Home for Hanukkah

Many people around the world celebrate Christmas, but there is another celebration that occurs around the same time as it. This celebration is called Hanukkah. Hanukkah is an eight day celebration that occurs every December. It is celebrated by Jews and is meant to reaffirm the ideals of the Jewish religion. Specifically, Hanukkah celebrates the rededication of the Second Temple of Jerusalem and the Jews triumph over their Greek-Syrian oppressors during the second century B.C..

There are many traditions involved in the celebration of Hanukkah. The main traction is the lighting of a nine-branched menorah. This menorah is called the hanukiah. On each night, a candle is added to the menorah. Once the ninth candle is added, it is used to light the rest of them. During each night Jews normally recite blessings and participate in a time of prayer. Other traditions of Hanukkah include exchanging gifts, playing with four sided-spinning tops called dreidels, and eating food items such as latkes (potato pancakes) and jam-filled donuts.



Perelman's Potato (Pancakes) Latkes

What you will need:

1 pound of large Russet potatoes
1 large onion
2 large eggs
½ C. all-purpose flour
2tsp. Salt

1tsp. baking powder
½ tsp. Black pepper
Enough Veg. oil for frying

Scrub clean and peel all potatoes then cut into quarters.
Grate potatoes into a bowl.
Cut onion and quarter it to then grate into the same bowl as the potatoes.
Transfer to a colander and squeeze all moisture out with a few paper towels.

Put back into a mixing bowl and add eggs, flour, baking powder and salt/pepper - mix until all the flour is absorbed.

Put oil ¼ inch deep into a frying pan and heat to med-high. Use your hands and flatten the mixture into patties then into the oil frying each side until golden brown (5 min) per side. Transfer to a plate so that you may enjoy it with sour cream or applesauce!

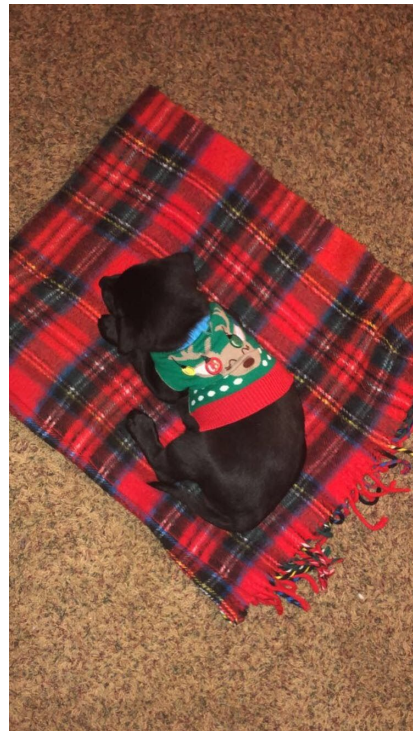

GRANDMOTHER'S COOKING CARDS

PREP: 20 MINS BAKE: 10 MINS PER BATCH

- 1 STICK UNSALTED BUTTER, SOFTEN
- 1 STICK UNSALTED MARGARINE
- 1/2 CUPS CONFECTIONERS' SUGAR
- 1 TEASPOON VANILLA EXTRACT
- 1/2 TEASPOON OF SALT
- 2 1/2 CUPS ALL-PURPOSE FLOUR
- 3/4 CUPS OF WALNUTS, FINELY GROUND IN
FOOD PROCESSOR OR BLENDER
- COATING 2 CUPS OF CONFECTIONERS, SUGAR

1. HEAT OVEN TO 400 F.
2. IN A LARGE BOWL WITH AN ELECTRIC MIXER
BEAT BUTTER, MARGARINE, CONFECTIONERS,
SUGAR, VANILLA AND SALT UNTIL BLENDED.
ON LOW SPEED, BEAT IN FLOUR AND WALNUTS
JUST UNTIL BLENDED.
3. ROLL TABLESPOONS OF DOUGH INTO SMOOTH 1
INCH ROUND BALLS. PLACE 2 INCHES APART
FROM EACH OTHER ON AN UNGREASED COOKIE
SHEET.
4. BAKE 10 MINUTES OR UNTIL FIRM

5. TO COAT: PUT CONFECTIONERS' SUGAR INTO A
WIDE BALL. ADD HOT COOKIES, A FEW AT A
TIME, AND TOSS CAREFULLY TO COAT COOKIES.
REMOVE WITH A SPOON TO A WIRE RACK TO
COOL DOWN. WHEN COOL, ROLL AGAIN IN
CONFECTIONERS SUGAR.

I have wanted to learn about Serbian Christmas for a while so I have done the research. This is what I have found. The Serbian's celebrate Christmas on January 7th. The reason is because when the Bible talks about Jesus's birth they are using the Julian calendar. The calendar we use today is the Gregorian calendar which is why Christmas is on December 25th. The Serbian Orthodox also tend to fast 40 days before the birth of Christ. The Christmas Eve dinner is meatless. Depending on the household, there might be bakalar with potatoes (codfish), tuna salad, or meatless sarma (stuffed cabbage). On Christmas Day the greeting is Mir Boziji! Hristos se Rodi which means "Peace of God! Christ is Born!." The response should be Voistinu Hristos se Rodi!, and that means "Indeed, He is born." Peanut Butter Balls

Ingredients:

- 1 cup creamy peanut butter
- 1 cup butter, room temperature
- 4 cups powdered sugar
- 1 1/4 cups crushed graham crackers
- 15 ounces semi-sweet chocolate (for melting)

Directions:

1. In the bowl of your stand mixer fitted with the paddle attachment combine the peanut butter and butter, mixing on medium speed until smooth.
2. Turn mixer to low and add in the powdered sugar and graham cracker crumbs, mixing until evenly incorporated. Mixture will be thick.
3. Using a small cookie scoop (about 1 tablespoon), portion out the mixture and roll into balls. Place them on a large parchment lined baking sheet. Place the baking sheet in the refrigerator for at least 30 minutes to chill.
4. In a medium bowl melt the chocolate in 25- second increments, stirring after each until smooth.
5. Using a fork, dip each peanut butter ball into the melted chocolate, tapping off the excess. Place back on the parchment lined baking sheet. Repeat with all balls.
