This month, we commemorate the life and legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. We recognize the significance and relevance of Dr. King's words, his actions, the legislation that came about as a result of his activism and the impact of his work all over the world. In honor of his legacy, we continue to strive toward a sense of belonging for everyone.

This month, we observe Holocaust Remembrance Day. The date of January 27th was chosen to commemorate the liberation of the Auschwitz concentration camps in 1945. This day reminds us of the mass murder of II million people, 6 million of which were Jews.

January is also Muslim Heritage Month in the state of New Jersey. In the spring of 2023, Governor Murphy signed a joint resolution establishing the month of January as Muslim Heritage Month. New Jersey is home to nearly 300,000 Muslim Americans, the highest percentage of Muslim residents in the nation.

January is Poverty Awareness Month. This month is used to raise awareness and call attention to the growth of poverty in America which affects about 12% of our nation.
