoid costly fees that will take funds away from our students.
- Once a district has been sent a CVRA demand letter, it may have to pay a minimum of \$40,000 even if it immediately changes elections.
- No local agency has successfully won a CVRA challenge, the large majority do not try to defend such challenges.
- Defending against litigation is expensive. The City of Santa Monica has spent \$9 million in legal fees. If an agency loses a CVRA lawsuit it may have to pay the plaintiff's attorneys' fees as well.

PROBLEM 2: COMMUNITIES HAVE COMMUNICATED TO THE BOARD LACK OF REPRESENTATION IN CERTAIN AREAS OF THE DISTRICT

TRUSTEE AREAS PART 1

FUHSD SCHOOL BOARD DECIDED TO MAKE THE TRANSITION FROM AN AT LARGE MODEL TO A BY-TRUSTEE AREAS MODEL ON MARCH 7, 2023

FUHSD will be divided into 5 trustee areas of roughly equal population size (based on 2020 Census data), for the purpose of School Board Member Elections.

- Trustee Area boundaries impact only the way board members are elected. They are not the same as school boundaries and where students go to school.
- The school board members will be elected only by those citizens registered to vote in the Trustee Area.
- The school board member <u>must reside</u> within the FUHSD boundaries and is only eligible to run for election in the Trustee Area in which they reside.
- Each Trustee Area must be relatively <u>equal in total population</u> (<10% total variance between the largest Trustee Area and smallest Trustee Area).
- While Citizen Voting Age Population (CVAP) is not used for population balancing, it could be weighed as a factor in map selection after all of the other required criteria are considered.

THE FUHSD SCHOOL BOARD DECIDED TO MOVE TO TRUSTEE AREAS LAST SPRING WITH THE GOALS OF...

PROBLEM

#1 CVRA Avoiding any question about compliance with California Voting Rights Act (<u>CVRA</u>) and costly litigation, which could require the district's transition to Trustee Areas.

#2 EQUITY O2 Providing more direct representation of the District as a whole.

Making it more accessible and less expensive for people who live in each trustee area to run for a seat on the School Board.

At the final Map Hearing, the Board must approve a single map and sequencing. Sequencing is a transition schedule to determine which Trustee Areas will be up for election in 2024 (2 seats) and 2026 (3 seats).

- As a resident, regardless of voter status, having I representative for your area may allow for more local and balanced representation across the district.
- There may be increased accessibility for individuals to run for election.

This will not affect...

- FUHSD school site boundaries and where students attend school.
- The FUHSD School Board's tradition and commitment to serving ALL students regardless of where a school board member resides within the district.

FREMONT UNION HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT IS EXPERIENCING DECLINING ENROLLMENT, BUT IS NOT CLOSING ANY SCHOOLS IN THE DISTRICT


- This decline in enrollment has not been significant enough for a school closure.
- Proactively the District has taken steps to keep all the schools balanced and comprehensive.
- In 2016, the District created the Citizen Advisory Committee (CAC) on Enrollment. If you are interested in learning more about this committee visit www.fuhsd.org/cac.
- The work of the CAC has helped to keep enrollment balanced across our five high schools.

TRUSTEE AREAS PART 2

THE BOARD UNANIMOUSLY ADOPTED RESOLUTION 2223-19 TO TRANSITION TO BY TRUSTEE AREA ELECTIONS

- The Board has been discussing the CVRA and transition to Trustee Areas since April 23, 2019.
- Public comments on March 7, 2023 indicated the resolution was well received.
- The Board will ultimately be voting to decide on the following:
 - The final Trustee Area Map how the district will be divided into 5
 approximately equal areas following federal and state laws.
 - Sequencing which two areas will be up for election in Cycle 1 (2024) and which three areas will be up for election in Cycle 2 (2026).

OVERVIEW OF DISTRICTING PROCESS



THERE ARE CERTAIN CRITERIA THAT A MAP MUST MEET OR ATTEMPT TO MEET

To the extent possible, the following criteria must be used to draw maps, in this order of priority:

FEDERAL LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

Population Balance: each area shall contain nearly equal populations with less than 10% total variance, based on the latest Census data (2020). FUHSD has a total population of 240,655, this means about 48,000 per trustee area.

Federal Voting Rights Act of 1965: lines may not be drawn to deny minority voters the right to participate in the political process and should not dilute the minority vote.

STATE LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

California AB764:

- Contiguous when all parts of the trustee area are touching without any gaps
- Maintain Communities of Interest keeping identified communities together
- City/census designated places follow city boundaries, no designated places within District
- Natural/artificial boundaries rivers, freeways, main roads, etc.
- Compactness

Maps may not be drawn to favor or discriminate against political parties, incumbents or candidates.

SEQUENCING WILL BE UNIQUE TO EACH MAP

- Sequencing refers to determining which areas have elections each election cycle (2024 or 2026)
- Current Board member terms cannot be changed, so there must be an election in 2
 of the new trustee areas in 2024. In 2026, there will be an election in the other three
 areas as those terms will be ending.
- Elections Code requires "special consideration to the purposes of the CVRA" and to take into account "preferences" of residents of trustee areas in setting sequencing
- Sequencing is specific to each map, but usually set:
 - To elect at the next election from any area(s) which does not have a resident incumbent (e.g., if no incumbent living in Area 1, Area 1 election may be set for 2024)
 - To align election cycles with end of resident incumbent terms (e.g., if two incumbents live in Area 2 and their terms end in 2026, Area 2 election may be set for 2026)
















